

President's Column . . . James Marek Years of Benevolence


The month of May has historically been designated as the month of the

year when we remember the Mutual Aid Society, the oldest benevolent organization of the Unity of the Brethren. With this thought in mind, it was timely when I recently came across a small gold booklet in our church library entitled Fifty Years



began to read it. I was struck by the faith of the founders, the modest beginnings, the increase in membership and financial resources year after year, and the glowing predictions for the future of the Mutual Aid Society. The booklet chronicled the first 50 years of the Mutual Aid Society with convention minute summaries, sermon excerpts, testimonials, and organizational statistics about this Brethren benevolent organization.

The Mutual Aid Society began in Shiner in 1905 with just 30 members.



of birth of the Mutual Aid Society because of the excitement it created among the early Brethren. When Rev. Adolf Chlumsky first shared the idea of a benevolent organization of Brethren, for Brethren, enthusiasm was high. People rushed to join even before the bylaws were

It is interesting to read the accounts

read. Throughout the next 50 years, membership and financial resources grew at almost an exponential rate. The Mutual Aid Society began with 30 members and a treasury of \$187.80. By 1956 there were 1293 members and the assets had grown to \$98,988.82. To read the commemorative booklet, one gets the impression that the success of the organization was attributable to a genuine Christian love for one another. The Mutual Aid Society's motto, taken from Galatians 6:2, "Bear Ye One Another's Burdens and thus fulfill the laws of Christ," was not →

only a scriptural mandate for members, but the manifestation of a genuine concern for each other. The Mutual Aid Society became an opportunity for members to communicate their concern for their neighbor through a tangible action for good. During those early days most people did not have much in the way of material goods, but they understood what it meant to help their neighbor (and to be helped) through tough times. The Mutual Aid Society was a great way to not only help their neighbor, but to exercise their faith through stewardship.

The success of the Mutual Aid Society was built on a solid scriptural foundation, and although the membership gains once enjoyed by the organization have now been reversed, the organization's purpose remains relevant and important. While much has changed since 1905, the mission of the Mutual Aid Society has remained focused on Christian love and concern – specifically towards Brethren.

A quote from the late Rev. Joseph Barton sums up the service and purpose of the Mutual Aid Society. He said, "It has wiped away many tears and has extended brotherly sympathy and help when it was most needed." Originally, this help came through a monetary support for the families of deceased members. Later, the Mutual Aid began helping Brethren congregations finance various building programs, and most recently The Mutual Aid Society has begun offering scholarships for college students.

The good done through The Mutual Aid Society throughout its existence is unchallenged, but the organization still faces challenges. One of the largest challenges the Mutual Aid Society faces today typically comes in the form of the implicit question, "What's in it for me?" Many confuse the Mutual Aid Society with a Life Insurance Company. Members join not for what they will get, but for what they will give. Members of the Mutual Aid Society are affirming their concern for other Brethren and making an investment in the Unity of the Brethren as a whole by seeking to ensure that the work of the Unity in God's kingdom here on earth continues. The Mutual Aid Society is a stewardship opportunity and a tangible way of fostering hope in the future of this denomination.

If you are a member of the Mutual Aid Society, encourage someone else in your church to join.

...In All Things, LOVE

Luke 10:2 (NET) - He said to them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out workers into His harvest."

Just over two years ago, I received an e-mail from a gentleman in southeast Texas who had recently read a few of my devotionals. I will never forget Robert's very first question: "Do you think there is any hope for someone like me?"

I responded by telling him that there was indeed hope for each and every one of us because of Jesus Christ!

I continued communicating with Robert and learned some rather disturbing things. It was not Robert who disturbed me. What disturbed me was how people who considered themselves Christians treated him.

As a young man, Robert had been told by someone in his church that there was simply "no hope for someone like him." Robert took this to heart and walked away from church intending never to look back. As the decades passed, Robert felt God's


continual tugging at him to return to church, and he wanted to respond. Unfortunately, those he encountered along the way also treated him harshly. In Robert's words, some had "a mean streak a mile wide" and "did their level best to demean people."

His choice of words was strong, but through them I realized that Robert was still feeling a great deal of personal pain. To be completely honest, I could actually relate to some of what Robert was feeling.

I once belonged to a social network for Christians. The experience was uplifting most of the time. Unintended consequences arose simply because of differing viewpoints held by various denominations. I recall one particularly heated exchange that arose over one of the sacraments.

Someone new to the faith asked about the significance of this sacra-

ment. What began as a simple discussion in response to someone's honest question soon turned into a very heated debate. Individual comments grew ever longer and the language became stronger. I found this to be an increasingly sad situation because more emphasis was being placed on the mechanics of the sacrament rather than on what the sacrament actually represented. Compounding this sadness was an overwhelming feeling that new believers were being given an incorrect impression of what it means to be a follower of Christ.

At that point, I chose to simply walk away from the discussion. One of the more vocal participants began sending me private messages trying to draw me back into the fray. These messages became more and more aggressive and eventually included challenges as to the validity of my faith.

During this time, I was extremely glad to be a member of the Brethren Church, as the words of our motto rang with unmistakable clarity.

