

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
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President's Column . . . James Marek What is Brethren?

Most members of the Unity have been asked to describe what the Breth-

ren Church is at least once in their lives. Many of us may find it difficult to give an informative answer to this simple question, particularly without comparing ourselves to some other mainstream denomination like the Lutherans, Methodists or Baptists.

In his sermon in the closing worship service of the recent convention, Bro. Tommy Tallas challenged us to be proud of who we are and encouraged us to be prepared to answer this question without comparing ourselves to other denominations. The truth is that the Unity predates the Lutherans. Methodists, and Presbyterians, just to name a few. Bro. Tommy pointed out that for this reason, we are not like them, they are like us. It is true that reformers like Martin Luther, John Wesley, John Calvin, and others not only knew who the Brethren were, they admired them and held the Breth-



ren out as examples of how a Chris-

Martin Luther (1483-1546) in a lecture to his students - "There have never been any Christians so like the apostles in doctrine and constitution as these Bohemian Brethren."

Martin Luther to their deputies – "Tell your Brethren to hold fast what God has given them, and never give up their constitution and discipline. Let them take no heed of revilements. The world will behave foolishly. If you in Bohemia were to live as we do. what is said of us would be said of you, and if we were to live as you do, what is said of you would be said of us."

Martin Luther in a letter to the Brethren – "We have never attained to such a discipline and holy life as is found among you, but in the future



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we shall make it our aim to attain it."

Martin Bucer (German Protestant Reformer) – "How shall I instruct those whom God Himself has instructed! You alone, in all the world, combine a wholesome discipline with a pure faith."

Philipp Melancthon (German reformer who collaborated with Luther) – "I am pleased with the strict discipline enforced in your congregations. I wish we could have a stricter discipline in ours."

John Calvin (French Reformer; Calvinism) – "We have long since recognized the value of such a system, but cannot, in any way, attain to it"

John Wesley, founder of the Methodist Church – "The Bohemian community had apparently come very near to being the ideal community of the New Testament in terms of church order, discipline and moral life."

The early Brethren created quite a legacy and example in the minds of these great reformers and church founders. Our legacy is certainly worth preserving and continuing.

At this year's convention, we tried to commemorate our rich history and provide a few resources to help us remember who we are and what we are here to do by giving each church 3 gifts. These gifts were all reminders of our rich heritage and the pride and responsibility that comes with our heritage as Brethren. Hopefully the gifts will also help us be better prepared to respond to questions about what it means to be Brethren.

The first gift is a three-pane framed display featuring a pictorial depiction of The Unity of the Brethren in context of the convention theme. The theme was taken from John 15:5 where Jesus said, "I am the vine, you are the branches...apart from me, you can do nothing." The painting features Jesus as the vine. Hus as one of the main roots, along with Comenius, Luke of Prague, John Augusta and others. Prominent character traits and tools of the early Unity are also included in the root system illustrating the building blocks of the original denomination. The branches of the vine contain Unity organizations through which God has produced fruit inside and outside the Unity in Texas for over 100 years. The purpose of the painting is to remind us that our purpose as a denomination is to serve God and our fellow man and to bring others to

The second pane in the display contained a chronological timeline of significant events in the life of the ancient and current Unity. This piece is intended to remind us from whence we come, including some of our accomplishments and possibly regrets that we do not want to repeat. The third pane contains a membership creed, which although not entitled as such in our bylaws, is taken from our current Constitution and Bylaws. It reminds us what the life of a modernday Brethren should look like and what it is that we are supposed to be doing. In summary, the framed display is intended to be a reminder of our history, our responsibility and our denominational mission.

The second gift received by all congregations was the book by Dr. Craig Atwood entitled *The Theology of the Czech Brethren from Hus to Comenius*. Dr. Atwood contends that his is the first book to focus on the theology of the Unity of the Brethren ever written in English. As we have studied Dr. Atwood's book in our

Sunday School Class, I have enjoyed learning about who the early Brethren were, what they believed, and how they lived. Additionally, I have been surprised and impressed by the tremendous contributions the Brethren made to the church universal we know today. I cannot recommend this book enough because it details who the Brethren were and who we ought to be. Studying Dr. Atwood's book has made me begin to realize just how proud we should be of our denomination because of our rich history and incredible sacrifice made by those who have gone before us. Reading and studying this book can easily lead to a profound sense of responsibility to live up to the heritage of the ancient Unity.

