GARDENS

It seems that everyone has a book on gardening out on the shelves in

the spring. This is the time of the year when we have put in our gardens and are beginning to see what we planted start to grow. It is a time of expectation and the initial indications of the fruits of our labor. In fact, it is said that presidents Washing-

ton and Jefferson referred to gardening as the noblest of occupations. Go forth ye noble gardeners!

Throughout history, going back to ancient times, gardening by individuals has been a central part of human activity. During WWII the term "Victory Garden" was coined to help win the war. So gardening is not only an important human endeavor, it holds a special place for us who live in central Texas and is an integral part of the Czech heritage. When I visited what was then Czechoslovakia, people had gardens in their back yards. They weren't hobby gardens, but provided

an important part of their food supply because under the Soviet central au-

> thority vegetables were not readily available. Those who could also had small plots of land in the country side which were reached by train where they planted vegetables and fruit trees.

Gardens take on many different styles and de-

signs. Some are like the traditional family farm some of us may remember, where a horse or mule plowed a large area for the vegetables needed to sustain that family for the next year. Today those types of gardens are plowed and cultivated with a tractor. As we have become more urbanized, our gardening techniques have changed also. One of those techniques is called the square foot gardening of a very small area where each square foot is allocated a vegetable. These are usually in a raised or

even portable container no more than four square feet in size and can be easily kept on a patio of an apartment that gets adequate sun. Even smaller types of gardens are simply individual pots of vegetables for even smaller space, or where the individual just wants to do a little gardening. There are even techniques that don't require soil or the sun. The vegetables are grown in a nutrient liquid flowing through a PVC pipe. Vegetables are also grown inside a building where the sun doesn't shine. A special lamp that mimics the rays from the sun provides the light. Each technique meets the needs of the individual gardener and is designed to meet their individual expectations.

There is another gardening technique that has recently attracted my interest because it not only meets my needs but seems to hold a lesson for all of us. The technique is called "The Three Sisters". Because of its compact style and ease of cultivation, some have also called it "guerrilla" or "survival" gardening. I like the term three sisters because it envisions mutual support, differences, and commonality. In some ways it reminds you of Ephesians 4, where the Bible

talks of being patient, bearing with one another in love, and talking about how we are each called differently to Christ's service. Verse 16 states, "From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work." In a simple way this garden technique illustrates this verse.

The Three Sisters technique begins with the making of a mound about 20 to 24 inches in diameter with a water ring around the mound. Each mound has about a foot of space between them. Within the mound are placed three or four equally spaced corn seeds. The corn seeds are planted first and after the corn stalk has reached nine to ten inches, pole bean seeds are planted about six to eight inches from each other around the perimeter of the mound. After the beans have been up about a week, you plant squash in the middle between four of the mounds insuring they are kept about two feet from each other. Plant the garden in a sunny area. Water and fertilize as needed. Encourage earth worms to work the soil and the garden is off and growing with little additional attention.

We have the sun, soil, and water, the worms and the vegetables themselves. The soil, water, and worms aren't seen but provide the foundation for successful growth. Without their contributions the garden wouldn't grow at all. The sun is visible, but because it is always there it is sometimes not noticed either.

Let's look at the vegetables. Each is vastly different from each other, but they do rely on each other for success. First the corn is allowed to grow some before the beans are planted, and then the beans are allowed to grow some before planting the squash. The timing is critical, because if you planted the beans first they would overwhelm the corn and it would not be allowed to grow for the good of all.

If the squash were planted first, the large leaves would shade out the corn and the beans resulting in only one third of the vegetables being allowed to reach maturity. So recognizing the importance of the timing and having the patience to allow for the growth differences greatly multiplies the ability to successfully grow this garden and increase its productivity.

Looking at the vegetables individually, we find that the corn grows tall and straight. The wind pollinates the tassels and allows the corn to grow for harvesting. That is why the corn is planted in close groups, to allow the pollination to occur. The corn takes nitrogen from the soil and depletes it from future use. The corn provides the trellis for the beans to climb on to get enough sun to grow

the beans to maturity for harvest. The bean plants, which are a legume, replaces the nitrogen in the soil. They also provide an anchor for the corn to withstand winds, like a tower uses its guy wires. The squash, which was planted last, provides the leaf cover over the soil which keeps out weeds and helps hold moisture in the soil.

