Moving Forward

What a quick turn of events. This past July I was attending the Unity Convention in Nelsonville and having a conversation over lunch with David Guthrie, who currently serves as Chairman, Moravian Southern Provincial Elders Conference. Our conversation centered around how the Moravians choose their president, where I learned that there is no nominating committee that contacts and presents a slate of candidates before their Synod (i.e. their convention). Instead, nominees are taken from the floor and votes are taken repeatedly until someone wins a majority. David said that there is no prior warning and the candidates must make an immediate choice about whether they are willing to uproot their lives and move to Winston-Salem. When it happened to him, he understood it to be God's calling to take on the new role.

Less than 15 minutes later, my old friend James Marek informed me that we no longer had a nominee for President and elections were scheduled for the afternoon session about 2 hours later (I had previously agreed to place my name in the hat for 1st Vice President, but was not interested in anything other than that). Without him saying the words, I understood that James was inquiring if I would consider taking the position. I was later approached by several others once word got out about the vacancy. David Guthrie's words about God's calling were ringing through my head. After some soul searching and discussions with Tami, I agreed to run,

and was elected President.

Those who know me have heard me talk of my favorite Bible Parable, which is the Parable of the Talents. I have tried to pattern my life around that teaching and will endeavor to be faithful with the talents that God has given me. It has been eight years since I last served in this position, and for those who are counting, this will be my fourth term as president of the Synodical Committee. Just as with the previous three, it is humbling to realize that the denomination that I grew up in and known all my life wants me to serve in this leadership role. I wish to thank those of you who had faith enough to elect me to this office once again, and commit to giving my best effort as we move forward together.

One of the things I like to do with these *Brethren Journal* articles is to present news of things going on around our denomination. I believe it is still an important means to communicate with the membership as a whole, so that is what you will be seeing from me in the months to come.

Granger Bell Tower

For those who may not have heard yet, the bell tower at the Granger Brethren Church is in poor condition and in danger of collapsing. The church has stopped ringing the two bells in it, which have served as signals of worship for over a century. Initial estimates of the repair cost was about \$60,000, but that figure could

rise as contractors begin working on this very old structure. The membership does not have the funds to make these repairs and are attempting to raise money through garage sales, donations, any other way they can. Unity History Symposium

As many of you know, the Unity sponsored a symposium on November 14 that centered around Jan Hus and the history of the original Unitas Fratrum. It was our celebration of the 600th anniversary of Jan Hus' martyrdom in 1415. We were privileged to have two renowned experts on the subject, Dr. Thomas Fudge and Dr. Craig Atwood, both of whom currently teach at the Moravian Seminary in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania. Approximately 150 attendees met at Blinn College to hear these speakers. I was very impressed with the quality of the presentations and came away with a far better understanding of how the events leading up to Jan Hus' death took place. Many of our long-held beliefs about Jan Hus and the early Unity were changed as a result of the symposium. The presentations were videotaped and will be made available to churches and individuals who may be interested.

Special thanks go to Dr. Dawn-Marie Baletka, Dr. Larry Koslovsky, and James Marek for organizing this event. I know that many others had parts in it, as well, and I thank you all for doing your part.

Going Forward

One of the things I hope to do during my term as president is to begin holding discussions about the future of the Unity of the Brethren in Texas. Rev. Tommy Tallas talked about this in his beautiful sermon at the old Wesley Church following the convention. Like many others, I see our membership declining and sense uncertainty about what the Unity will look like over the next one or two decades. It is my intent to have frank discussions about our strengths and weaknesses, opportunities and challenges ahead of us, and the potential we have for change that will almost certainly be necessary as we move forward. I would like to hear your thoughts on this subject as the process begins, so please contact me if you or your organization has something they would like to share.





moron after the long hot summer months! Yet here we are once more by God's precious grace, the start of a new year, January 2016! Wearing socks instead of flip flops. Dressing with layers so that we can brave the cold mornings and evenings and yet be comfortable in the slightly cool afternoons. New Year's resolutions swirl around in our minds. Time and again, the only resolution that seems to make heavenly sense is this:

Persist in seeking God's cleansing and the disintegration of power of the strongholds in your life, of those idols that rule your day after day.

