INCREMENTALISM CONTINUED

Last month's discussion on incrementalism focused on many of its

negative aspects. This month's article will continue with those examples but will also explore many of the positive aspects of incremental steps. Proverbs 3:4-6 which states "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own under-

standing, but in all ways acknowledge Him and he shall direct your path." still applies.

As a young man I remember a book titled "Nineteen Eighty Four" which was actually about the Russian Empire. When it was published, 1984 was in the future. The book talked about how the government controlled everything and people did something called double speak to prevent them from getting in trouble with the authorities. There were other aspects of the book, but these will serve to illustrate incrementalism. At the time many of us were looking at the book

and saying it couldn't happen in the United States. Americans wouldn't

stand for it. A few were fearful that it was where the Unites States was headed.

Today we have cameras at many intersections to make the intersection safe. However those same cameras are used to track the move-

ments of individuals and shows where those individuals traveled and at what time. Of course the cameras are there to protect public safety. Today's technology allows the insertion of identification chips and radio frequency chips in animals as well as humans. For instance, in San Marcos, TX, a city ordinance proposal requires every pet to have a chip placed in the animal for safety reasons. Some people put chips in their children for safety reasons. Legislation is being proposed to require all livestock owned by farmers and ranchers to have mi-

crochips in their animals. All in the name of public safety. This was incrementally accomplished. If someone had told you several years ago that where you traveled you would be tracked by intersection cameras you would have not accepted it. If someone would have told you a few years ago that you would have to insert a microchip into your animals you would have laughed. Today it has become a reality. This development could have come right out of the book "Nineteen Eighty Four".

Another interesting development is the cell phone. All modern cell phones now provide the government the ability to locate your position even when you aren't using it. This technology plays a part in many TV police shows. The argument for this technology being put into our cell phones is for safety and to track the "bad guys". Of course the 'bad guys" buy a disposable cell phone and throw it away before being tracked. The only ones who can be tracked are the "regular law abiding guys". A few years ago this intrusion on our personal lives would simply not have been accepted. But incrementally we accept these types of changes usually for safety purposes or for the children.

Another example is the proposal from our leaders in Washington to place GPS tracking units in automobiles to track the miles we travel to more fairly tax us on the miles we travel rather than the gallons of fuel used. Of course, the technology can be used not only to track the miles traveled for taxing us, it can also track where we went, when we went there, and how long we stayed. This technology for the good of all (taxes) is an incremental step complementing the cameras and chips. We tend to accept these changes because they are done in small and almost incremental steps with subtle urging to make things safe. After all, who wouldn't want to be located by their cell phone if they were lost. We seldom ask how often does this actually happen?

The term double speak from the book "Nineteen Eighty Four" also illustrates what we see today. "Win or lose and pass or fail" are terms that have almost been eliminated when we talk about youngsters. But I can assure you that after the baseball game or soccer match, the kids who lost know it. You can tell by looking at the

kids who won. The attitude by each of these teams tells the story even if the adults refuse to keep the score or recognize the win. In the same way we are encouraged to tell our children everything they do is good. However, they know they are not good at everything. Some do math well, others read well, but they may not do both well. I suspect that even the first graders have figured out which kids are the best students in their class, even if the teachers don't mark wrong answers with a red pen. They know where they fall in their respective class rooms even if adults don't acknowledge it. Even with the various tests needed to advance to the next grade the rate of social promotions for those that fail those exams are in excess of eighty percent as reported on the local radio station this morning. Those kids who failed one grade are being promoted to the next level of education without being properly prepared and they become further frustrated. In addition, the kids who can handle the new material are held back because those who can't do the work require additional help. This

phenomenon is an example of double

speak, where we can't say someone

isn't capable. Yet on the football field if you can't perform, you aren't in the starting lineup. In fact, life is that way. You can think of any number of other politically correct words and concepts that have replaced regular words such as yes or no.

The Dallas School System eliminated the requirement to finish homework by a deadline. They also allow the students to retake their exams until they succeed, and no one receives a zero even if they do nothing. Not surprisingly, the reports are that the student's grades have greatly improved. That doesn't necessarily translate into better learning. This change occurred in incremental steps rather than a radical, instantaneous change. How these students will actually perform in life is unknown.