The Three Sisters garden is a lot like the Unity of the Brethren. We are small, just like the garden, and as individuals and congregations we are at different places in our Christian growth and service. Each congregation and each individual brings something different to the garden at different times. Some congregations and some individuals serve more visibly, while others serve more quietly and in the background. Some start their Christian service at different times and require the patience of the rest to be allowed to grow to maturity in their service. Just like the squash, we must

be patient and allow for the Christian growth and service of others before providing the cover to sustain that growth for harvest. We also need to be like the corn stalk and allow the bean to grown up the stalk. Rather than viewing the beans as uselessly hanging on, we need to recognize the service they provide in supporting us in the winds and nurturing the soil we grow in. Initially the corn is the most visible of the vegetables and provides the core for the garden to reach a time of harvest. The rest must be patient and allow it that initial time to grow for the benefit of all to reach a time of harvest.

Each is important and each must be allowed to make their contribution in their time for the whole to reach a time of harvest. Just like this garden, the Unity must be willing to recognize the gifts of each and be supportive of those gifts to reach its time of harvest.



February 23, 2009 Dear friends,

In Mexico we have a sandwich called a "syncronizada." This is a "synchronized" grilled tortilla sandwich with ham and cheese melting into each other. And maybe "syncronizada" is a good way to describe the way God made us, too. Here we are, uneasy blends of spirit and flesh, torn between two worlds, the physical and the spiritual, and the only way we ever understand one of them is through what we experience in the other.

Take baptism. A few weeks ago our church piled 50 people into six cars and drove out 20 minutes the opposite way from Linda's (the older lady I wrote about in December) to a graceful waterfall. We stepped carefully over and around and through piles of rocks until we made it to a still dark pool under a gushing white waterfall. Rodrigo stepped into the water, and

while he prayed with Natán, it looked like a black and white movie still – two dark and white t-shirts against a backdrop of white falls and dark pool, the falling water drowning all sound. He came up beaming, and we moved forward to welcome him at the bank.

I was sitting on a rock enjoying it all, and my friend Eli sat next to me. Eli is not yet a believer, though she has come on and off to our church gatherings for awhile – "just for the fun of it," she says. As Rodrigo came up out of the water, glistening, Eli blurted, "Maybe I should be baptized." I was surprised. Somehow this experience of clambering over rocks and gullies, feeling the cool spray of the water, and watching Rodrigo make his commitment to Christ a visible, physical thing, got Eli to thinking maybe she was missing something.

I had been talking to Eli about the level of her commitment to Christ, but

here, under the shadow of the waterfall's rumble and the photo still of Rodrigo's baptism, Eli could see it for herself. "When will you give yourself like this?" I asked. She looked away.

"I'm not ready," she said. What if I mess up?"

"You'll never be ready. You will always mess up."

"But it would complicate things." "You'd let that stop you?"

In hours of interaction with Eli, never had I had an interchange like this. It was Rodrigo's baptism.

God is smart. He knows what hybrids we are. Baptism is a physical gift to us – to help us understand what is happening in the spiritual world when we give ourselves to Him. We feel it. We hear it. We smell it - the cold deathlike drop; the rush up to breath and life. We are buried with Christ and rise to new life with Him. We know it.

Somehow Eli could see this and want it, there sitting on that rock in front of God's movie still. What she will do with it, I don't yet know. I pray for her. Meanwhile, I turn my face up to the sun that heats us all, His odd, beloved, synchronous creatures.

Mexico's most famous painter, Diego Rivera, insisted that art should be plastered all over the sides of buildings and walls for everyone to enjoy. He popularized the mural, a collage of figures and events and symbols and ideas and colors that you can never take in at one glace. Murals celebrate Mexican history in every city you visit.

This Sunday we experienced a collage of teaching, a blend of stories

told by different people from different perspectives. They were all connected by a theme and a spot – marriage and a well. But you could watch how each speaker turned his own particular story from side to side, like a prism, and caught the light just a bit differently.