The third gift is the DVD entitled "Truth Prevails". This is a documentary on the life, death, and inspiration of Jan Hus that helps explain what happened to Hus and the obstacles he faced and mistreatment he endured for the advancement of the Gospel and Reformation of the Church.

These gifts are intended to benefit all Brethren. If you have not seen them yet in your local church, ask



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your pastor or one of your convention delegates where they are.

All of these gifts will hopefully provide information that can be used to explain what the Brethren Church has been throughout history.

In addition, here are a few other data points about the Brethren:

- The Brethren established the first voluntary church in Western History.
- The Brethren were the first to publish a Protestant hymnal.
- They were the first Protestant group to establish their own priesthood.
- The first to publically debate government officials.
- The first to publish a Protestant catechism.
- The followers of Hus were instrumental in establishing the practice of allowing the laypeople to receive both elements of communion in the church universal. One could easily argue that this practice may not have become as common as it is today had it not been for the efforts of the Brethren.
- In Hus' day, mass was given in Latin. Hus and his followers fought to see that the people could have the

gospel read and preached in their own language. One of the clearest illustrations of this was the establishment of Bethlehem Chapel in Prague, which was founded by 2 businessmen. Since the Chapel was not owned by the Catholic Church, services could be held in a way that was most beneficial to the people instead of exclusively in Latin. which the common worshipper could not understand.

The early Brethren were what we might call "shakers and movers" to-day. They were leaders in a movement to reform the church long before the official reformation led by Martin Luther 100 years later. Their faith was proven in their daily lives. People of their day knew Brethren by the way the Brethren lived and conducted themselves. The Brethren were the salt of the earth and light of the world because they did not live like most other people. They had an impact because they were different, disciplined and devout.

The obvious question is, what kind of testimony are the lives of Brethren making today not only to our heritage as Brethren, but as members of the family of God? Can the

world pick out a Brethren today, like the early church reformers said they could back in the early days of our denomination?

God has preserved the followers of Hus and The Unity of the Brethren for 600 years now. Surely, God has a purpose for this denomination, but any revival or lasting impact will almost surely include a spiritual revival of individual Brethren. Our heritage (Christian and denominational) reguires that we be different from the world. While other Christians are concerned about their rights as citizens in this ever-changing world, may we be more concerned about our responsibilities to this world and to our Savior whom we serve. I recently heard a preacher on television say as Christians we are slaves to Christ and therefore have far more responsibilities than we do rights.

If we want to grow, if we want people to know who the Brethren are, we've got to leave our pews and get out there and do something! The world is dark and in need. We can choose to be demoralized by its condition and lament the fact that things aren't the way they used to be or we can seize the opportunity that the darkness provides for us as Christians to share the love of Christ with all people – even those we don't like. What people say about us 100 years from now will be determined by our decision to actually be Brethren or to simply go to church in a building that bears the name.

#4: Jesus is beside you always.

This one works two ways. On one hand, Jesus is there to help you. It may be that you are nervous during a test or confronting a bully. Remind your child that Jesus is there for them. It is not God's job to protect them from all tribulations. What He's there to do is grow a relationship between Him and your child, in which there are more perks than anything on planet earth. He's there to build character and strength and reliance upon Him. Jesus said in John 16:33, "In this world you will have tribulation. Be of good cheer; I have overcome the world." Jesus wants to mold those who can overcome, not those who can simply avoid. But Jesus is also there when your child is tempted to do wrong. Sometimes Jesus needs to be a bit discomforting, just like Mom and Dad. And this is the type of prayer to which God will respond by becoming your best parenting mate. Have your child visualize Jesus with them on the bus, in the cafeteria, on the playground, on the football field, etc.

#5: Pray hard!

Pray for your kids while they are in school. Pray that your kids will use the "Jesus Beside You" imagery when they are tempted or in need of comfort.

Pray that God will provide a means for them to escape if they are tempted to get into trouble, such as is promised in 1 Corinthians 10:13.

