Mission Giving Finalized

One of the most evident ways God has recently blessed the Unity is through our mission support. Mission giving for 2014 totaled over \$146,000. The foreign mission budget of \$67,000 was exceeded by 33% with total giving of \$89,582. Home missions received \$56,833 which was just 15% shy of the \$67,000 budget. Information from the annual Unity questionnaires indicates that 19 of the 23 Brethren churches reporting so far have included Unity Missions in their budgets. These budgets indicate a

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total in excess of \$55,000 for foreign missions and almost \$35,000 for home missions. When the current regular individual donations are added to these totals, foreign missions are expected to receive more than \$74,000 and home missions more than \$50,000 in 2015. These numbers do not include numerous one-time gifts that have been given over the last 2 years. Clearly, God is at work in the Unity of the Brethren Missions program. It will be exciting to see what He will do in 2015 through many faithful Brethren.

From the Mission Field

We were saddened to hear the news that 2 of our missionaries have been recently diagnosed with cancer. Anne Thiessen and Caroline Woo have both recently been diagnosed with breast cancer. Anne has been serving the Unity in the mission field in Mexico with her husband, Robert. Anne will be receiving treatment in Canada. Caroline has been serving the Unity in Asia with her husband, Michael, and will receive treatment in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. We are asking all Brethren to keep these 2 families in prayer as they make their way through this difficult time.

Website Update

The redesign and rebuilding of the Unity website has been a lengthy and challenging process. The website committee remains committed to its original plan, which is to expand and update the site while making it easier to maintain going forward. The website committee has overseen the work of the web design contractor and has recently provided a list of the items that still need to be fixed. The web designer has agreed to make these changes and is currently in the process. Kelly Zrubek has agreed to serve as our webmaster and has made some changes to the site already. However, the language in which the website is constructed is one that Kelly is not completely familiar with, so the committee plans to meet before the convention to decide the best strategy for the site going forward. The website is certainly functional and remains a great resource for denominational information and history, and we encourage visitors to provide feedback that can be incorporated in future plans.

isters Benefit Program has been identified and an effort is underway to restructure the program so that all Unity pastors are eligible to participate. The current program was created many years ago when such retirement programs were not as heavily regulated as they are today. Consequently, ministers who joined the retirement program before the laws changed are allowed to continue in the current program. However, ministers who have joined the Unity more recently are currently not eligible to participate in the retirement program until the program is updated to meet the current legal requirements. Plans are being made to update the program so that all Unity pastors (current and future) will be able to participate in the program. A proposal for such an update is anticipated at the upcoming convention.

Accountable Reimbursement Plans for Ministers

The accounting firm currently handling the tax reporting for the Unity has recently suggested that local congregations consider using "accountable reimbursement account plans" when reimbursable expense accounts are a part of minister's compensation. An accountable plan is one in which the pastor has an expense account set up in the church budget. The pastor may spend money on qualified expenses and then submit the receipts with proof of payment to the church for reimbursement. The benefit of accountable plans is that the church is not required to include the reimbursements on the pastors W-2 and the pastor is not required to include the expenses as income or deductions on his or her personal tax return. Prior to implementing accountable reimbursement plans, congregations should consult a local tax professional or contact our account firm, Wehring Wealth Management, at 979-865-5959 for more information.

In closing, the Unity continues to face many opportunities and challenges as we seek God's will for our denomination. Please keep the upcoming convention, your local congregation, and the Unity as a whole in your prayers. Pray that we as the branches will continue to find ways to bear much fruit and bring glory to God our Father.



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The Schism


[Author's Note: This is the conclusion of a two-part article on the period of history which immediately followed the passing of Gregory the Patriarch. I continue to extend my gratitude to Craig D. Atwood for both his attention to detail and the compassion he extended to those involved who are unable to defend their positions. – J.P.]

As you may recall, differences of opinion between the Major and Minor parties resulted in division within the Unity. Shortly after the synod at Brandys in 1490, the arguments of Jacob and Amos persuaded Matthew to appoint a new Inner Council. This council immediately overturned the decision of that synod. The Major Party was not represented on the new council. In response, they chose four trusted brothers to seek out the "church of the apostles" in the hope that such a church might be able to shed some light where the New Testament seemed ambiguous.

Lord Kostka arranged for their passage to the East and covered their expenses. In 1491 the four brothers traveled together as far as Constantinople. Kaspar remained there. Mares Kokovec traveled to Russia. Martin Kabatnik made his way to Palestine and Egypt. Luke of Prague went to the Balkans to observe Orthodox worship.

The four faced many dangers in their journeys. Although each learned a great deal, they never found the apostolic church that they sought. Luke was convinced, now more than ever before, that the Unity would have to find its own way with the help of the Holy Spirit. After he returned from his quest, Luke of Prague even-





tually emerged as the intellectual leader of the Unity.

