As we welcome a New Year, it is common to look forward with expec-

tation, the anticipation of something new and the hope for good things to come in the New Year. These very emotions are held by some members of the recently formed Unity Website Committee in connection with the new Unity website. The com-

mittee has been working on a total redesign of the Unity website and is pleased to formally announce its completion and launch.

The new site replaces the only website the Unity has ever had. The previous site has served the Unity substantially in the same form for almost 15 years. The entire time, the Unity website has been managed by Mr. Ben Polasek, who has served as the Webmaster faithfully and admirably.

Between the April and October Synodical Committee meetings this year, the executive committee decided to move forward with plans to completely redo the unity website (www.unityofthebrethren.org). A



website committee was formed and bids were sought from professional web design companies. The executive committee authorized the expense of \$2,000 to accomplish this work. Spider Monkey Marketing was selected and worked closely

with the committee for several months to develop the layout and design of the new site. The web address www.unityofthebrethren.com was purchased, and this address was used to house the new site while it was under construction. The Unity now owns both web addresses and may use them for future development.

The new site is built to house all of the information of the original site and allow for future growth, development and flexibility. One of the new pages that have been added is one that will house Brethren pastoral records. The intention is that these



Giving a child money to put into an offering plate does not produce a generous adult. If you want to produce a generous adult, you must train a child to tithe from any money he or she receives from family, friends, or work projects. This child will grow up to honor God.

Second Thoughts - by Jim Pokorny

I have always been fond of seconds...and I am not just talking about those that come with home-cooked meals. Instead, I am talking about those that came along second in history. Those whose contributions were, for the most part, ignored or forgotten simply due to the fact that they were not first.

For example, if I asked who the first man to walk on the moon was, a good many people could correctly tell me that it was Neil Armstrong. If I asked who the second was, it is much less likely that people could tell me that it was in fact Edwin 'Buzz' Aldrin.

Both endured the same training. Both accepted identical risks. Both made the same historic journey in July 1969. Yet Buzz Aldrin is more easily forgotten simply because he descended the ladder from the lunar landing module to the surface of the moon a few moments after Neil Armstrong did.

The same holds true when it comes to church history. If I asked who Jan Hus was, it is safe to say that a good many people in the Unity of the Brethren would be able to tell me something about Hus, his life and his martyrdom.

If I then asked who Peter Chelcicky (Peter of Chelcic) was, I think it is quite safe to say that very few people could tell me anything at all about him. To be honest, until recently I would not have been able to tell you anything at all about him.

Before discussing Peter Chelcicky at length, it is necessary to look at what happened during the period immediately following the martyrdom of Jan Hus on July 6, 1415.

As the news of Hus's martyrdom spread across the land, many people felt that a just man was unjustly executed.

While Hus lived and preached he had the loyalty of the people. Once the great voice was silenced the movement began to fracture along ideological lines. Some continued to see Hus as Catholic. Others saw him as a Protestant. Some viewed him as a patriot. Others saw him as a champion of church reform. Some saw him as a great moral teacher. Others saw him

as an enemy of the Papacy.

Without Hus, the people lacked unity. There was no unified vision or concept of what was most needed. Thus, the movement that began to gather momentum under Hus stagnated and fractured into a varied collection of sects and parties. Whatever order existed gave way. Years of chaos and confusion followed Hus's death.

One of the groups that emerged in the aftermath was the Utraquists, or Calixtines. While confined to his dungeon at Constance. Hus wrote that laymen should be allowed to take wine with Communion and the Utraguists rallied around this cause. They prominently displayed the Cup on their banners and made this their primary goal.

Then there were the Taborites. who built their fortress on Mount Tabor. They rejected the concepts of purgatory and the worship of saints. They held to the concept that every man had the right to interpret scripture for himself. Some of their beliefs were more radical. Their suppression of the Pikarts, the reforms introduced by Taborite priests and the enforcement of those reforms by Jan Zizka frightened the Utraquists.


The Chiliasts were another group. They believed the end was near and that the millennial reign of Christ was about to begin. For years they believed that they were to be the instrument of Divine retribution. They awaited their call from heaven to fulfill that role. That call. of course. never came

Then there were the Adamites. who thought it best to live and dress like Adam and Eve prior to the fall. Their headquarters was on an island in the River Nesarka. A small remnant survived even after Zizka destroyed the camp.