Pray that God will give you discernment. It is hard to tell when our kids are troubled by something when all they say about their school day is "It was fine." But God can give you the ability to see in a look, a twitch, or a minor change in behavior that something is wrong. He will sharpen your gut instincts, and after being in prayer about this, you can rely on your instincts with more confidence!

Do not pray that God will protect your child from all volatile or potentially stressful situations. It is hard as parents to watch our children struggle; however it is in times of struggle that He builds their character and strength. Pray for character and strength in your child, and you can rest assured God will answer that with a resounding yes!

What we really want is for school to brighten minds, cultivate good relationships, and provide tools and knowledge needed in adulthood. However we don't live in a perfect world. Help your kids understand that Jesus is there all day every day, and He looks forward to watching out for our kids in noise as well as silence, in frustration as well as joy, in stress as well as peace. As Jesus promised His disciples in Matthew 28:20, "Lo, I am with you always, even until the end of the age..."

Packing God in the Backpack

#1: But it's HARD!

Thinking about God and keeping Him first is hard in school. It's hard to think about God in the noise and chaos of the playground, lunchroom, or hallway between classes. Talk with your child about the challenges and how it can be hard for adults, too. Jesus experienced that, too, when the crowds pressed in. He turned to His Father and His will (John 5:19, Jesus said, "...the Son can do nothing by himself; he can do only what he sees his Father doing, because whatever the Father does the Son also does") and we need to do the same. Explain that school is a place to practice making Godly decisions. They don't have to act like monks in monastery, but we don't want them acting like monkeys in a zoo!

#2: There are reasons why it's hard!

Talk to your child. Let them know they are not a bad kid if he/she is not thinking of everything you told him about being a Christian while six people are talking to him/her. We have to trust when we teach our kids that the information will stay in their hearts. It may not surface every day, or even every week, but it should surface when they need it. *However, they should have an alarm bell in their hearts*. When they are faced with a choice between gossiping or keeping silent, cheating or taking a test the honest way, or accepting or declining an after-school invitation they know is wrong, that alarm bell should ring loudly. Encourage them to respond to that alarm!

#3: Jesus is just as strong inside of school as He is outside of school. Kids may think it feels like Jesus gets left at the school door. Help them to realize that just because they can't sense the presence of the Lord as well in crowds, He can hear them just as well as He can when they're alone in their bedrooms. Tell them, "He hears all and wants to help you out in school, because it is your most challenging stomping ground due to the amount of time you spend there. Imagine Him standing right beside you all day, because that is essentially true."

Report of the 66th Biennial Convention of the Unity of the Brethren

As outgoing Secretary of the Unity of the Brethren, I bring this report. First I would like to thank James Marek as out-going President, the Executive Committee, Delegates, Synodical Lay members, Chairs and the Ministers for their attendance and participation with the 2015 Convention.

It was an excellent convention with all business being completed in a cordial manner. The attendance was a little lower than in previous years and ranged from 80-130 daily. The Sunday service at Wesley was attended by about 200 people. Bro Mike and his congregations at Nelsonville and Wesley did an outstanding job as hosts for this convention! They were very helpful, and the food was outstanding.

tative to serve for the next 2 years. The current Synodical representative email list will be used until new information is sent. Also, I will be emailing the minutes for the 2015 Convention and ask again that the ministers and Synodical representatives please share with your congregation.

Following is a report on the 2015 Convention:

The 66th Biennial Convention of the Unity of the Brethren was held on July 10-12. The Convention Theme was "Branches Bearing Fruit" with scripture from John 15:5. Registration began at 8 a.m. at Nelsonville Brethren Church, followed by Worship with Holy Communion. The convention hymn was "To God Be the Glory". Rev Michael Groseclose and Nelsonville Board President Jon Schroeder greeted the Convention. The call to worship was given by Rev. Dr. Jerry Terrill, 3rd Vice-President of the Synodical Committee and pastor of Houston Brethren. James Marek, President of the Synodical Committee, welcomed evervone to the service. The morning prayer was given by Rev. Lawrence Junek, 1st Vice-President of the Synodical Committee. Rev. Michael Groseclose, pastor of Nelsonville & Wesley Brethren Churches and 2nd Vice-President of the Synodical Committee, gave the sermon entitled "Won't Take Nothing but an A." He said to bring the best you have and offer it to God, don't settle for just passing, make an "A". The pianist was Sondra Brau. There were about 110 in attendance.

