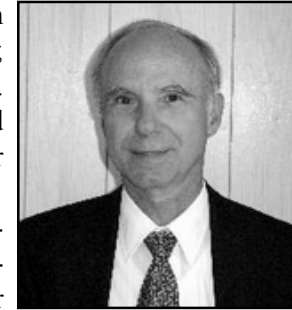

ESSENTIALS

We can look to our friend Webster for a current definition of “essential”. Among the choices, we find that essential is that which is absolutely necessary; indispensable; requisite. Pretty simple and straight forward – or is it?

Folks who have studied survival have identified four essentials for human survival. They are water, food, shelter and clothing. It makes no difference if you are in outer space or on a beach along the Gulf Coast, these things are essential to survival. The real difference would be the technology to meet those needs. The reason it is important to identify the true essentials is to set priorities, focus your efforts, and conserve energy. If you waste time and effort trying to find a water cup, getting your ipod to work, looking for your makeup, building

a table and chairs, worrying about what you don't have, or feeling sorry for yourself you won't survive.



On the beach the essential needs are met by the environment God provided. Water is attained by going behind the first row of sand dunes from the beach and digging a shallow

well couple of feet deep until you reach water. That first water will be drinkable, but if you dig deeper it will become salty. The second essential of food is found scurrying across the beach or burying itself in the beach. You safely pick up the critters, break open the shell if there is one and eat the critter raw. An essential sushi bar if you will. Some say the seaweed is also good to eat. Shelter can be made from the debris found along the beach or

digging into a sand dune. Clothing can be made by weaving grasses that are found in and around the dunes. All of your essentials to survive are met. Granted it is not a five-star hotel, but the essentials for survival are met.

While on that beach, if it is cold and you know how to rub sticks together, you could also make a fire. Does a fire become an essential when the temperature drops? It is not an essential according to the initial definition. What if you are trying to evade an enemy? Would concealment, evasion, or protection then become an essential? A strong argument could be made for including them as essential. But they aren't. Yes, they are important and will need to be addressed, but if you don't have the essentials taken care of, you won't need to

deal with the ministrative issues.

Looking to survival in space while orbiting the earth, we find a completely different set of circumstances. In addition to water, food, shelter and clothing, we have to contend with a much more complex environment. There is a need for a supply of oxygen to breathe, where on earth it was just there. In addition, they need protection from solar radiation; maybe the shelter will meet this need. There is also a need for external re-supply, waste recycling, and communication. Maintaining the orbit and not burning up by reentering the earth's atmosphere might be considered an essential to survival by those orbiting in space. It is beginning to look like essentials are not as easy to define as we might think. In fact a case could be made that circumstances

may dictate what constitutes an essential. But again the argument would be false, because the essentials are what allow you to survive. The technology changes and the environment changes, but the essentials remain. The technology assumes that the orbit will be acceptable and the recycling of the exhaled air and re-supply will be part of the ministrative support required. As things get more and more complex it is easy to incrementally add to the essentials. The real danger isn't adding a couple of essentials, or doing something important, but rather it is that while focusing on the ministrative items added to the essentials, we lose

sight of what is essential, resulting in failure.

Now let's turn to our spiritual essentials and their importance to Christians. Brethren tradition recognizes essentials as being "two-fold: on the part of God, there is the grace of the Father, the merit of Jesus Christ, and the gifts of the Holy Spirit; on the part of humanity, as one receives Christ, individuals respond in faith, love, and hope (but even these are gifts from God)."

Looking at Acts 2:42, the earliest Christians met these essentials by devoting themselves to the apostles' teaching, and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread (Holy Com-

munion), and to prayer. Today members of the Unity continue to follow this early example. We teach the word of God through the Bible, we develop and maintain Christ-centered relationships within our churches, we participate in the Lord's Supper as well as Baptism as mentioned in verse 41, and we pray.

Some might want to add that an essential should include the Bible or that Acts 2:42 defines essentials. Because the Bible is the book that forms the basis for our beliefs and is where we look for teaching others about salvation, that argument could be made. But even without the Bible, the above-stated essentials would still be valid. That is not to say that it isn't important, but it might better be considered a ministrative since it is a tool used to

impart the essentials, just as are the church building, and the sacraments of the Lords Supper and Baptism.

The essentials remain the same. We might choose to add something here and there due to circumstances, but the key is that no matter how we add to them faith, love, and hope are the core essentials and without them the other things have no meaning. Without them we Christians are but a weak, hollow, and useless vessel for the gospel. If we have a church with the biggest Bible ever and don't have faith, love, and hope in our beliefs, that church is useless.

Essentials and ministratives are not exclusive of each other, but are joined together to accomplish the will of God through us. Simply put, the ministratives provide the mecha-

nism to implement the essentials. It doesn't matter if it is building a new facility, looking at where best to place resources, witnessing, or cleaning the church; they all have a place in God's plan.

We must not lose sight of the essentials. We must not let the ministratives of the church replace the essentials or add ministratives. Those ministratives are important because they compliment the essentials, just as the survival example on the beach or in space. When properly implemented, those ministratives help to provide structure in meeting our earthly obligations.

Our society is becoming more complex each day, and we will have to meet the demands of our society while maintaining our essentials. It is easy to slip into

dealing with ministrative issues at the expense of our essentials because we feel we can control them. Remember the example from Russia? When the communists were active and taking control, the church was reported to be arguing about the height of candles in the sanctuary rather than focusing on the survival of Christianity and countering the onslaught of communism through faith, love, and hope, or even ministratives. What resulted was 80 years of Christian persecution.


As we contend with the daily administration of the church to meet our internal guiding documents, the demands of our society, and governmental requirements, or overcome opposition, we must not lose sight of our true essentials of faith, love, and hope.