Then there were the Waldenses. Early on, their views appeared to be Catholic, but as the Hussite Wars went on, they became more influenced by the Taborites. As time went by, a story circulated that the Emperor made a "donation" to Pope Sylvester. At this, the Waldenses determined that the Church of Rome had morally corrupted itself and had thus, in a manner of speaking, forfeited the Keys to the Kingdom.

These descriptions, although brief, illustrate just how desperate the need for unity had become.

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The confusion of the age was bad enough, but it paled in comparison to what emerged when the chaos of war was thrown into the mix. The legendary general Jan Zizka came to lead the Taborite army. Zizka's forces swept through the land from one end to the other like a scythe through wheat.

Zizka may have been a military genius, but military genius was not what was most needed. This became readily apparent when Zizka became ill and died of fever.

In spite of the chaos and confusion, something of the movement led by Hus still survived. From out of these circumstances the Moravian Church would arise. What was needed most was a second man; a second voice willing to deliver an unmistakable message. That second man was Peter Chelcicky.

Little real knowledge of the life of Chelcicky has survived the centuries. We do not know exactly when he lived, but according to Craig D. Atwood, he was born about 1380 and died around 1458. Though little is known about the man, the books he wrote survived and are considered treasures of Czech literature.

Chelcicky was neither Taborite nor

Utraquist. He was neither priest nor professor. As such, he was an original thinker. He was either upper peasantry or lower nobility and, as such, he was prosperous enough to pursue education and writing.

Chelcicky studied the writings of both Hus and Wycliffe. As he was not a priest, he was not constrained by the Church of Rome. He wrote not in Latin but in the native language of the people. He observed the ills of his day and found fault in both government and religion. Through his writings we know that he felt that each was hopelessly corrupt. He examined the system of classes and declared that this was merely another caste system.

He looked at the various sects and parties that emerged after Hus. Chelcicky concluded that none was truly in the right nor was one truly in line with the spirit of Christ.

In 1419 Jan Zizka and Nicholas of Husinec stated at Prague that it was time for the faithful to take up arms. Chelcicky was present and erupted, "What is war? It is the breech of all laws of God! All soldiers are violent men, murderers, a godless mob!"

Chelcicky was without doubt a

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pacifist. He considered the Hussite Wars a disgrace to both sides. As Zizka's forces swept through the land, Chelcicky was horror stricken. In his *Reply to Rokycana* he asked if the commandments regarding killing and stealing had been repealed.

Regarding state and church, he concluded that any law made by government as well as any edict made by the church was spoiling the teaching of Christ. Chelcicky believed that the teaching of Christ was not only sufficient, it was final. He admitted that God might use the government for good purposes; therefore, Christians must submit to the government, but the relationship must end there.

In Chelcicky's view, a Christian should never hold office. He went even further by declaring that Christians should try to live in the country rather than in a town. Chelcicky believed that for an unbeliever the state was a necessary evil. For a Christian, however, it was unclean and should be avoided at all costs. As evidence, Chelcicky offered that the murderer Cain founded the first town.

If Chelcicky viewed the state with contempt, he viewed the church with scorn. He called out the vices, the superstitions and the immoralities of its leaders. He declared that these leaders were not feeding the Church of God. Instead, they were starving it to death. His criticisms of the church were as numerous as they were biting.

For all the ills of his day, Chelcicky offered one simple remedy. Return to the original church and the simple teachings of Christ and the disciples.

(Author's Note: I have seen this referred to as a return to the "primitive church". That is a term I personally do not care for. For me the word "primitive" carries with it a somewhat negative connotation. In this context, I prefer to use "original church" in its place.)

Unlike Wycliffe, Chelcicky did not reason out his arguments. Chelcicky relied solely on the integrity of his message. Though radical in some of his views, he held to fundamental beliefs within the Christian faith. He believed that redemption was made possible by Christ's death on the cross. He believed that the hope of mankind depended not on works, but on the grace of God. He also believed that Christ was present during Communion.

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Eventually, the Utraquists and the Pope reached a compromise known as the "Compacts of Basel". The Pope recognized the Utraquist Church as the national self-governing church in the land. With this compromise, the Utraquists gained one thing and one thing only, they would be allowed to take wine with Communion. With this alliance, the fate of the Taborites was sealed. The Taborites were routed and crushed.