Incrementally we are becoming less inclined to mention Christianity. We are more likely to use the more politically correct word religion rather than Christian. This is double speak. The word immigrant no longer means a person who immigrated through the legal process of immigration. It usually means someone who came into this country illegally. The news re-

ported that an immigrant was charged with the murder of a young lady. They didn't clarify if this person immigrated like our forefathers did or if the person is here illegally. This is double speak straight from "Nineteen Eighty Four". Gradually we accept these kinds of word changes and eventually we don't know what anyone really means, or, conversely, we can believe the words mean whatever we want them to mean.

We don't get into credit problems all at once. It is usually done in small increments. We use our credit cards a little at a time, and before you know it are several thousand dollars in debt, which will take many years to pay. Our government has done the same thing, only on a much grander scale. The solution is called a stimulus, but is nothing more than greatly increased debt generated by poor decisions in business and government. The consolidation of finance companies into mega corporations that the government says can't be allowed to fail are costing taxpayers more than the corporations are worth. Years ago those companies would not have been able to consolidate on this massive a scale due to anti monopoly laws. By increments those laws were changed or ignored by our elected officials and usually unknown to most Americans. Those hidden changes are contributing to the financial problems we have today. The legislation is written in such a way as to sound great but leaves out the hidden costs and negative impact on the citizens.

So much for the negatives of incrementalism. Let's look at some positives. They are just as numerous and just as important. Just as we get into debt, by incrementally putting money into savings we begin to float on wealth rather than drown in debt. Most of us didn't get into debt over night and we won't get out of debt or become wealthy over night either. It takes time and dedication to save and increase wealth. This also occurs when we gain weight. We don't gain a lot of weight over night. It takes time. Those extra pounds won't go away over night, either. It will take time, diet management, and, of course, exercise, to lose those unwanted pounds. Incrementally you can gain control of pounds or debt, or any other aspect of life.

When you meet that special person who becomes your life mate, the

Even in those relationships, the love and caring becomes more complete in incremental stages as we understand each other better and face life's challenges over time. Sometimes those incremental steps add that certain spice to our lives and keeps the relationship special.

Did you become a Christian all at once and, once becoming a Christian, did you fully grasp it all at once? Not likely. For most of us it was an incremental journey. First, maybe as a child we learned about Christianity. Then as we grew older, our depth of understanding about Christianity increased. After further study and life experiences, we began to blossom into a full Christian. Remember, as a child we thought as a child and as an adult we think as an adult. Incrementally we continue our grow in our Christian Faith.

Like many other aspects of our life, incrementalism is neither good nor bad. It's how we use it and how we react to what is before us that counts. Incrementally we can become failures or, conversely, incrementally we can become successful in all aspects of our lives, including sharing our Christian Faith. We seldom bring someone to the Christian Faith the first time we meet them or witness to them. But we can incrementally by word and action do so.

Please take the time to reflect on these observations. Look at them as an opportunity. Most of us will not be able to make immediate, major, radical, or massive impacts on large groups or in our own lives. However, we can make an impact on an individual or in our community. Take that opportunity and don't be afraid to incrementally move forward in your own Christian faith, and share that faith with others through word and deed.

through the jungle but it would be a long and grueling walk since there are no roads leading to Ahaus. If you want to get involved in this annual work contact David Miller.

Several reports by individuals and individual congregations about the work they are doing were shared with the attendees. For instance the Ocker Church has several outreach programs under way including taking food, usually in the form of beans, and clothes to the border town of Redford, Texas. From there it is taken to Northern Mexico where both of these items are in great need. At Cade's Lake Rev. Heckman and the Cade Lake community are moving forward in the rebuilding of a garage which will serve as a community outreach facility.

A youth oriented mission project at Oak Island, south of Anahuac on the East side of Trinity Bay is scheduled for the last week in June. This fishing community was devastated by Hurricane Ike. Several people from Crosby have been helping this community. Now Youth from the Unity will spend a week there with youth from the Moravian Church in witnessing and helping with reconstruc-

tion work. The youth will need several adults so if you are an adult who ever wanted to participate in a mission trip but didn't have the time or inclination to go out of the country this is an opportunity for you as well. Age is not an excuse not to participate.

The presentations by Jill Miller, and Ray and Laurie Griggs really showed what it is to be on the front lines in the mission field. The experiences and sense of dedication they shared with the attendees was simply outstanding and moving.