The more consistently we are walking in Christ's power and not our own, the more we can accomplish to His glory!

So what idols do you need to dethrone this year? They usually fall into two categories:

1) yourself, and

2) pleasing others

How do we lead a life that makes room for no one else on the throne of our minds and our hearts except God? "A Way Out" - by Rhonda Johnson

1 Corinthians 10:13 "No temptation has overtaken you except what is common to mankind. And God is faithful; He will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, He will also provide a way out so that you can endure it."

As I over-hear my husband's phone conversations with people from all over the country and he gives them wise counsel, there is a phrase I have heard him repeat over and over, year after year. He tells people, "You won't be in this situation forever. This has an end date and you will move past where you are right now. You won't always be miserable as you are right now."

We need to know this, don't we? When we find ourselves in a "temptation" we need to know we will not always be upset, confused, hurting, or even grieving. There is an expiration date on our pain or situation.

Saul of Tarsus was a terrorist, in his time. In chapter nine of the book of Acts, Luke tells the story of how Saul went to the priests and obtained written authority to incarcerate anyone he found who was a Christian or in "*The Way*". On his way to carryout his vengeance against God, Saul had an experience on the road to Damascus that would change his life, and possibly even ours. As he saw a bright light he fell to the ground and the Lord appeared to him. From that moment, he could no longer see and needed the help of his fellow travelers to get into town to an Inn where he hoped to recover. Saul sat blinded for three days, no doubt repeating in his mind the words The Lord said to him, "Why do you persecute me?" The living Savior of the world took personally Saul's torture to his victims.

I think this should give us pause the next time we consider saying something less than kind to a fellow believer, much less our pastors and church leaders.

Three days in darkness and total blindness probably seemed a lot longer than 72 hours to Saul at the time. If I were him I would have thought the blindness was permanent, that I would be blind and have to beg for the rest of my days on earth. I would have thought the darkness and new assignment to poverty was punishment for the brutality and harm I had caused Jesus' beloved friends and saints, but there was another man on the other side of the city with his own assignment in the situation.

While Saul sat in darkness, God

was working on the way out. Ananias was God's servant; he was seeing a God-given vision during the time of Saul's dark hours; a vision to restore the most feared man by Christians. In this vision God didn't just tell Ananias *what* to do, but He gave him Saul's address and instructed him to go and lay his hands on him and pray for his sight to be restored.

I can completely relate to Ananias as he reminded God in verse 13 of the 9th chapter of Acts of who exactly Saul was. I'm pretty sure I've done things very similar to this, myself. However, God said, "Go!" "*This is My chosen instrument* to carry My name before the Gentiles and their kings and before the people of Israel. I will show him how much he must suffer for my name."

That would be my luck, just as I finish telling God how awful someone is, I find out they are God's "chosen instrument" to do a great and mighty work for God's Kingdom. So, of course, Ananias went and laid his hands on the equivalent of our modern day ISIS, Hitler, Sadaam Husein... and Saul's sight was restored.

When you're sitting in darkness, seeking God and waiting for Him to show up in your situation, remember Saul. Saul sat in darkness for what, I'm sure, seemed longer than three days. The time he sat in darkness God was changing his heart, dealing with his unbelief, showing himself to Saul so he could become the great Apostle Paul. God makes us great in our darkness, but all the while He is working to bring us out, just as His word promises in 1 Corinthians chapter 10:13. A way out has already been provided. Trust the Lord, embrace the darkness and let God have His way in your heart while you wait on vour Ananias.



- 2. Ask: What are we supposed to do? (Look at the verbs.) How do we do those things?


