
MEANINGFUL NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS

Dime Box Brethren Church 100-Year Anniversary Celebration of the Building of the Church

The Dime Box Brethren Church celebrated the 100-year anniversary of the building of the first church in the Hranice community in 1911 on November 26, 2011, at the third Brethren Church building located on FM 141. A rededication service was held in the sanctuary. Past ministers Henry Beseda and Dell Miller addressed the group, as did the President of the Unity, James Marek. A brief history of the church was given by Jean Blaha Davis, and then the audience was asked for their thoughts and comments. Families identified as having their ancestors involved in building all three churches were recognized. They were Balcar, Blaha, Marek, Kubena, and Krenek. After the service, a catered dinner followed in the fellowship hall, where a pictorial display of all of the churches was available for all to look at, as well as the Christian Sisters scrap book and the Dime Box Museum Brethren Church history.

The history of this church begins in 1894 when Rev. Adolph Chlumsky visited the area for the first time and started organizing the Protestant families at Hranice. He was successful, even though he was able to come only a few times each year. Some families went to Ross Prairie Church in Fayetteville to be baptized or married. After the Hranice School was built, church functions and services were held in the schoolhouse alternately with the Catholic services. The first confirmation class was held in 1900. In September of 1902 the choir began to practice singing, with Chlumsky as the leader and playing the organ. Later the local organists were Fannie Balcar and Vlasta Balcar.

The congregation began to grow and the need for a new separate building soon became evident, and the new minister, Rev. Joe Barton, led this effort. The first Czech Moravian Brethren Church at Hranice was built



by local members who donated their time, but carpenters from Temple, Josef Hunka, John Hunka, Charles Kalenda, and Charles Mikus, were hired to help. Josef Blaha and Vinc Balcar donated the very large cast iron bell, which had their names inscribed in relief. Dedication services were on September 22, 1911, with the congregation walking from the Hranice schoolhouse to the new church building; Albina Balcar presented a recital in Czech and the key to Rev. Adolph Chlumsky to open the doors of the new building.

Eleven years later, on April 4, 1922, a tornado turned the building over during the night and destroyed it. The congregation, with Minister Rev. Frank Horak, began plans immediately to build another church at the same site. John Maresh from Deanville was the carpenter in charge, with the members helping again. This church was dedicated in 1924, with Mary Kubena giving the recital and pre-

senting the key to Rev. Frank Horak Sr. to open the door.

On July 30, 1954, this second church building was struck by lightning and was completely destroyed by fire. The organ and other items were saved through the windows. Rev. Henry Beseda Sr. was the minister, and under his guidance the congregation gathered together for the third time. The third church building was started at a new location on a 2-acre tract north of Dime Box on land donated by Leonard & Millie Mikulin. Ed Peters was the carpenter in charge, and the members again donated their time. This church was dedicated on May 29, 1955, with Rev. Albert Michalik officiating. The president of the Church, Ed Krenek, gave the key to Rev. Michalik to open the door to the third new building. Two years later a Fellowship Building was built on land behind the church and dedicated on May 4, 1958. Thanks to God, both of these buildings are still there.



Ministers who have served this church were Rev. Adolph Chlumsky, Rev. Joseph Barton Sr., Rev Josef Hegar, Rev. Frank Horak Sr., Rev. Henry Beseda Sr., Rev. Henry Beseda Jr., Rev. Dan Marek, Rev. Jesse Skrivanek as reserve pastorate, Rev. Albert Michalik, Rev. Dan Marek, Rev. Richard Stone, Dan Husak, Rev. Del Miller, and now Rev. Jim Heckman. There were Czech services by Rev. Frank Svoboda, Rev. Josef Barton, Rev. Frank Kostohryz, Rev. Josef Barton Jr., and Rev. Henry Beseda Sr. The services in Czech were discontinued in 1968.

Early families were Krenek, Blaha, Simek, Balcar, Kubena, Ripple, Kutej, Turecek, Matejcek, Marek, Cottrell, Hejtmancik, Pertl, Schumann, and Pecena. Burleson County was represented by Jakubik, Kaiser, Luksa, Dancak, Holubec, Horak, Dlabay, Pohorelsky, Sebesta, Jancik, Lomica, Jaap, Maresh, Kovar, Marek, and Skrivanek.