Some experts have concluded that Chelcicky's writing lacked polish. Net of Faith was one of his final works. In it he repudiated the "Compacts of Basel". The title was based on a parable of Jesus in Luke 5:1-11. Chelcicky explained his title this way: "Through His disciples, Christ caught the world in the net of His faith, but the bigger fishes, breaking the net, escaped. Then others followed through these same holes made by the bigger fishes, and the net was left almost empty." Polished or not, in his day the meaning was crystal clear. The net was the true Church of Christ. The bigger fishes who broke the net and escaped it were the Emperor and the Pope. The big fishes who escaped after them were the "powerful" and

the "learned". The little fish that remained were the true followers of Christ.

Toward the end, Chelcicky became the spiritual leader of a small band of like-minded believers near his home. He declined to organize them into a church.

Chelcicky's view of the world was anything but optimistic, but one must take into account the times in which he lived. When viewed in their historical context, this second man had fulfilled his purpose. His was the second voice, and with it he delivered his message.

Craig D. Atwood in The Theology of the Czech Brethren from Hus to Comenius said this of Chelcicky: "His importance lay in his critique of the church and society rather than leadership. In many ways he offered a pessimistic view of the world and of the institutional church, but his writings served as a major theological resource for the Unity of the Brethren for more than half a century. Even after the Brethren put Chelcicky's treatises aside, his influence remained woven into the fabric of the Unity. The Brethren tried to combine Chelcicky's integrity with a stable

institutional structure. In doing so, they offered a new understanding of the church that prefigured modern developments."

J. E. Hutton in *A History of the Moravian Church* said this of Chelcicky: "He delivered his message; he showed the way; he flashed his lantern in the darkness; and thus, whether he knew it or not, he was the literary founder of the Brethrens' Church. He fired the hope. He drew the plans. It was left to another man to erect the building."

As we draw ever nearer to the 600th Anniversary of the Martyrdom of Jan Hus, we will find ways to commemorate both his life and his willingness to travel the path on which God placed him.

that we are in a position to do so only because others also willingly followed the paths on which God placed them over the course of 600 years.

God has blessed us with a remarkable history and a rich heritage. If we choose to study that history and learn from it, it becomes plainly evident that we are here for His purpose and not ours. Once we come to terms with that, we must then honestly ask ourselves one question. Will we be just as willing to travel the path on which He places us?

From the Theissen's... December 2014

Dear friends,

Our news is mixed, both glad and difficult. We were glad to attend a graduation ceremony of *Agencia Misionera Sin Fronteras*: a couple that Robert mentors, Jaime and Pati, were finishing their apprenticeship and heading to an unreached Mixtec village. Robert will be helping Jaime set up the only carpentry shop there. We're glad Jaime and Pati have a good entrance strategy and want to reach Villa Hermosa, Guerrero, using methods that value Mixtec culture. We are glad that they have the support of their church in Acapulco.

On the other hand, we partnered with Sin Fronteras to hold a missions conference there, and although we were treated with exquisite latin hospitality, we did not find the pastor very willing to let Jaime and Pati step outside denominational norms to commission Mixtec church leaders from the start. Leadership is initially expected to come from the outside, especially for things like baptisms and taking Communion. We hope that with time this couple will be able to "mid-wife" healthy churches. It was bittersweet, in the middle of the conference, to receive news that my Zapotec friend, Linda, who has laid on a mat in a tin shack for 30 years and encouraged more people with her faith and prayer than anyone I know, had gone to be with her "Papito" (Daddy). I had prayed with her the day before she died. Her son was with her when the time came, and she was praying.

It was difficult to receive news that Robert has bones broken in his back and faces back surgery.

• The joint between the 3rd and 4th is the bad one

• It has slipped forward – *Spondy-lolisthesis* (spon + dee + lo + lis + thee + sis). The tiny bone joint (*pars interarticularis*) is broken that keeps the vertebrae in line (*Spondylolysis*).

• The exit for the nerve on the right side is almost completely blocked (*foraminal stenosis*).

We are getting help in researching the options. He has been having increasing pain in his right hip, and can't stand up or walk more than a few minutes without needing to sit or stretch.