Practice the Proverb:

• To submit to the Lord, we need to listen to His

guidance. Use the following activity to demonstrate

"Amplifying God's Voice".

- o Blow up a balloon.
- o Have children take turns doing the following: Put your ear up to the balloon. Tap very gently on the other side. Scratch very gently on the other side. What do you hear?
- o Have someone press hard on both sides while you listen through the top and tap on the bottom. Does the sound get softer or louder?
- o EXPLANATION: When air enters the balloon, its molecules are forced closer together. The constricted molecules become a great conductor of sound. The more constricted the molecules become, the greater the conduction of sound occurs. Pressing hard on the sides further compresses the molecules and the sounds become louder.

Comenius Revisited

On Saturday, November 14, 2015, a symposium was held on the campus of Blinn College in Brenham, Texas, entitled "Jan Hus After 600 Years: History and Heritage."

Dr. Thomas Fudge delivered the morning presentation, *The Prophetic Voice of Jan Hus for American Christianity in 2015*.

The Rev. Dr. Craig Atwood had the afternoon presentation, *The Spirituality and Ethics of the Original Unity of the Brethren.*

I learned a great deal, and also had the opportunity to speak with both speakers individually.

I especially enjoyed visiting with Dr. Atwood. It was obvious from his presentation that he held John Amos Comenius in very high regard. If you have read my articles or attended my Sunday school class, you are only too aware that I have a tremendous amount of respect and admiration for Comenius.

I informed Dr. Atwood that my class is studying his book, *The Theology of the Czech Brethren from Hus*

to Comenius. I was delighted to share with him the fact that we are currently studying that portion of his book that discusses Comenius. I was also quite happy to inform him that we had already completed a study of the allegory written by Comenius, *Labyrinth of the World and Paradise of the Heart*.

We discussed Comenius at length and are in agreement that Comenius was far more than simply the pious dreamer that some experts would have us believe.

My purpose in this article is to share with you some key points Dr. Atwood delivered on Comenius from his presentation along with some of my own observations. For the sake of both clarity and credit, excerpts from Dr. Atwood's presentation are clearly noted.

Atwood – Comenius was the most important theologian in the history of the Unity. He was a bishop, teacher, author, and social reformer. He wrote hundreds of works. He tried to pre-

Comenius came into the world as Jan Komensky. His teacher gave him the middle name Amos because Comenius loved to learn. From the teacher's perspective, Amos was a play on the French word amour or love. As the years went by, Comenius came to associate the name more with the Old Testament prophet. The more I study Comenius, the more convinced I am of his true genius.


Atwood – The Brethren were exiles and pilgrims. Comenius wrote, "I say this to you, my brethren, the remaining sons of my scattered church: love the Lord and serve Him with all your heart, not blushing at His cross, which you have carried thus far and will carry all the way to the end if you are wise. I firmly commend to you the inheritance of Christ: pauperdom and the cross, which will be the way of eternal riches and glory for you, if you have the mind of Christ persevering to the end."

One of the things that emerge from the writings of Comenius is that there are fundamentals where Christianity is concerned. These fundamentals are of a practical nature. Christianity is not merely a belief system, but rather something that is to be experienced throughout the lifetime of the Christian.


Atwood – Comenius wrote Unum Necessarium (The One Thing Necessary) in 1668 for the exiled son of Frederick V. In it, he returns to the theme of Labyrinth of the World. He compares us to Sysiphus from Greek mythology. The more we seek happiness, the less happy we are.

According to Homer, Sysiphus was the wisest of all mortals. Condemned by the gods, his punishment was to endlessly roll a large rock to the top of a mountain. Each time he neared the summit, the weight of the rock caused it to roll back to the bottom. There, Sysiphus would reclaim his burden and repeat the cycle endlessly. Apparently the ancient Greeks were of the opinion that there could be no worse punishment than labor that was both futile and hopeless.