"In essentials, UNITY, In non-essentials, LIBERTY,

In all things, LOVE."

All of this strife and division simply because of differing methods employed in a nonessential. It is important to note that the words "nonessential" and "unimportant" are not equally interchangeable, and there is an almost overwhelming human tendency to do just that. As long as the true meaning of the sacrament is not diminished, the methods that are employed can, do, and will continue to vary.

Our motto also greatly assisted me in helping Robert.

I knew that what was "essential"

for Robert was for him to have a relationship with God. A relationship that was only possible through Jesus Christ.

I suggested a Bible reading schedule to Robert that began with the book of John followed by the other gospels, and I responded to his every question, which were often accompanied by "Let me know if you want me to stop bothering you."

A year ago, Robert found a church home in his town, became a member, and was baptized.

Today, he attends that church with his two granddaughters. He also attends Sunday school and Bible study. Robert now brings others to Jesus and hopes to eventually lead a Bible study himself.

I am not sure who initially told Robert that he was without hope, nor do I know what position, if any, that person held. But to say that one is without hope does more than discourage the individual, it attempts to place limits on God, who has none.

Robert and I still communicate, though not nearly as frequently as we once did. I do miss his daily questions, but I know that he is in excellent hands even though his church in all probability chooses to do some things differently than we choose to do them.

The book of Luke reminds us that there is a vast harvest but few workers. I believe that we, as Brethren, are in a unique and excellent position to help with that harvest. There are a great many Roberts still out there, Roberts who have felt the sting of human criticism, Roberts who desperately need the essentials, Roberts who need our love.


CONVENTION YEAR

This year is a Unity Convention year. By now you should all have received an invitation to the 65th Biennial Unity of the Brethren Convention that will be held at the Taylor Brethren Church on July 18, 19, and 20. I hope many of you are making plans to attend this convention. It is a wonderful time to enjoy fellowship with our fellow Brethren, to renew friendships and an opportunity to make new ones. If you are not serving your church as a representative, delegate, or pastor, you are still very welcome to attend as a guest. The theme of this year's convention is "Faith in Action", with the Bible verse taken from James 2:26, "As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead."

In looking at the history of past conventions, I found some notes that you may find interesting. Though this year is the 65th convention, there have been a total of 67 conventions. The first convention was held in 1903, December 23-24 at the Granger Brethren Church. This convention was organized by Rev. Henry Juren, who was elected the first President to the Synodical Committee.

The conventions were held annually until 1921, when they then became biennial. There were only 2 special conventions ever held, one in 1919 and another in 1964. The church that has hosted the most conventions is Taylor Brethren, who has been the host 11 times (including this year). The other churches hosting a convention (with how many times listed) are: Granger (7), Nelsonville (5), New Tabor (5), Temple (5), West (5), Caldwell (4), Snook (4), Crosby (3), Ocker (3), Seaton (3), Fayetteville



(2), Rosenberg (2), Shiner (2), Wall (2), Dallas (1), Dime Box (1), and Houston (1). One of the Special Conventions was held at the Hus Encampment.

Not all churches have adequate space or enough help to host a convention, so I do appreciate those that are willing to be a host. It takes a lot of work, time, and dedication of many people. Times have changed since that first convention, and we can be more comfortable with modern modes of travel, indoor plumbing, air conditioning, and all the electronic devices, and probably a few more women now attend than in years past. But one thing probably has not changed, and that is the passion and commitment of those who serve today – the pastors, the representatives, the delegates,

the missionaries, and everyone who takes a part in serving our Lord in some way. I pray that this sense of duty burns in all our hearts to make our denomination worthy of our time and something that will last many more years to come.

For me, the Convention is always an exciting time. I enjoy meeting new people and the fellowship that it offers through worship and meal time. It also gives us as a denomination a time to revive, inspire, and make changes where needed. I ask each of you to keep the 2013 Convention in your prayers. Those of us who are there will greatly need God's guidance during our deliberations. Your prayer support will greatly benefit the meeting and its work, regardless of whether you attend or not.

From the Woo's...

Dear Partners in the Work,

Happy Resurrection Day, as we say over here! We left freezing Boston over a month ago, 30 hours later we arrived in hot Thailand. While in Thailand we applied for our Chinese visa and got a 6-month tourist visa. This is a praise as we were expecting to only get a 3-month visa. We also give praise and thanks that we are defnitely 100% supported now!

Visa - Our teammates just switched their visas over to a work visa. It took them about a year to process the whole thing, raise the money needed, and get through all the red tape. We are not so interested in going through all that process, but are willing. So we ask that He provide a visa for us in the next 6 months. We will still try to do the worm composting even if it is not our visa. Lord we ask that by the end of these 6 months vou would have led the Woos to a great year-long visa!

Apartment – Now that we are back in China, we made it out to Target City

where we live. Within a week and a half, we found a new apartment and moved in. We have been in our new place for over two weeks. It's still a wreck, but it's slowly becoming home. We have a great landlord, a first floor, a nice place for the kids to play, cheaper rent, but a larger apartment. We have also been reconnecting with local Dai friends, our teammates, and food. We give praise to Him and thanks to you for praying for this. It truly was of the Lord that we found this apartment.