After the Acapulco conference Robert made one last trip through the rough mountains of Guerrero visiting pastors and delivering tools. Now he will have to take a break till the problem is fixed. Paco went with him to help lift and to share the long hours of driving. This is Paco's first trip since he got married six months ago, and his comment to Robert coming home was, "All the trips I took up till now were leaving an empty house

ning – The executive committee will handle the general planning of the convention. James is looking at ways this convention can memorialize the 600th anniversary celebration of Jan Hus martyrdom. Bro. Mike volunteered to be the chairman of this committee; volunteers should contact James. We plan to start the convention on Thursday morning in Nelsonville and be at Wesley on Saturday.

An idea for the convention theme is "Created in Christ for a Purpose". Other ideas are welcome. The main speaker will be Rev. Dr. David A. Schattschneider, former dean of Moravian Theological Seminary in Bethlehem, PA. He is one of the preeminent scholars of Moravian history, particularly in the areas of Moravian missions and Jan Hus. We plan to have him present multiple sessions during the convention.

13. James stepped out for this item and Bro. Mike took over to discuss this issue. A motion made by Pastor Kay to reimburse James Marek \$691.83 (flight, meal, car – no hotel accommodations) for the trip to the Northern Province Synod (out of administration fund) passed.

A motion by Bro. Mike to pay the expenses that have been incurred by our representative serving on the BWM and to pay the expenses in the future for the representative until further notice with the funds coming out of the contingency fund passed.

14. Transitional Executive Administrative Position – James discussed the possible need for a transitional position at the Executive Committee level. This position would be ongoing and would assist the Executive Committee to make sure that the decisions of the Synodical Committee and Convention get done and would have knowledge of the Unity by-laws. The idea right now is for this to be a paid position, but is up for discussion. A job description would need to be drawn up.

15. Announcements: 1) Bro Butcher retired at the end of August. It was asked that the board president at Rosenberg be in contact with Bro. Larry Koslovsky in regard to the scheduling of supply pastors. 2) Rev. Vanessa Mitchell resigned at Caldwell to return to full-time teaching. 3) Rev Nello Strickland is doing well and thanks everyone for the cards and prayers.

16. Other reports: The Board of Christian Education report was given by Jennifer Chervenka, a member of the BCE and the Unity Youth Coordinator. The board is seeking clarification on the mission and purpose of the Christian Education board. A report was submitted (see agenda 16-a). They are going to send out a survey to all the churches that needs to be returned by December 1. They want to update the Catechism to make it printable, no changes would be made. A bibliography will be available on the Unity website of recommended Christian education resources. In preparation for the 2015 convention, the BCE is planning to have a Unity-wide conference on Jan Hus that would be presented by Dr. Mark Labaj.

Paper reports: Presidents report (Agenda 16-b); First VP report (Agenda 16-c); Secretary's report (Agenda 16d); Youth Coordinator report (Agenda 16-e); Christ Covenant Church report (Agenda 16-f).

A motion by Bro. Mike to adjourn passed. Dr. Mark Labaj ended the meeting with a prayer. Meeting adjourned at 11:45 a.m.

Respectfully submitted, Liz Ripple Secretary, Unity of the Brethren year. A \$100,000 fidelity bond is required for the Treasurer, the cost is \$100.

6. Moravian (Northern Province) Decision/Our Response – James reported about attending this Synod in the President's report. At the Synod, there was discussion on ordination of gay and lesbian individuals, with the proposal passing with 70% in favor. James thinks we need to show support for the Moravians as we would a family member with whom we disagree. Regardless of how we may view the Moravian decision personally, we should still pray for the Moravians in this difficult time. He sees the Moravians as family with our roots in Jan Hus. The decision found the Moravian website on (Moravian.org) is included in these minutes (see Agenda 6). Discussion. Bro. Jimmy Hejl reported on the Moravian Southern Synod, and they will be taking action on this subject at their Synod in 2018. There was other discussion. Dr. Koslovsky will plan to spend some time with pastors to get communication going with the clergy regarding this subject. There will be a pastors' gathering at Camp Allen near Navasota October 27-29

7. Pastor David Johnson, pastor at New Tabor, is a licensed pastor in the Unity and has gone through education through the Hus International School (HIS) program. Bro. David and Ben Kruse have completed their studies (Agenda 7), and each have a final project to complete. A motion was made by Bro. Mike Groseclose to renew a 1-year license according to the by-laws to Pastor David Johnson for a pastoral ministry to New Tabor Brethren Church – passed.

8. James has been in contact with the Dolph Briscoe Museum of Texas History on the UT campus regarding storage of the Unity's records and

pastoral records. After we donate these records, we would no longer have ownership of the records. Discussion on where to store the Unity's records.