Atwood – In Unum Necessarium, Comenius wrote, "Christ especially explains and applies His rule (about keeping everywhere the one thing necessary), as in commending everywhere the THREAD OF SIMPLICITY against everything multiple or too





great, for extricating oneself from all labyrinths." Additionally: "What can one do to lighten oneself from the useless exhaustion of labors? He urged us to get rid of our excess bother for earthly things, and to rest in the paternal care of God for us."

In *Labyrinth of the World*, Christ tells the pilgrim (who is in fact Comenius), "Why should you care for an abundance of riches? Why should you desire this? Life requires little, and it is my business to provide for each one who serves me. Therefore endeavor to collect inner riches, piety and illumination, and I will give you everything else. Be sure of this: heaven as well as earth will be yours by hereditary right. These riches will neither oppress nor burden you, but give you unspeakable joy."

Atwood – A Christian means a disciple and imitator of Christ, that is, one who believes what Christ taught, does what He commanded, and hopes for what He promised. Therefore he alone is truly is truly a Christian who really believes the teaching of Christ, really does what He commands, really has faith in His promises. If we want to speak more sublimely, it can be said: "A Christian is a man like Christ, and through that likeness is able to be deified."

Atwood – The keys to spirituality...

I. Do not burden yourself with anything beyond that which is necessary; be satisfied with the few things that benefit you; praise God.

II. If conveniences are lacking, be satisfied with only necessities.

III. And if they are taken away, strive to save yourself.

IV. If you are not able to save yourself, abandon yourself, only taking care that you do not lose God. For he who has God is able to lack all other things, for he will forever possess his highest good and eternal life with God, and in God.

Comenius was a man only too familiar with loss – the Thirty Years War, the deaths of his wife and two children, the destruction of his home, the burning of his library and manuscripts, and the persecution and demise of the early Unity. During this darkest period of his life Comenius wrote *Labyrinth of the World and Paradise of the Heart,* which remains as beautiful and relevant today as when Comenius wrote it almost four centuries ago.

In that allegory Comenius wrote of the loss of his family: "Suddenly a terrible storm struck unexpectedly, with lightning, thunder, and frightful hail. Everyone around me scattered, except for those who were joined to me. Though I also ran into a corner with them, the arrows of Death struck my three companions."

Atwood – We are to reject the religion of Cain, which "is jealous of the grace of God to man, and establishes sects and starts persecution because of disagreement in religion, and causes bloodshed, and seeks earth instead of heaven."

Atwood – We should embrace the religion of Abel, which includes "humble faith, active charity, and hope directed towards heaven and eternity."

Christ speaks to the pilgrim in *Labyrinth of the World* concerning this as well: "You have seen in the world how people perform religious ceremonies and stir up disputes over them. Let your religion be to serve Me in quietness and to be free from bondage to ceremonies, for I do not require them of you. When you serve me as I teach you, in spirit and in truth, then quarrel no longer with anyone in these matters, even if they

call you a hypocrite, a heretic, or anything else. Rather cling quietly to Me, and continue in My service."

Atwood – In Panorthosia, Comenius discusses peacefulness stating, "Anyone choosing to use compulsion only embitters, poisons, and alienates men, and either makes them hypocrites or prepares the way for a fresh and perhaps greater breakaway. Fear is a poor guarantee of friendship.

Atwood – Comenius believed that the world is a divine gift. He stated that God has provided us with a world filled with wholesome delights that are to be enjoyed as a way to grow in the knowledge and love of God.

Atwood – In another passage from *Panorthosia*, Comenius wrote that God works through us. In it he states, "Christ nevertheless wishes His people to cooperate with Him. For as God does all His work apart from creation through His creatures themselves, the first acting through the second, so Christ does all His work apart from that of Redemption through others."