Kids – We have also been able to put Samuel and Ian into the local elementary school. Everything is in Chinese as no one speaks English over here. Their Chinese is slowly coming back. Zach started Kindergarten. He is at level zero in Chinese and we hope he can pick some up. Lord, help the boys adjust back to speaking Chinese. Help them to make friends at school and protect them in the Name of Jesus. Protect us on the road, Lord, as driving on the road is the most dangerous thing we do.

May and her son have been helping us in our home for a week now.

She brings her son, Jonathan. He is 3 months older than Isaac. It's funny, but more stressful than funny. Isaac and Jonathan tend to push and grab each other with one of them always crying. Jonathan tends to bite our boys. That is the stressful part. The funny part is that if I put them at opposite parts of the house, each with their own fun toy, it takes less than a minute for them to be side by side again, fighting over the toy the other one has. Lord, help Isaac and Jonathan learn how to play together or by themselves. Help us to find time to pray and train May with these two babies around. Help Jonathan and us to get used to each other with no

biting! May and her husband are our number one priority for ministry right now. She is sharing with us about the pressures of family, and money being a big part of it. Her step-mother told May that she was no longer a part of their family because she doesn't have any money to give them. As a result, May had tried to prove herself to her family by making more money. But this has only resulted in more problems and sin. One of our teammate's neighbors said to them the other day that all she wants is "money, money, money". Worldly pressure can be hard to resist, and in this area MONEY is definitely a powerful force and a god.

May's husband – We did get to visit with May's husband for about 30 minutes. His heart seems so; and he is so willing to thank and praise the Lord. It was a quick visit so we told him two things. One, he needs to pray with May every day. Two, he needs to use the Name of Jesus, out loud, a lot. That same day he drove his taxi up north and hit a Dai woman with his car. Many of you got an email about this. Thank you for praying. May went up and was able to talk to the woman and 5 of her family members. She told them that God could heal the woman's wounds, and asked if she could pray. They said yes. But first she explained which God she was going to pray to. She shared the entire story starting with creation, how we are sinners, how God loved us and sent His son. They had never heard of this story before. We praise God that he heard YOUR pravers and May got to share the gospel to people that have never heard. Lord may you →

truly heal this woman and help this family and village and entire area come to know you. Lord we also pray Jesus will cut off any generational sin and break the cycle of abuse and gambling in May and her husband's relationship and bring forth forgiveness and healing.

Timothy – Today Timothy came across the border to visit with us. This is our first time seeing him since we have been back. He stayed about 6 hours with us. If you remember, he is the young pastor that we have trained in our method that is so busy taking care of about 20 kindergarten kids their church has, and then taking care of the old widows, that he has no time for anything else. I reminded him of the story of Stephen in Acts and how the apostles were so busy with the kids and old people that they had no time to go out and share the gospel. So they prayed and God set apart Stephen to do this work. And yet it also says that Stephen did many miracles and also shared, that's why he got stoned. I asked Timothy if he had freedom to do anything he wanted to do, which work would he do, what Stephen did, or going out and only teaching and sharing the good news like the apostles? He picked the apostles! The Lord is raising up Timothy to be an evangelist for his own Dai people! Lord Jesus, raise Timothy and others up to do this work. Send them forth into the 7 million Dai that have never heard your name! Fill Timothy with your power, your vision, and incredible faith!

Outreach – We talked with Timothy and May about possibly doing an outreach at the end of this month. They are praying about it and we are seriously thinking about how to get the gospel out to hundreds and maybe thousands during an up and coming festival. Lord Jesus, as our sister and brother think about this outreach, would you prepare the way and raise up others to help them. May the Word go out to hundreds and even thousands! Lord, make your Name known among the Dai. Lord, bring many into your kingdom!

We also see the task before us as a doable task. Before we thought "How in the world do we reach 7 million Shan Dai? That's impossible, but I'll try to do my little part."

But now we think "It's doable. Jesus just has to pour out His Spirit while we do our tiny part. It's so possible, especially if we pray!"

Thank you for all your prayers and love toward us. Again, we had such an AMAZING time in the USA. Thanks to all of you!

Use this demonstration to show Overflowing Joy! This activity is great for all age levels!

Prepare 5 paper cups as instructed below.
 Cup 1: Write *Pray* on cup and fill with 1/8 cup water.
 Cup 2: Write *Believe* on cup and fill with 1/8 cup water.
 Cup 3: Write *Bible* on cup and fill with 1/8 cup water.
 Cup 4: Write *Problems and Troubles* and fill with ½ cup vinegar.

Cup 5: Write *Holy Spirit* and add 1 teaspoon baking soda.

- Satan tries to steal our joy. Show a clear glass (approximately 12 oz.). This glass is your life (set in a pie plate to catch the mess). Fill the glass approximately ½ full with water. This is to represent God washing away your sins.
- 3. Sometimes Problems and Troubles come along. In this cup vinegar. Vinegar is an acid. It is sour. But vinegar also adds flavor. Pickles would not be near as good without vinegar! God uses our problems and troubles to teach us to rely on Him. (Add the Vinegar to the "Life" glass.)