James reported on the records of Bro. Henry Beseda, Jr. (given to the Unity as part of his will) – they are being digitized by Kelly Zrubek. (Kelly, not a member of the Unity, but lives across the street from the Granger Brethren church, has also volunteered to be the new Unity webmaster.) After the records are digitized, the plan is to put them on the Unity website along with other records for people to be able to search. Copyrighting the records was questioned. Since no one had a problem with donating the records, James would pursue the plan to store them at a place like the Dolph Briscoe Museum.

9. The mileage rate for next year's convention is to be set at this meeting; if no action is taken, it will be set at \$0.25 a mile round trip. All the members of the convention get their mileage paid. Discussion. A motion by Dorothy Hinson to pay \$0.20 a mile died for lack of a second. The bylaws will set the mileage rate at \$0.25 a mile.

10. Unity website update: James reported that the executive committee made a decision to move on the Unity website and approved a \$2,000 expenditure with Brady Huddleston for a new website. Hopefully, by the end of the year we should have a new website that is much more user friendly. As part of the contract, Brady will do updates free for one year.

11. Volunteers are being accepted for the 2015 Nominating Committee, usually 3 or 4 people (see agenda 11). Cathleen Schlechte has decided to relinquish her position as Editor of the *Brethren Journal*.

Dear Friends and Family,

Isaiah 9:2 says, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone." Yes Lord, may it be!

Merry Christmas! Jesus, Emmanuel, God with us, has come! We rejoice because Emmanuel came to earth as a baby, walked among us, died, and rose again for us! He is still with us through the Holy Spirit as He lives among us, drawing people into a relationship with Him. Hallelujah!

So much has happened since our last newsletter. Currently we rejoice as our small group is starting new groups. We had a training for this and also an all-night prayer and fasting time for this work. Currently there are about 17 people in Hope Valley, the large Valley near our city, that have heard the gospel through our group and desire to know more about Jesus. A few of these have been baptized. There seems to be a hunger for God growing in Hope Valley.

Lord, make these 17 people disciples of you. Give them boldness and hunger to follow you, making new groups all over Hope Valley, bringing light into the darkness.

One new brother (we will call him Paul) is 40, never been married, and since the age of 8 months old cannot walk. He gets around in a hand cranked wheel chair. When May and others were going out to share one day they first asked the Lord where should they go? They asked, "Where are those that have soft hearts?" The Lord whispered the name of Paul's village to May, a place they had never gone to before, and so they went. When they saw Paul moving along the village streets, May asked him if they could go to his home and visit with him and his family. He believed and now is coming to the new group started in Hope Valley. When they met for the first time with this new group he was full of joy and purpose, and even asked if the man in all white that came to visit him in his dream was Jesus

Lord we pray that you would call Paul into a purpose and fullness of joy and life like he has never known before, motivating him to go forth and share with others.

At the all-night prayer and fasting time we asked the Lord where to have \rightarrow

this new group, which village and home? The Lord gave a vision to a woman where she saw a home with a well and a tree in the front yard. As she described the vision, it triggered a memory in May. May had gone to share with an elderly woman over a year ago in Hope Valley but had not been back.

Lord we ask that you would pour out your power and love through healings, dreams, miracles, visions and wonders causing all of us to give ALL the glory to you!

The next week May and I went to find this 70-year-old lady. She lives in a nice house, but inside it was all dirty, with trash on the table and the floor unswept. Grandma didn't look very cared for. She was sitting on the sofa and could not move, and she was not dressed appropriately. She said her legs stopped working about a year ago, so they went to the witch doctor but that didn't help. As May and I shared with her, this lady's 30vear-old daughter became embarrassed and started to clean up the house. May emptied a trashcan beside the sofa that was acting as a bed pan for Grandma. Even though the house was nice, there was a sense of darkness and poverty.

We led Grandma into a time of confessing her sins of idolatry, the witch doctor, and even forgiving a friend. She also received the Lord into her heart.

This past week the new group met at her home. Grandma was growing in hope, and you know what, her home has a well and a tree in the front yard! During this first meeting of the group, May found out that the grandma's daughter sells and uses drugs from this home.

Lord, heal this grandmother's legs and break the darkness of poverty, drugs, and hopelessness from this house. Bring the whole family into salvation. Bless this group and cause it to grow in numbers and in deep relationship with you.