Following the service, the opening session of the convention began. The opening hymn was "Grace Greater Than Our Sin". The convention pianist was Elizabeth Ripple. All Unity of the Brethren churches were presented with gifts to commemorate the 600th Anniversary of the Martyrdom of Jan Hus. Gifts from the Unity included a framed painting by Suzanne Huser (Granger Brethren) with Brethren history listed, a book The Theology of the Czech Brethren from Hus to Comenius, by Craig Atwood, and a DVD "Truth Prevails – The Undying Faith of Jan Hus." Rev David Guthrie, President of the Elders' Conference – Moravian Church Southern Province brought greetings from the Southern & Northern Provinces. President Marek went over the committee assignments and discussion topics. After lunch, session 2 began. Unity business was conducted and the commit-





Mission presentations and updates were heard from Roy Janek (West Brethren), who reported on how the church was doing 2 years after the fertilizer plant explosion; Phil & Dr. Eunice Raiford (Mexico), Rob Thiessen (Mexico), John Brinkley (Ocker Brethren), who works with prosthetic limbs and eyes in Zambia, Africa; Rev. Jim Heckman (Cade Lake), and Carolyn Groseclose (Ocker Brethren), who serves as a missionary at New Day Orphanage in Zambia, Africa. Rev. Junek and David Miller (Wall Brethren) spoke about a Kairos Prison Ministry that they are both involved with.

The devotional Saturday morning was led by Pastor Tim Chaplin, pastor of Temple Brethren. Following the devotional, he reported on a "Feed My Sheep" ministry at the church. Other "Faith in Action" reports were from Rev. Linda Chandler (Austin Brethren) who has started a ministry called "Wrapped in the Word" quilt project and Bro. David Johnson (New Tabor Brethren) who leads a Sustain-

ing Food ministry in the Caldwell area. Speakers were Jimmy Pokorny (Taylor Brethren), who gave a Brethren history presentation, and Rev. James D. Sunday morning everyone gathered at Wesley Brethren Church for an outdoor service under a big tent set up next to the first church. A devotional was given by Jimmy Pokorny. Rev. Groseclose gave the welcome and announced that Wesley is celebrating the 140th anniversary of the organization of the Wesley congregation (1864-2014). The first church was built in 1866 and everyone was welcomed to tour the church. Bro. Mike proclaimed the event a family reunion. Pastors present were Groseclose, Junek, Tommy Tallas, J. Heil, Nello Strickland, Larry Zabcik, Jim Heckman, Larry Koslovsky, Joseph Polasek, and Kay Polasek. The











pastors who had served at Wesley all took part in the service: Heil, Strickland, Groseclose. Rev. Milton Maly was the pastor at Wesley from 1986-1998 but was unable to attend. Recognition was given to the oldest member in attendance, Miss Sylvia Vavra (99), who is a member of Houston Brethren and has family ties to Wesley.

Hymns sang included "To God Be the Glory" (convention hymn), "This is the day", "Sing Praise to God Who Reigns Above" (a hymn of the "ancient" Unity of the Brethren), and "He's Everything to Me". The pianist was Brenda Garrett. Rev. Heil led in the invitation for Holy Communion. Tallas delivered the message entitled "Playing Right Field in God's Kingdom." Special music was presented by former students of Hus School;

they sang "Hoj Verni v Boj" in Czech directed by Tallas and accompanied by pianist Donna Tallas.



History is then transformed into a story which its very name implies.

When it came to our church history, I knew about the life of Jan Hus and his example as we celebrate his life every year. As for the other people and events in our history, that was another matter entirely and a closer examination of my journey may be in order.

I am an avid reader. In 2012 I read a modern English translation of John Bunyan's allegory *The Pilgrim's Progress*. I have a fascination with allegories as they provide a unique opportunity of allowing one to see the truth but from a different perspective. I devoured this modern translation of Bunyan's classic in a matter of days and was so moved by it that I used it in my Sunday school class.

It was a joy to see the class having the same reaction to it that I did. One day I commented to Brother Jimmy about how well our study was going. In response he told me about an allegory that was written in the Czech language by John Amos Comenius, who also played a very prominent role in our history. That allegory was entitled *Labyrinth of the World and Paradise of the Heart*. He also told me about the life of Comenius, and I knew that I simply had to read this book.