Later members were Vavra, Urbanovsky, Schwierzke, Nimtz, Hajdik, Goodson, Spitzenberger, Spacek, Bridges, Kovar, Allen, Marburger, Mikulin, Fillip, Juroska, Grundman, Buchan, Becvar, Beason, Brinkman, Chernosky, Cottrell, Davis, Dobos, Dodd, Fegan, Freeman, Hartfield, Higgins, Hogan,, Maluschka, Mason, Massey, Mayer, Riske, Westbrook, Jurchak, McClellan, Parsons, Strom, Sharp, Miller, and Weaver, with Burleson County represented by Luedke, Schumacher, Polasek, and Ondrasek.

The Ladies Aid Club was organized by Rev. Frank Horak Sr. on October 26, 1926, with 18 charter members, and it is still in existence today.

In 1987, Dan and Bethel Blaha retrieved pieces of the original bell used in the first and second churches. It fell during the fire and was partially buried in the ground at the original site. The remaining pieces were brought to the location of the third church and reconstructed and are on display.

The size of the congregation has diminished in the last few decades with movement of the younger people to the cities, but the Church is still alive and active, and will be as long as we have good and reliable members and a minister who is willing to serve our group.

Fayetteville Brethren Re-Dedicate Historic Church Cemetery



The Fayetteville Brethren Church re-dedicated their historic church cemetery on Sunday, October 30, 2011. In the fall of 2010, a lot of work was done in the cemetery by church members to try to reduce some of the maintenance required in keeping the cemetery looking nice. Over 100 graves were lined with tar paper and covered with gravel. Several unknown graves were marked with "Unknown" markers purchased that also had inscribed on them a Czech phrase "Zde odpociva v Panu Zesnula" which means "Here rests in God the deceased." This phrase is on many of the tombstones in the cemetery.

The welcome was given by Joe Ripple, President of the Board of Elders. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Ann and Milton Heintschel. The opening prayer was given by Jerry Dove. A history of the cemetery was given by Liz Ripple.

Leander Minar, caretaker of the

cemetery and church grounds for 12 years, was presented a plaque by Kathy Voshalike in appreciation of the loving and attentive care he showed for the cemetery. Mr. Minar is not a member of this church, but he does have relatives buried in the church cemetery. He and his wife, Ann, worked many long hours making sure everything looked just right.

The Act of Dedication was led by Tom Kubena. This was followed by the reading of all the names of those buried in the church cemetery by Liz Ripple, Tom Kubena, Margaret Michalsky, and Kathy Voshalike. The closing prayer was given by Ray Stepan. Everyone then enjoyed refreshments of sandwiches, chips, cookies, tea, and coffee.

The area around the church is known as Ross Prairie, named so for James J. Ross, a member of the "old 300" who was an important figure during the



early years of settlement in this area. The church is still fondly called Ross Prairie Church, or the CMB Church (Czech Moravian Brethren).

The land for the church and cemetery was donated by Thomas and Katerina Jecmenek in 1874. The church was built in 1874 and the cemetery is behind the church. The oldest grave in the cemetery is that of Katerina Jecmenek, who died on November 17, 1875, at the age of 25. There are approximately 300 known graves and several unknown graves. Rev. Henry Juren, longest serving pastor of the church (some 45 years), is buried in the cemetery, as well several World War I and World War II veterans. There is also one Civil War veteran. Jan Hruska, who is buried there. Some European birthplaces found on the tombstones include villages from Bohemia and Moravia such as Cermna, Vsetin, Jablunka, Jasenka, Lipa, Ratibor, and Ruzdka.

In October 1999 the cemetery was

listed as an Official Historic Texas Cemetery. A medallion and marker was erected in 2002. On some tombstones are the initials CSPS or SPJST. These were Czech fraternal insurance organizations: Cesko-Slovensky Podporujici Spolek and Slovanska Podporujici Jednota Statu Texas (Slavonic Benevolent Order of the State of Texas). Many of the inscriptions on the tombstones are in Czech. A few of the tombstones have interesting epitaphs that read like poems. One is on J. W. Jecmenek's: "His words were kindness, his deeds were love, his spirit humble, he rests above. Not lost blest thought but gone before where we shall meet to part no more." Also on Emmett J. Blinker's: "Death is but to sleep in Jesus. When this life is o'er, and to sorrows, sins, diseases, never to awaken more." And on Leslie O. Hruska's, who was 10 when he died: "Beautiful, Lovely, He was but given, a fair bud to earth to blossom in heaven."