Now that people are developing their gifts more in the group, more of the colors of the prism are showing through. Take this Sunday, for example. Tere, our prayer warrior, has an uncanny (i.e. prophetic) sense of who needs extra prayer, extra care, and this week she insisted it was our couples. So when, as we prepared stories for Sunday's teaching, two marriages came up (Isaac & Rebecca and Jacob & Rachel), we ran with it. We're working through the great stories of the Old Testament, matching them with stories from the New, so we added the Samaritan woman for good measure.

Thank you for what you all do in your part of the mural, and for keeping us here in the midst of this other part. We see how God is combining these parts more and more, and rejoice to be one of the ways He brings

different worlds together. You help make this possible.

April 14th, 2009 Dear Friends,

What a difference it makes to be in a country where one out of every three people you meet is an evangelical believer! A few weeks ago I was in Honduras leading a seminar on church planting. It was great, eating rosquillas, tajadas and mantequilla and listening to that emphatic, breathy Honduran accent that goes up at the end of sentences and gushes on the "s's."

As part of the training, we divided into "temporary churches," applying church planting principles to a small (rabbit-sized) group that could meet and multiply anywhere while keeping a low profile. Each group held simple worship that new believers could imitate, and committed to giving, as a group, in a practical way, throughout the week. Our church decided to visit

a woman in the hospital, a woman who would have been in our group if emergency gallbladder surgery had not placed her in the public hospital instead.

Nothing about the visit was what I had expected (I am too used to Mexico). Because we arrived outside of visiting hours, we had to find a way in other than the main entrance. With a cell phone call, Argentina's husband directed us to the emergency entrance where we set our bags down next to the elevator, waiting for a family member to come escort us up to her room. There was not a single chair anywhere. No receptionist. This was no waiting room, but a foyer where people milled around waiting for news or the chance to slip unobserved into the elevator to visit a patient ("I'm sorry, love, what are you thinking," says the exasperated nurse on duty as a dozen people rush into the unattended elevator when someone gets off). Yes, we could have waited for visiting hours, but not all the group could stay that long, and well, you know, it would work out one way or another.

After waiting around and wondering if we should take our chances with the elevator (I was convinced I was a little too obvious to pull that off), our fearless member Angel (yes, that's his name) ambled over to the guard. I could see him smiling. Yep. He'd persuaded the guard to let us climb up the eight flights of stairs if we promised to be back down in ten minutes. And we couldn't all go, just two of us. The guard's name, by the way, was also Angel, and he was also a believer. "Oh, I always let people up to pray with the patients, you know," he assured us. We blessed him, and up we went. "Oye," he said, "You count those ten minutes from the time you reach the top." Good thing. We had to take a breather before going into sister Argentina's room.





We walked pass the nurses' station with a greeting and made our way into the room. There were eight women in there with family members and friends. I met Argentina, a 62-year-old woman known, as the Bible puts it, "for her good works and faithful prayer." We chatted and asked if we could pray with her. We had ten minutes.

"Of course," she nodded. "You know, I wasn't as much afraid of the surgery as I was of my stay in the hospital. I thought it would be lonely and awful. But it isn't. The women in here are Christians, and we pray every night together and one of the doctors prays with us." The woman in the next bed piped in, "Yeah, I'm new in the faith, so I've been learning the choruses we sing." "When someone is having trouble," added Argentina, "the rest of us pitch in. We all help each other." To tell the truth, it felt like a women's retreat rather than a surgical ward.

I sat down next to Argentina to pray with her, but she was already calling the other women from their beds. "Doña Concepcion, come on in. You two help Dona Maria get in here: we're going to pray now." In they shuffled, awkward in their bedclothes. "Hold hands," Argentina commanded. And we prayed there on the top floor of that hospital, in the woman's surgical ward, patients and visitors together, some 14 or 15 of us. What else could I say but, "Lord, I've never seen this in a hospital before. I think this is a miracle. Bless these women. Thank you." While we slipped down the elevator and one Angel headed over to thank the other Angel, it occurred to me, there must be more than a few angels hovering around that place. I look forward to the day these kinds of stories come out of southern Mexico, too!