I purchased an English translation of the book, which also included some excellent biographical information on Comenius. I was so impressed with it that I ordered additional copies for my class. We then studied both the life of Comenius and his allegory. This allegory has stood the test of time and it remains just as relevant today as it was when Comenius published his first edition in 1623. To this day I remain enamored with the book and have read it a number of times. I was also quite impressed with Comenius and consider him to be not only a man of extraordinary faith but a genius in every sense of the word.

In January 2013, Dr. Mark Labaj came to our church to present a oneday seminar on our history. I still have the notes I took down during his presentation. I have always felt a sense of belonging when it came to the Unity of the Brethren. After attending Brother Mark's seminar, I really understood why I felt that sense of belonging.

In 2014, my class was midway through the study of another classic of Christian literature, Mere Christianity by C. S. Lewis. At this point I knew I needed to begin the process of selecting our next study.

This is where events took a most interesting turn.

There was a particular theologian and scholar whom I have always held in very high regard. I went to Amazon's website and keved his name into the search window just to get a listing of his works. As I scanned through the list of results, one book stood out because it had absolutely no connection with this individual whatsoever.

That book was entitled A History of the Moravian Church by J. E. Hutton (1909).

Logically speaking, this made no sense at all. Intrigued, I previewed the first chapter. I was so moved by what I read that I immediately ordered enough copies for the class. I remain convinced that coincidence had absolutely nothing to do with this book turning up in that search.

When the shipment arrived I began to read my copy. I told Brother Jimmy how much I was looking forward to our study, and he recommended vet another book entitled The Theology of the Czech Brethren from Hus to Comenius by Craig D. Atwood (2009). I ordered a copy for myself and began reading it as soon as I completed Hutton's book.

A marvelous thing happened as I laid Atwood's theology on top of Hutton's history. That wonderful element of depth emerged. Through Hutton I was able to piece together the events and the people who were involved. Through Atwood I was better able to understand their motivation. My class is currently studying these two works in tandem. I was delighted to learn that the Executive Committee made it possible for every church within the Unity to receive a copy of Atwood's book as part of the commemoration of the martyrdom of Jan Hus.

From the Thiessens...

July 12, 2015

Dear friends,

I am writing from Texas, in the quiet Sunday afternoon after a busy three-day convention here among the Unity of the Brethren. The last time I wrote that name in a letter, many wanted to know who they are.

They are a small group of less than 2000 now, with big hearts, and come with a rich 600-year history tracing back to John Hus, a Czech reformer who paid the ultimate price at the stake in 1415. He prepared the road for the Reformation with other greats like Wycliffe, and was mightily used by God in middle Europe. The Moravian churches also trace back to him, albeit from a later date (1727). Their common forbears formally organized in 1457, and suffered long stretches of persecution and marginalization throughout the Czech lands. Many took advantage of the opportunities opening up in the United States, and there was a large migration of them in the mid 1800s. Many came to Texas, where they flourished mostly in the center of the state, initially as farmers. Today our closing celebration was in Wesley (which my GPS device could not find), at the first church building of this group, built 150 years ago.

Our history with them began when Anne lived on the eastern coast of Honduras working among refugees from the Nicaraguan conflicts of the early '80s. There she came to know several missionaries working with the Moravian churches that had been

established almost a century ago. A couple of them were from the Unity, working under the auspices of the Moravian church. When Anne and I first traveled to Mexico in 1992, we drove through Texas on our way down and stopped in Temple, TX, to visit Ray and Laurie Griggs. They hosted us for a few days, and introduced us to their church. That individual congregation soon began to support us, and a couple years later began to send short-term teams to visit. This all lead to significant support from the whole denomination in 1998 and us formally joining the Moravian mission board in 2001. They are still our single biggest supporter by far.

Dozens from here visited over the years, even one who stayed a year and a half! They went to Tlapa, and Ometepec, and Oaxaca; the three significant stages of our journey in southern Mexico. They also began supporting our teammates a few years ago, the Raifords. We have attended these conventions every two years since 1999 as well as traveling throughout Texas to visit individual congregations. I am very glad that I could make it to this convention now, even if without Anne, in order to visit again with old friends, make new ones, and thank them for their constant support of us, especially now during this next phase of our journey.