While the Unity continued to struggle in coming to terms with its relationship to secular authority, an additional complication arose. This controversy came about in its understanding of salvation. Was salvation a product of God's grace through faith or did it come by good works? The early Brethren believed that faith must be completed in love. The more theologically literate warned against the belief that works led to salvation. The Brethren were by no means the only church ever to struggle over the concept of grace versus works, nor would they to be the last.

They searched the New Testament for guidance. Scripture often leads to more questions before it leads to an answer. Scripture stated on one hand that Christ's yoke is easy and His burden is light; on the other hand it stated that a believer must pick up his cross and follow Him.

Matthew and the Inner Council were disturbed by the questioning of grace versus works. To them it seemed that the Brethren were losing their simplicity and engaging in fruitless speculation. They feared that if the

people relied too much on Christ for salvation, they would become lax in their discipline. This, in turn, could only lead to immorality in their behavior. The elders were concerned that some of the Brethren, especially the more educated who joined in the 1480's, were promoting a theology of grace.

This was a debate that could not be resolved administratively because it involved fundamental questions of biblical teaching. As a result, some of the priests formed a "grace party". The formation of a "works party" quickly followed. Thus, the sense of division seemed more overwhelming than ever

Those with theological training pressed the issue. Klenovsky concluded that each side had merit, but at the same time each was imperfect. He published a treatise dealing with this division. In it he pointed out that the "works party" promoted righteousness, without which faith would be dead. He also added that they spoke more about righteousness than they practiced it. Similarly, he pointed out that the "grace party" erred by relying too heavily on God's grace and had thus grown weak and become

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worldly. His critique of the "grace party" was extremely effective because he came from a wealthy family but lived a simple life.

Although much of the dissension was blamed on the influx of educated members, theologically speaking, a belief in justification by works is problematic. In 1489, Prokop publicly criticized the works party while he was a member of the Inner Council. He argued that the Brethren had never lived up to their ideals.

This controversy of grace versus works was also connected to the one regarding the swearing of oaths and participation in secular government. The older Brethren, led by Amos, aggressively promoted the older understanding. The younger Brethren sought a relaxation of the rules and promoted the discussion of the church's theology.

Luke, as he continued to emerge as a leader, identified the strengths and weaknesses of each side of the debate.

In 1493, Luke published a work entitled *The Ship*. In it he stated, "is not a particular manner of life marked by the negation of different regulations of the world, but rather a fundamental new beginning which makes a Christian a Christian. This involves full dependence on Christ. Only the sacrifice of the Son of God is the foundation of the church. 'Without his death and the merit of his grace and sharing in his righteousness, no suffering, nor self-denial, nor merit makes for the gaining of salvation.'"

This gives us some indication of the direction Luke would pursue in his theology over the course of time. Faith must be completed in love, but works of piety alone could not save a person. It is possible that they could, in fact, make one less loving and Christlike.

According to Craig D. Atwood, "Rather than reject the teaching of the early Unity, Luke recovered some of the original meaning and concept of faith completed in love. Love was a gift of God rather than an act of the human will."

When one considers the fact that Luke and others like him were originally attracted to the Unity by the writings of Chelcicky during a time of persecution, this makes perfect sense.

With the sense of division within the Unity ever present, another synod

This synod reaffirmed the decision previously rendered at Brandys in 1490. Membership in the Unity would no longer be based on renouncing the world, but rather on one's readiness to begin a new life. The Unity would still maintain strict discipline, but it would not turn away the weak. In fact, priests were to take special pains to help those weak in faith and morals.

These changes in doctrine were controversial and would remain so for a very long period of time. According to Atwood, "In fairness to the Unity of the Brethren, they discovered what every radical social movement learns: that it is nearly impossible to maintain the ideals of the Sermon on the Mount in the temporal world."

A period of rigorous debate took place within the Unity for at least the next five years following that synod. Leadership encouraged each side to be tolerant of the views held by the other. This proved difficult.


Some of the leading priests, including members of the Inner Council, met at Prerov to discuss changes and the future organization of the Unity. Matthew was removed from his position as primate but maintained his ordination. This was the earliest move in the Unity to separate church oversight from episcopal authority. Prokop was restored to the Inner Council and was made judge of the Unity.

Taborsky, the pastor of the Litomysl congregation, Luke, the pastor of Mlada Boleslav, and Klenovsky, a layperson, were made part of the new Inner Council.

Jacob openly criticized the Inner Council and the Unity's priests for being lax. He and other members of the Minor Party encouraged Brethren to refuse communion from priests who agreed with the synod. He was eventually threatened with expulsion. He grudgingly repented and was eventually reconciled with the Brethren.