Many of you have prayed for May's 45-year-old, unbelieving aunt. Last week she felt sick and went home to rest. That same night her family members took her to a witch doctor to find out what was wrong. The next day the aunt could not walk. Two days later the aunt could not walk nor talk and the relatives called May and her husband to come and help take the aunt to the hospital. By that time there was nothing to be done to help the aunt and she died that night, of what we believed was a treatable aneurysm.

May was able to share with her, not for the first time, in her coma-like state, that Jesus loves her and died for her sins. May encouraged her to call on His Name and to confess her sins.

Mike reported the Journal is doing well. They are going to prepare a budget soon. A treasurer's report was presented (Agenda 3-a). They have paid back \$2000 on the \$7000 loan taken from the Unity. There is a balance of \$10.067.36 in the account. They have not sent out a survey, but have found from verbally talking to people, the majority want the Journal in printed form. They will probably have to increase the subscription rates for the printed form as the years go by. Discussion continues on the electronic format. Bro. Mike gave credit to Ben & Pastor Kay Polasek for the work done on getting and collecting advertisements in the Journal. 4. Consideration of 2015 Mission Budgets – James reported that there is a good chance we will meet the foreign mission budget of \$67,000 BRETHREN JOURNAL this year; the home mission budget of \$67,000 will be about \$20,000 short.

Bro. David Johnson, Chairman of the Home Missions Board, presented the Home Missions budget for 2015. He reported on Cade Lake and "In God's Hands Ministry" (see Agenda 4-a). Bro. David offered to bring a team to churches next year from January to April and present a skit that he wrote.

Proposed Home Missions Budget (Agenda 4-b) for 2015, \$67,000, as follows: Cade Lake Mission, Burleson County: Rev. Jim Heckman, \$49,000; Operating Expenses, \$12,000; and In God's Hands Ministry, \$6,000.00

Joyce Baletka (member of the Foreign Mission board) reported on Foreign Missions. Proposed Foreign Missions Budget for 2015, \$67,000 (Agenda 4-c), as follows: Thiessen's, \$20,000; Woos, \$15,000; Raiford's, \$8,000; Kozak's, \$12,000; and C. Groseclose, \$12,000.

Dewyan Weise, Unity Treasurer, reported on the financial status of the Unity (see Agenda 16-e).

Dewyan, liaison to the Board for Grants and Bequests, reported that the balance as of 10/3/14 is \$417,743.51. James reported that these funds are an additional resource should the Synodical Committee need it for a worthy cause.

Discussion on mission budgets. A motion was made by Dewyan Weise to give the North Carolina guests speaking privileges at this meeting – passed. A motion was made by Dewyan Weise to support a budget for 2015 of \$67,000 to Home Missions and \$67,000 to Foreign Missions, total \$134,000, with any shortfall taken out of contingency – passed.

5. James reported that we have \$80,000 of coverage on the building at Cade Lake and it costs almost \$1600 a







Industry & Fayetteville Brethren Churches Honor Our Veterans' Service

Industry and Fayetteville Brethren Churches honored 144 veterans on Sunday, November 9, 2014, at the Industry Brethren Church 9 a.m. service. This was the 5th annual service of this kind for the churches.

There were 143 veterans on the program and one guest veteran recognized. Each living veteran received a remembrance ribbon with red poppy and "thanks" on it, as well as a small US flag that noted the event. The flag was presented to each participant by Rep. Lois Kohlhorst. The deceased veterans had representatives come forward and light a candle in their honor and receive a small flag from Rep. Kohlhorst, also. There were five Eagle Scouts that are also A&M Corps of Cadets, including Matthew Luedekar, Kade Bletzinger (Air Corps), Ricky Hielsmiann, Zach Wagner, and


Lance Mason. Also helping in the service was Eagle Scout Sam Luedekar of A&M. As Sharon Spiess played "Onward Christian Solders", two of the Corps of Cadets carried in the large banner with a cross on it and military branches represented saluting. They hung this on the wall in the front of the church. This was followed by Shelby American Legion members Billie Sisa and August Voelkel posting the colors, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

Martha Dove read a Proclamation from Governor Rick Perry and wife, Anita, that was given to the churches and addressed "Thanks to all that served our country". This message included "Each generation of Americans has answered the clarion call to defend the ideals of liberty. Across