Atwood – "Whenever you encounter one of your neighbors, regard him as yourself in another form (which he is), or indeed as God in another form,

Amidst the mostly barren trees and leavecarpeted hills, we are spending this long weekend with Philip, up from Texas, and Cailey (his girlfriend) over from Vermont. She came with four other girls, driving on Wednesday, and returning tomorrow. First time for most of them, so of course, yesterday afternoon and evening were spent at Niagara Falls.

We had a more or less traditional meal on Thursday, and then yesterday morning got a Christmas tree, complete with white lights (from the thrift shop). Anne is still debating whether to leave it with its simple lights or add a bit of colour somehow. I'll know when I get back from Oaxaca on the 10.

Philip and I fly out tomorrow from Toronto in the later afternoon, he returning to university, and me to Oaxaca. Merry Christmas,

Emmanuel God with us. Isn't it amazing to think the creator of solar systems and eyeballs, and wind and love, became a baby to save us from our own junk. No other religion has that.

When we ask our Buddhist friends, "Who created all these beautiful mountains and people?" They look at us with a sort of look that says, "What a crazy question," and then they say, "I have no idea." We ask, "Did Buddha create people?" They answer again with a crazy look saying, "No, he was just a person." Again we ask, "Does Buddha love you? Can he forgive your sins?" They answer, "I for he is the image of God, and God will be watching to see how reverently you treat him." – Comenius.

In *Labyrinth*, Christ explains to the pilgrim. "The essence of the entire law is that he should love God above all that can be named and sincerely wish as much good to his neighbor as himself. I have heard the sum of God's law comprised in these two commands highly praised, and I myself have seen and tested that they are worth more than all the innumerable laws, rules, and decrees of the world. Indeed, they are a thousand times more perfect."

It is easy to see why one can hold Comenius in such high regard. The works of Comenius stand the test of time and retain their elegance and truth as much today as when he first put quill to paper.

Labyrinth of the World and Paradise of the Heart is a treasure of Czech literature. Comenius wrote this epic after the Battle of White Mountain. At this point in time even the Czech language was subject to attack. By the 1700's its use as a literary language had all but ceased.

According to Karel Kucera: "The Czech of Comenius has an extraordinary functional range, and it represents the culmination of efforts to create a formally perfect literary language capable of the widest communication.

On the heels of that statement, I leave you with perhaps my favorite excerpt from Labyrinth, where Christ says to the pilgrim: "Son," He said, "I live in two places, in my home in heaven and in the penitent heart on earth. So from this time forward. I want you also to have two dwellings: one here at home, where I promised to dwell with you; the other with me in heaven. I give you these wings (which are the desire for eternal things and prayer) so that you might reach heaven. Whenever you wish, you will be able to raise yourself up to Me so that we may experience delight in one another."

The historic Granger Brethren Church steeple is in need of repair. Estimates have been submitted and contractors are being considered; however, the cost exceeds the church's funds.

As early as 1892, the desire to build a church in Granger had begun. The members had selected a building committee, pledged \$500, and had gone to work doing all the labor themselves. A church was built and a dedication service was held on September 22, 1901.

Two years later on December 29, 1903, the Granger Brethren Church became the birthplace of the denomination when the Unity of the Brethren, first called the Evangelical Unity of the Czech-Moravian Brethren in North America, was organized. Twentytwo delegates from 11 congregations and preaching stations of the Czech Brethren in Texas gathered to form a unified church body after having been inspired by the writings of the Rev. Adolf Chlumsky, who was publishing the *Brethren Journal*. It was he and

the Granger members who provided much of the impetus for such a significant and challenging step.

The Granger Brethren church has played a large role in the Unity's development and basis. The church is unique in its choice of a spandrel: the beautiful star and chalice. Tucked away in the steeple is a document signed by the original local church fathers in Granger who built the steeple. Within the steeple are two historic bells, one for church services and one for funerals. The complete history and photos can be found on our web page, www.grangerbrethren.org.

We believe the Granger Brethren Church steeple to be worthy of repair/ preservation.