From the Thiessens . . .

A "Normal Thanksgiving"

On Thursday we will celebrate Thanksgiving with a full house of at least 16 people. The turkey is already thawing in the fridge, and everything else will be brought by our friends. This year, though, Anne and the kids will be the only Americans! It's a complicated story, and we certainly aren't trying to get Mexicans to take up American cultural events. This evolved over the past seven years (that's how long we've been in Oaxaca City), as each year the celebration came to include mixed couples (one American, one Mexican) and displaced Mexican friends (from other parts of the country). Well, this year, all the other Americans are no longer around, but we have this network of friends that have gotten used to doing something at this time, so we're going ahead anyway.

We are thankful for many gifts God is giving us, and whether we celebrate with Canadians back in October or now with Mexicans for the American holiday, or with Mixtecs in December, we can never have too many opportunities to "return thanks". Our life has been fairly normal for the last while, things going along more or less as planned, no "big" events that immediately lend themselves to a stirring letter to you all. Nevertheless, there is much to be grateful for, and I

want to highlight a few of those for you.

First of all, normalcy itself means at least that we are safe, in a country increasingly in the news for violence of all sorts. Just Saturday, as I was returning home, the road was blocked by all kinds

of police and soldiers. Turns out that a few minutes earlier there had been a confrontation between drug dealers and the state police, leaving two dead, one from each group. We rarely get to see this sort of problem that close, and in general we have no real contact with what you all read about.

Next, there are at least three groups of Mexican missionaries that we are able to help mobilize, refine, and coach. One is the group that had the wedding, written about by RuthE last month. Another is a denomination of more than 2000 churches throughout this country where some of their main leaders are working hard to raise awareness of cross-cultural missions. Anne has already taught among them several times, and I joined her two weeks ago to help with one session. It can seem slow at times, but there are signs of movement. They are very aware of the needs of the unreached indigenous people of Mexico, and are planning on sending missionaries there first. We are privileged to help shape some of that awareness, and hopefully their way of responding. A third is a group in Baja California, where Anne and I will be leading workshops during a January missions conference that is expecting 500 participants.

And, not least, we are thankful for all of you, our network of supporters, who pray and care and give. Your love is a gift to us, and we are keenly aware that you are an integral part of God sustaining us in Mexico.

There are many more blessings to be thankful for, of course.

Merry Christmas! We have been back in Target City for 2 weeks now and are getting back into life here with 4 boys! Isaac is doing well, and is now smiling at 7 weeks old. His older brothers love him and often hold him and kiss him.

May has shared with us about the training she held while we were gone, but it seems we are still learning what happened as more and more information comes out. We praise the Lord that she led a two-day training, with about 11 people attending. She had 4 more come and help with cooking the food. They sang and prayed and studied the Man of the Tombs story, a Creation to Church story, how to give a personal testimony, and some

teaching about the Holy Spirit. Many of the believers had never heard about the power that is available to us through the Holy Spirit. On the second day of the training they went out in two groups to share with people in the market. It was the first time for many of them to share with others.

Since then, she has been leading a fellowship group on Sunday night as a substitute teacher for another lady who leads this group in Burmese. Two of the women who attend this group are Dai, and we are praying that they, too, can get a vision for their own people. We praise God that May has grown so much. amazing what the Holy Spirit can do! Lord, may the training go deep into the hearts of those who came. Give them spiritual boldness!

Our next step is for May to start one to two small fellowship groups. She already has an idea of where to do this. She would lead these groups in a very simple format where onethird of the time is worship and pastoral care, one-third of the time is sharing a new story from the Book orally, and one-third is sort of a now what are you going to do about what you have learned time. The goal is that during the last one-third every person in the group can think of people they want to share with and so they can also go out and start their own groups. When they start their new group, they can just copy the easy format they have been shown. We are keeping it very simple so others can teach others and they can teach others and on and on until the entire Dai nation and beyond can hear the Good News!

Last Wednesday, Michael and our teammate, and May and her husband all went across the border to a Kachin refugee camp. This camp had 2000 Kachin people living in it. There are a total of 14,000 Kachin that have run from their northern Kachin state of the country beside us. Six months ago, the military of that country started fighting the Kachin. There are horrific stories about rape, murder, and torture. We have learned of their needs and are praying for them and getting the word out about how we can help these people. Most of the Kachin people are Christians.