The Inner Council was fully aware that they were departing significantly from the writings of Chelcicky and Gregory. The council met in Rychnov in 1495. There, they stated that they still valued those writings, but acknowledged that they were insufficient. They added that they should only be used as long as they coincided with scripture and served the purpose of edification.

For the first time, the Unity's leadership asserted that no human writ-








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ings, not even those of its founders, set forth "unalterable laws". All doctrinal statements were subject to continual examination and change in light of scripture and reason. It was determined that the Brethren had tried to live up to Chelcicky's ideals, but in the end they began trusting more in their good works than in the cross of Christ.

The Minor Party argued that the New Testament had to be taken literally. Luke distinguished between the law of grace and the written word. According to Luke, God imparted the law of grace directly into the believer's heart and its content was faith, love, and hope. He reminded the Brethren that Christ instructed people to hear the Gospel and not read it. Furthermore, he contended that the Gospel preceded the New Testament which, according to Luke, was written because early Christians began wrangling over doctrine rather than adhering to Christ's simple truths.

This in no way satisfied Amos and the rest of the Minor Party. Additional synods were held in 1497, 1498, 1499 and 1500, each ruling in favor of greater freedom and tolerance within the Unity. After 1500, the Inner Council approached the dispute as a matter of discipline within the Unity, ruling that the Minor Party was "prideful and fractious".

During this same period, Luke traveled to Italy to visit the Waldensians to see if the Minor Party's claims had any merit. His assessment of the Waldensians was negative, but it is altogether possible that his bias against the Minor Party played a part in his findings. In spite of his criticisms of the Waldensians, he wrote a catechism for them. This catechism played a key role in their reorganization on the eve of the Protestant Reformation. In that sense, Luke was almost as important to Waldensian history as he was to Moravian history. While in Florence, Luke witnessed the burning of the reformer Savonarola. This event cemented his belief that there must be separation between the church and the state.

In 1500, Amos and others in the Minor Party left the Unity outright and formed a new priesthood which is often referred to as the Old Brethren. For several decades, their published arguments only brought trouble to the Unity from the state.

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In response, the Unity's writers grew increasingly hostile to the Old Brethren's theology. Moreover, the Unity also began to distance itself from Chelcicky's writings, which faded from view. Even Gregory the Patriarch came to be remembered as an early organizer with extreme views.

The final traces of the Old Brethren disappear in the mid 1500's. Most of its followers appear to have united with the Hutterites and other Anabaptist groups after 1528.

By 1500, the Inquisition turned its attention to the Unity. Thomas, one of the original priests ordained in 1467, successfully defended the Brethren. This was not an easy task because of the nature of the allegations made against the Unity. Thomas was both self-educated and well read. He always maintained that persecution could not lead to truth. Moreover, he believed that the truth could not be completely known until the time God chose to fully reveal it.

Luke of Prague is recognized as Gregory the Patriarch's successor. He was also, in a broader sense, the Unity's second founder. Luke died December 11, 1528.

On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed his Ninety-Five Theses to the door of All Saints' Church in Wittenberg. For over one hundred years the Czech Reformation stood alone. Now, it was to be a part of a much larger Protestant movement.

Although the Unity and Luther each broke with the Catholic Church, it is important to remember that they did so for entirely different reasons.

Luther faulted the church for emphasizing works rather than justification by grace through faith alone.

Gregory and the early Brethren formed a separate community because they saw the Catholic and Utraquist churches as being too lax, not too strict. They sought the narrow path of Christ rather than the easier path offered by the state church.

Before Jan Hus was martyred on July 6, 1415, he was given the opportunity to recant his teachings. He responded, "You are now going to burn a goose, but in a century you will have a swan which you can neither roast nor boil."

Many felt that this was a prophecy which came to pass in Martin Luther. Luther's fulfilment of this prophecy by Jan Hus was even mentioned in the sermon at Luther's funeral in 1546. After his death, Martin Luther was frequently portrayed with a swan in Lutheran art. Every depiction of Luther with the swan hearkens back to the words of Jan Hus.

Kairos Prison Ministry



Thanks for your prayers for Kairos Prison Ministry at the Boyd Unit between Teague and Fairfield, October 23-26, 2014. God was at work on the hearts and minds of the participants there.

Kairos goes to the Prison Unit and speaks with the Warden. If approved, Kairos presents a program of talks about choices, decisions, Christ's call, his death and resurrection, friendship with God, Spirituality, discovery thru study and Christian action, God's word the Bible, forgiveness, and God's Love, 'Agape'. The program includes discussions, creativity making posters related to subjects, singing, praying, and chapel talks.

There were 42 inmates, called "men in white" and 30 inside team (men from the free) presenters and others, plus a support team of 20 (Barbara was part of this team) for food, logistics, and prayer warriors. Also there were about 30 stewards, previous participants, who prepared the rooms, attended to needs in the community room as drinks, food, posters, etc., attentively.