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the globe, in the face of aggression, tyranny and despair, they have dedicated - and sometimes sacrificed their lives to securing Americans' freedom. Whether they served at home or abroad, on the front lines or at our seas and ports, in times of peace or in times of war, our nation's veterans deserve the utmost respect for their dedication and service. Old Glory flies high, and our nation remains free, because of their devotion. To those veterans in attendance, First Lady Anita Perry and I salute you. On behalf of all Texans, thank you for your service." (Signed: Rick Perry, Governor)

The service message was delivered by Pastor Kay Polasek. Terri Ross (her father is one of the veterans honored) played beautiful music on the harp while names of the veterans were called. The church bell rang one time as each veteran's name was called. As Liz Ripple played the piano, the congregation sang one stanza of each military branch's song, while the veterans from that branch stood up. The

Corps of Cadets' young men came to the front of the church and, as veterans stood and saluted, they returned the salute to the veterans as a gesture of "Thanks and Honor". The Eagle Scouts (Corps of Cadets) assisted all those needing help in ambulating, also.

The church was decorated with red, white, and blue arrangements and many flags, including all the flags of the different branches of the military. A large flag drape on a tripod was in the front of the church with a large flag bow that held red streamer ribbons containing name labels of each honored veteran. Liz Ripple called the names of the honored Fayetteville veterans and Martha Dove pinned on their ribbons; Liz Treybig called the names of the Industry honored veterans and Marian Branam pinned their ribbons on. There was a wreath holding red, blue, and white flowers (representing the deceased honored veterans) with a cross in the center, a white dove below five small US flags, and below the flowers the words

versity; University of Texas, Bachelor of Business Administration degree in 1947; and Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Bachelor of Divinity in 1951. The Certificate of Ordination was bestowed upon him in June 1951 in Caldwell, Texas. He served first as the Beseda family pastor, officiating at baptisms, marriages, and family funerals and reunions.

He made sure that his father's records of baptisms, marriages, and funerals (Reverend Henry E. Beseda, Sr.) were donated to The Czech Heritage Society of Texas for publication. These records are important in all libraries in the Czech communities.

He was known as the "marrying and burying preacher", and never refused to help anyone regardless of their religious affiliation or nonaffiliation. He served 16 Brethren churches throughout Texas since his ordination in 1951, and was loved by all he served. He loved to sing in choirs and would do so anytime he was asked. He continued serving in several churches until he became ill in 2012. He was known as Brother Henry. and was one of a kind.

He was a proud U.S. veteran, serving courageously with the U.S. Navy during World War II as a Yeoman-First Class on the USS Oakland in the Pacific Theatre from October 1941 until October 1945 He returned to Texas via the USS Texas from Honolulu, Hawaii. It was during his service to his country that he heard God's call to pursue the ministry.

Organizations he belonged to include: American Legion Chapter 451-Chaplain; VFW Chapter 4458 - Chaplain; Burleson County Hospital Auxiliary - Chaplain; Caldwell Senior BRETHREN JOURNAL

Citizens – Chairman of the Board: Warren Lodge #56, A.F. and AM -Chaplain; Habitat for Humanity; Texas A&M Agri Life Extension; Forever Young Committee; Copperas Hollow Country Club; Burleson County Ministerial Alliance; SPJST; Czech Choir; RVOS Lodge 108; and Germania Insurance.

He served as Kolache King of the Caldwell Kolache Festival, and also was an avid golfer.

In 1987 he was named Outstanding Senior Citizen of Burleson County; on January 21, 2012, he was awarded the Golden Trowel Award from his Masonic Chapter.

His travels included two trips to the Holy Land, missionary work in Honduras, and many shorter excursions to destinations in the U.S.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Reverend Henry E. Beseda and Julia Rose Chernosky Beseda, 3 brothers, Woodrow, Joseph Maitland, and Robert, and 5 sisters, Maravene Beseda, Orbin Vance, Julia Bradshaw, Effie Howell, and Florene Mrazek. Survivors include wife Carolyn Filipp Beseda, brother-in-law Jerome Mrazek, and 14 nieces and nephews. Accepting the award was his wife, Carolyn Filipp Beseda and Beseda relatives and friends.



Each person serving in the military gave in a special way as it takes everyone from cooks, drivers, pilots, etc., to keep our nation secure and safe, and we honor all those who gave each in his/her special way.

It was estimated that there were 160 people attending this event.