Fayetteville Brethren Church Restoration Project

The Fayetteville Brethren Church has started a restoration project of the church sanctuary and foyer. The church was built in 1874 and was first remodeled in 1924. The last time the church sanctuary was remodeled was 53 years ago (1957). At that time, plaster board, paneling and ceiling tiles were installed; covering the old beaded board, and carpet and a new oak floor was put in. In the last few years, the condition of

the floor has deteriorated and the bell tower was experiencing some water leaks, as evidenced by the ceiling tiles.

On September 7, 2010, all of that was torn out and the beaded board exposed once again. It is planned to paint the sanctuary with the same colors from yesterday – dusty rose and sky blue with a heavenly blue wainscoting trim. A new wood floor will be

installed using old 6" pine. After the carpet was removed from the alter, it was discovered that the hardwood pine floor was in excellent condition, and will be refinished.

This is an exciting project, but the most joy felt by the congregation is about the steeple that is being built to replicate the one on the church from 1896. It will be made of copper with a stainless steel base. The bell tower will also have extensive work done on it. Other plans include new church lights, new seat cushions, a better sound system, maintenance of stained glass circle window, new sidewalks, new roof and new doors. The church will be completely repainted, with repairs of rotten wood done.

The work is being done by a local contractor, Minarcik Con-

struction. Two of the carpenters from this crew, Paul Michalsky and Eugene Michalsky, Jr., are great-great-grandsons of John Jecmenek, one of the principal carpenters who helped build the church in 1874. Eugene will also be making the doors for the church out of long-leaf pine to match the doors that were on the church in 1874.

The congregation of 34 active members has been planning for several years to start this project and had in their building fund approximately \$70,000, but the estimate of the project was over \$125,000 and would take several more years of saving to begin. They have received a loan from the Mutual Aid Society in the amount of \$55,000. Without this loan, this project would not have been able to be started at this

time. Money is raised throughout the year for the building fund by donations and memorials. On the fourth Sunday in June, a celebration is held as the primary fundraiser for this fund. 

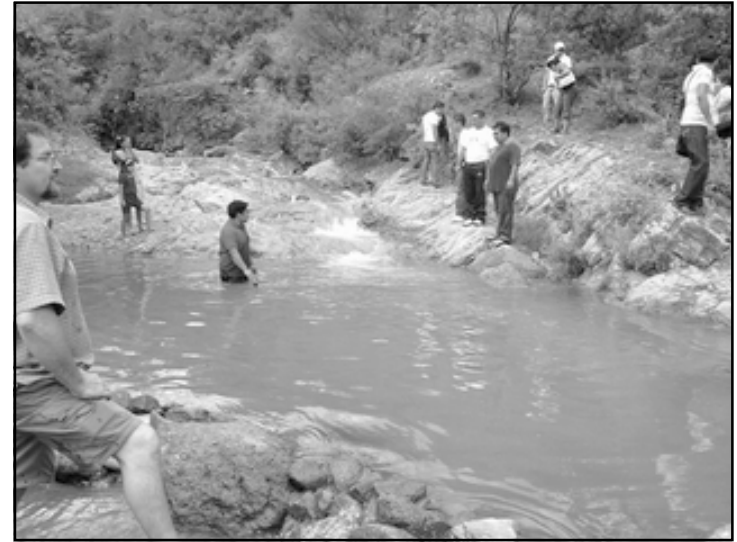

Subject: babies



Sometimes it is hard to hold together the contradictions of life. This past week we planned to join friends for "El Grito," when citizens gather at 11 p.m. in homes and town squares, and someone (usually an elected official on a balcony) shouts out the names of the patriots who helped free Mexico from Spain and ends with the words, "Viva Mexico", which everyone shouts out together three times. This re-enactment of the spark of the Mexican Revolution starts off Independence Day, and since this is Mexico's bicentennial, this Grito was especially important.

But we just couldn't go. In the middle of the previous night, our teammate, Phil Raiford, called us be-

cause he had taken his wife, Eunice, 29 weeks pregnant, to the hospital. She needed an emergency C-section because of preeclampsia. Robert and Phil trailed the ambulance carrying little Taylor, weighing 750 grams (1.65 lbs.), to a children's hospital in a nearby town. No one was expecting Taylor to survive. Robert and Phil spent the day in the waiting room of the children's hospital while Eunice, miles away, recuperated. People all over Mexico were celebrating, but we waited grimly for updates on Taylor.

Yet, in this time of distress, God has given us another birth.

Samuel, a leader in our church here in Oaxaca and a disciple of ours, has



helped birth a new church in his home. This past Sunday we filled our cars with people and went out to one of the few rivers that is not brown and dangerous with all these hurricane rains, and we watched Samuel and his brother baptize three family members. As the newly baptized believers came out of the river, appropriately, it started to rain.

The men of the family had strung up tarps, and standing under them, soaked, we hurriedly shared a “common meal” of chicken in salsa, joking about our common “rebaptism,” while the rain poured down over and around us. Also appropriate, after this, Samuel’s family went home to celebrate the Lord’s Supper together for the first time, a seal on their decision to be the church in their home.

One of our goals as a congregation has been to explore how “church” can be any group of people covenanting together to obey Jesus out of love. They don’t have to have a building, or a professional preacher, or a certain number of people. As Samuel’s extended family has responded to God and brought in new

believers, he helped them form a church in their own home, reaching an entirely different network than our own. He was able to pass on to them the things we had taught and shown him, with simple obedience and trust.

We give thanks to God for the birth of this new, already growing baby church even while we grieve over Taylor’s precarious condition (hanging in for a week now). Celebrations and grief mingle in this contradictory week.

Thanks for praying for us, and our team, and the churches where we work. Blessings to you,