We went in on Thursday afternoon thru security checks and a number of counts before we got to the Gym, converted into three rooms – dining room, community room, and chapel. We were assigned to a table of 6 (7 tables). Three discussion leaders were at each table; after speeches or a testimony is a discussion. After one of the testimonies, a young man at our table professed faith in Jesus, the first of several, who professed for the first time faith in Jesus and several re-commitments for a total of 13. There is no pressure. In discussions the "men in white" asked questions and discussed. Why do they come? food, fun, curiosity, wanting to know about Christ and Christianity. We have counselors (5 pastors) and other Christians. (We pay our portion, but donate more and raise funds for meals of the 42 and supplies and ask for prayers.) Singing is mostly contemporary songs led by a three-member praise band. We had interruptions by guards for count and pill window. There are lot of cookies eaten and given out and fresh fruit and raw

Alma Frantiska Urban, 101 years, 10 months, and 20 days, died Thursday, March 19, 2015, at the River Oaks Health Care Center in Columbus, Texas. Miss Urban was the oldest living member of Fayetteville Brethren Church for many years and was a member her entire life. She had the distinction of being the oldest member in the denomination, the Unity of the Brethren. She was an honorary member of the Fayetteville Brethren Christian Sisters Society.

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vegetables during discussions. These were called Agape gifts.

On Saturday the talks were about Christ, his death and about forgiveness. The day ended with a forgiveness service, at which the men, including the men from the free, the stewards, and the 42 participants, were asked to drop into a bucket a list of things asked to be forgiven and whom to forgive. Then there was the washing of hands ceremony, at which time they came to a pastor with a basin of water at one of two sites and declared: "I give to God" the lists of forgiveness, and the pastor washing their hands said "God forgives", and then their hands were dried by another pastor who pronounced a blessing. After the bucket of lists was burned up, we were to leave the prison, but there was a mess up in count, missing an inmate (who was being counseled by a pastor and not seen). We and the men had to stay in the gym until the count was right. To spend our time, one and a half hours, we had a praise service, during which other men came to Christ or re-committed themselves. As the participants left for the night they were given two bags of one dozen cookies each, one for themselves and the other to give to someone they disliked or had problems with. That speaks volumes.

On Sunday morning the men reported informally what happened to them and the cookies. Those to whom they gave cookies were surprised and probably shocked. Agape gifts. God was working. Sunday we worshiped and then spoke about faith and about walking in God's grace and about carrying on as newborn Christians.

After lunch we left the gym while the stewards prepared it for the closing ceremony. All the participants and we the team went to the small chapel in the education building. There we had a cross ceremony at which each participant was given a cross and a Bible. After the guests for the closing ceremony had arrived, we went back to the gym for the closing. The outside support team of about 20 and others were admitted under strict guidelines and on an approved list. Then after being greeted again by the stewards as each day with handshakes and hugs, we sang. There was an open mike for the participants to tell what condition they came in, what they learned, and what they would do with their learning and faith. Some were lost, disillusioned with life, and had problems and curiosity, and for food. What they learned was about their spiritual life, about God and Jesus loving them, and about the love of others, like the Kairos people. Some said they were going to go on a new road with a new life. During that time two more men came forward and professed Christ as savior. One had been emotionally affected by the love we shared. The other was a Muslim who learned who and what Christ Jesus was; he originally came out of curiosity. The closing was very joyously emotional.

For information there are other men and women in the Unity who participate with Kairos in other units. Please support this mission.

At one meeting before the Kairos weekend, our leader began his prayer at the beginning of the meeting: "Almighty God, Father, I thank you that \rightarrow

the state of Texas wants to return men from prison as responsible and good people and that we, Kairos, has the privilege and opportunity to help in that effort...." Wherever Kairos has been there is a difference in the attitude of the prisoners and personnel.

How did I and Barbara get involved with Kairos? A friend was waiting for me next to our Sunday School classroom and said, "Would you help us in Kairos on Palm Sunday (April 9, 2014)? We need pastors." Since I had told the Lord Jesus I was available to him and we were free that Sunday yet, I said, "yes." Then he briefly told me why he asked me and invited me to preparatory meetings. So I was one of 7 pastors and Barbara was drafted to the support team which prepared meals for the weekend in prison for prisoners and us, sent in other food as cookies and fresh fruits and vegetables and other supplies, and prayed for us and each inmate. It was a great experience, with a hitch at the end. We saw God work in the lives of the men.

The Kairos weekend event is layered in prayer from the first preparatory meeting thru the whole event. The outside team members have two or three inmates to pray for for the whole weekend event.

Please pray for all who minister to the prisoners that the prisoners may come to know Jesus and accept him. Also Please support this mission and ministry.