One of the things this Mission Festival showed was that we all have individual and congregational assets that can be used for Mission efforts. Just a few dedicated Individuals drive the beans and clothes to Redford. It only takes a long week end but the results are rewarding. (Of course they sacrifice not hearing Bro. Ron preach on that Sunday.) The work at Cade's Lake is an ongoing effort with a little work being done regularly, and now a skilled person has given his time to make it complete. Others are doing numerous things that can be classified as mission work. You and your congregation can do the same. Just think of what assets you have and where the needs might be. It doesn't have to be in another country or even in the next county. In fact a mission opportunity could be right across the street from your church.

Every once in a while we hear that the Unity is dying or already dead. When we have witnessing through word and deed such as found at this Festival, those negative murmurings are put to rest where they belong. Based upon what happened at this Festival the Unity is growing and going about God's work in a strong and enthusiastic way.

A Report from David Miller, Unity Mission Board Chairman:



2009 Work Crew

During January 16th thru the 29th, 2009; seven Brethren from Texas traveled south of the largest tropical rain forest to the Moravian Missions Hospital, on the Patuca River at Ahuas, Honduras, to put into practice that "unity" with our southerly brethren. We did this the way Texans do this; kind of a bold hand shake, a big smile, a friendly "howdy" and what I think Texans do best, a helping hand. We started our busy days with a devotional, scripture, and prayer, then on to breakfast with the doctors at 7:00.

and by 8:00 divided up and worked on various projects. We chased down and repaired numerous water leaks, did general maintenance or repair to water wells, generators, and electrical systems, constructed and hand painted a new sign for the entrance to the compound. We were also able to participate (Daniel had us up front singing) in Sunday Worship, twice. The build up and maintenance was not just physical, but also spiritual. I believe the fact that we were there to listen to the doctors was worth the

Dorothy Hinson, Board Member trip alone; Gerard and Norvelle Rudy share their concerns, struggles, and victories in the Lord. And in the short time we were there, we were able to see their countenance grow increasingly brighter and their spirit lifted.

Doctor Gerard Rudy stated that the two major things they consistently needed were reliable water and electricity. Other than during surgery, the hospital relies on one of two generators for electricity from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m., during which all jobs requiring electricity are done; washing clothes, pumping water cisterns full, charging batteries, operating the autoclave and the lab, among other things. One of our major projects was to start a threeyear project to convert the compound to solar electricity, a more consistent and reliable system (God willing). This year's plan (first phase) was for us to construct the foundational framework for the solar system. The second crew from North Carolina (completed by the time of this article) would install the operating system, the deep cycle batteries and one third of the projected solar panel needed. This should eliminate the morning generator time, cutting that cost by almost half. Alleluia!

Next, tackling the need for abundant clean, reliable water, something we Texans take for granted. The hospital now operates on three hand-dug water wells (an abundant supply during the wet season, but slim during the dry season) that are seldom reliable and never drinkable without filtration and chlorination. Our crew worked on the wells almost daily. The three hours the generators ran was not enough time to fill the overhead water reservoirs. We only had flush and shower water about half the time we were there. In Ahuas few houses have running water in them, but try running a hospital without it. Sadly the day we left, the water system was not operating. This hospital needs water



wells drilled and cased at least 70 ft. deep to have abundant clean, reliable water. The plans are in the works; we have a portable drilling rig (Ray Griggs was able to borrow one for the Unity through his contacts in Puerto Lempira, Honduras). We have men ready to drill the well, and we're investigating resources for submersible water pumps, PVC casing, drilling mud, and sufficient funds. Gratitude was often expressed and an invitation was given to the Unity of the Brethren to return.

Personal note: The Unity of the Brethren mission budget goal fell way short in 2008. Missions giving is down over \$20,000 in recent years, and I do understand the state of the economy. I also understand, thru God's Word, that the economy will increasingly worsen, especially for Christians in the end times. What an exciting time to live in! Alleluia! I have great faith in what God can do thru this small remnant called the Unity of the Brethren!

Unlike our government, your Mission Board is fiscally responsible. Therefore in 2009 the ongoing Unity effort to participate in the Great Commission and planned efforts to expand into the Czech Republic may be trimmed or dropped. If you agree with the work of the Unity of the Brethren thru the Mission Board and would like to support their work by personal prayer or by mission's awareness in your local congregation, great! And when you are prayerfully considering the work God is doing through the Unity, ask God if you are a goer or sender. God requires his children to be one or the other! The Mission Board budget funds the ongoing Unity projects, and at times request are made known for special projects God presents, like clean, reliable water wells for the mission hospital in Ahuas, Honduras. Thanks! Thanks! Thanks, to those who are supporting the Unity of the Brethren mission's work!!!