Speaking of which, Anne has completed five of the six initial treatments, the last one coming July 20th. She will have a mastectomy on September 1st, and then most likely radiation for the

In May of this year preparations were made for Vacation Bible School. Normally I share the responsibility of teaching the adult class so that I can take photographs on the evenings I am not required to teach. This year I must admit to being selfish. When I was informed that the adult class would focus on Jan Hus, I insisted on teaching every evening.

We have been blessed by God with a rich history and a remarkable heritage. I often compare the study of our history to the act of peeling an onion. As each layer is peeled away, you discover that there are many more layers hidden beneath. Some of the accounts are remarkably sad and, to continue the onion analogy, a few tears are to be expected.

Then, of course, the journey for me took an abrupt and unexpected detour to Nelsonville and Wesley. The Rev. Dr. David Schattschneider was scheduled to be our speaker at this year's convention. Due to circumstances beyond his control he was forced to cancel. I received an email from James Marek the day after we were informed. Understanding the spot we were in, I offered my services. I have always considered James a good

friend. Friendship aside, the level of trust James placed in me speaks volumes about him, and that trust is something I will always treasure.

As I prepared to leave Wesley, I recalled one particular evening in 2014. It was then that I realized that the 600th anniversary of the martyrdom of Jan Hus was on the horizon. I remembered thinking at the time, "I hope we can find some special way of commemorating Hus on that anniversary." I had no way of knowing at the time that I would be the one presenting the devotional about Hus at an outdoor worship service at a place as historically significant and special as Wesley. God must have interpreted my thought as a prayer because it could not possibly have been any more special for me.

Things do not always work out the way we plan them, but with God's help they always work out.

Such was the case in July 1917 when an American private named J. Robert Conroy found a puppy while training for combat. Conroy decided to keep the dog and named him Stubby because of his short tail.

Conroy was attached to the 102nd

Infantry, 26th Yankee Division. Conroy taught Stubby a number of things including how to salute by placing his right paw on his brow.

Conroy smuggled Stubby aboard his troop ship bound for France. Far out at sea, Stubby was discovered, but he quickly won over the affection of the sailors on board. When the ship arrived in France, Conroy smuggled Stubby ashore. All went well until Stubby was discovered by Conroy's commanding officer. Perhaps sensing the trouble Conroy was in, Stubby saluted the commander as taught. As a result, the commanding officer made Stubby the Division's mascot on the spot. An Army blanket was sacrificed and converted into a uniform for Stubby.

When the Division was sent to the front lines, Stubby accompanied the men. Surprisingly, he grew accustomed to the loud noises of battle. Stubby was injured in a gas attack. He was taken to a field hospital and treated for his injury. He recovered, but the experience made him extremely sensitive to gas. As a result, Stubby could smell approaching gas well before it reached the trenches. During such attacks, Stubby would alert the men both by barking and tugging at their uniforms. This allowed them more time to raise the gas alarm and this undoubtedly saved many lives.

Stubby also developed the skill of locating wounded Allied soldiers and alerting the men in the trenches as to their positions. Stubby was even credited with helping to capture a German spy who was mapping the Allied trench layout. According to the report filed, the spy assumed Stubby was friendly and called him. Stubby

apparently reacted to the spy's unusual accent and began barking furiously. American soldiers investigated and captured the spy. This action resulted in Stubby being promoted to the rank of Sergeant. Stubby thus became the first dog in the U.S. Army to receive a rank. Sergeant stripes were then sewn onto his uniform.

Stubby was eventually injured by shrapnel. After recovering from these wounds, he spent the remainder of the war visiting troop hospitals and boosting morale. Sergeant Stubby received numerous medals and awards during his tour of duty.

Both Stubby and Conroy survived the war. Sergeant Stubby died in 1926. He was stuffed and mounted and then dressed in his uniform and medals. He was presented to the Smithsonian in 1956.

As I stated before, things do not always work out the way we plan them, but with God's help they always work out. I have no way of knowing what God has in store for me down the road. For now I am simply enjoying the journey wherever He takes me. Just promise me that when my time comes, you won't have me stuffed and mounted.
