

So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today.


Matthew 6:34

We pray for daily bread – physical sustenance for 24 hours, even as the Lord sends manna to the Israelites one day at a time except in preparation for the Sabbath. It was then and is now always just enough for the day. Not only do we need and receive physical nourishment, but also spiritual, emotional, and relational nourishment on a daily basis. So we pray,

Stepping into a new day is only by the grace of God, by virtue of God's love, grace, and faithfulness.

On Friday, May 13, 2016, I celebrated my 25th anniversary with my firm. Please do not read too much into the word "celebrated". The corporation that acquired us in November 2014 is not exactly big on celebration. Our Senior Managing Director did stop by my office that morning and offered a handshake and a few congratulatory remarks. After that, it was business as usual.

All things considered, 25 years is still a milestone, and in today's world it is the exception rather than the rule.


I have always found reflection to be an important part of life. Reflection allows us to see both how far we have come and how much we have grown. In this particular case, it also allows me to see that it was far easier for me to share my faith on the job in 1991 than it is in 2016.

In today's multinational corporate world, the sharing of one's faith is most definitely frowned upon. I find it more than a bit ironic that we are expected to show concern for the feelings of others, but not so much their eternal souls. Still, opportunities have arisen over the course of those 25 years where matters of faith could not and would not be denied.

Shortly after I was hired by the firm I found myself in the middle of a rather interesting project. One of our clients considered purchasing a company in the area that had come up for sale. We were hired in order to make certain that the seller had not overstated the value of its assets.

The project was taken on by my vice president and, after we ran a few calculations, he decided a trip to the seller's office was in order. Some research into their older records was necessary. A meeting was arranged, and early one morning we set out to meet with the current owner.

The owner was extremely cordial and forthcoming with some of the information. When the topic turned to records of the oldest assets he telephoned his father, from whom he inherited the business. \rightarrow



A short time later, the man's father arrived, and he quickly located the records we wanted to see. About 11 a.m. he suggested we break for lunch. He knew the best restaurant in town, and said we would have to get there early if we wished to be seated.

The restaurant was a short walk down the street, and a line had already formed that stretched just outside the door. About 11:30 we were seated and our orders were taken. My vice president and the current owner were talking shop. I sat across from the older gentleman, who asked me a question I could not have anticipated. "You know Jesus Christ, don't you?"

I told him that I did. "I thought so," he replied. He then proceeded to tell me how reading from the book of Hebrews one evening after he retired had changed his life. One verse in particular struck a chord deep within him.

Hebrews 13:3 (NET) – Remember those in prison as though you were in prison with them, and those ill-treated as though you too felt their torment.

Upon reading that verse he felt moved to start a prison ministry. He knew he would not be able to do this alone, so he immediately picked up the phone and began calling some old friends he had made throughout his years in business to see if any would be willing to assist him in this venture.

To his great surprise, only one of the men he called turned him down. The rest agreed on the spot.

He then told me about the obstacles and red tape he and his friends had to overcome before they were allowed to reach out to any prisoners. The day finally arrived when they would be allowed to minister to their first handful of prisoners. Their excitement turned into dread when they realized that neither the prison staff nor the men they were trying to reach welcomed them with open arms. He immediately realized that he and his friends came from a different world than these men and they instinctively knew it.

"Can you guess what happened?", he asked. Frankly, I was so caught up in his story that I found it difficult to speak. I merely shook my head in response.

"Well, that's when the Holy Spirit took over and reminded me of that

verse I read in Hebrews." He told the prisoners that he knew they felt disrespected. They felt disrespected by society, guards, and even other inmates. "All of us in this room," he said, "are men. That means we are all worthy of respect. We are worthy of respect because Jesus Christ willingly laid down His life for every one of us in this room. Because He did that, every man in this room is a child of God and is deserving of respect. Whenever we come into this room, we will enter it as men and we will respect one another."

I will always remember this man and his story. He and his friends succeeded because he completely followed through with the leading of the Holy Spirit. By doing this they successfully tore down barriers, found common ground upon which each participant found equal footing and the word of God could flourish.

As for me, time went by and the sharing of faith in the workplace became more challenging.

Some years ago, we hired an engineer from India. About a month into her tenure, a group of friends from her previous job invited her to lunch one Friday in December. I could tell that she was really looking forward to this outing because it tended to dominate her conversation.

The day finally arrived and she met up with her friends as planned.


Later that day, she encountered a software problem and asked me for my assistance. I entered her office, sat down at her computer and began running some diagnostics.

Demonstration of the Proverb for Teens:

If... we understand that wisdom is like a great treasure Then...we will respect God and know Him well.



Understand the Proverb:


Read Proverbs 2:6. Have the students brainstorm ways that we can grow in wisdom. Here are some examples:

- 1. Trust Jesus as our Savior and honor God.
- 2. Read His word, since the Bible teaches us how to find wisdom.
- 3. Make right choices.
- 4. Stay away from wrong choices (sin).
- 5. If we do sin, ask for forgiveness and learn from our mistakes

Practice the Proverb

Read the following statements. Have the students make a W (by slanting both arms in the air) if the statement shows someone using wisdom. Have them cross their arms and shake their heads if the statement shows someone lacking wisdom (LW).

- 1. Even though Damien had been coming to church for a while, he realized that he had never invited Jesus to be his Lord and Savior. He decided to make a decision to follow God. (W)
- 2. Cara could never understand her Bible, so she quit trying to read it. (LW)
- 3. Ivette knew she was wrong when she stole her friend's money, so she returned it and asked for forgiveness. She never stole anything after that. (W)
- 4. Trent didn't understand his Bible either, but he kept trying. He read it in small parts and he asked questions when he didn't get it. He couldn't believe some of the stories that were in there! (W)
- 5. Derek wasn't prepared for the test, so he cheated. He knew it was wrong, but it got him good grades without having to work hard, so he kept doing it. (LW)
- 6. While Ji Yeong was at a friend's house, the friend started playing a video game that Ji Yeong's mom would not have liked. Since he knew it was wrong, he ended up leaving right away. (W)
- 7. Samantha loved being popular, wearing name brand clothes, and getting everyone's attention. The Bible, in her opinion, was old and didn't have anything good to say. Besides, her favorite TV shows told her how to act anyway. (LW)

Pray:


Jesus, Rule my thoughts. Jesus, Rule my heart. Holy Spirit, Fill me till there is no room in me for anything but You and Your power.



One of my fond memories of growing up in the country was that my grandparents both had gardens. My mother's family grew everything, but I especially liked the potatoes. There were so many of them that I thought we were Irish. (You know "Irish Potatoes"). But according to our family ancestry records, not one came from Ireland. My Daddy's side always had a wonderful garden as well. The tomatoes and watermelons were so sweet and juicy. I heard someone the other day reminiscing about stealing watermelons from other people's gardens. Evidently, young people did that a lot.

So Ben has been tending to his garden, and it is doing well for his first try in years. Thanks to those of you who let him know that broccoli and cauliflower are fall vegetables and will not produce in the warm summer months. He pulled those up and planted other things there. It was suggested to him that he "thin" out some of the plants. That was tough on him as he loved each one of his plants equally. Finally, after much thought and trepidation he did take some out. But to me, it doesn't seem to be enough. He still goes out to check his garden once a day, some times more.

He built a short fence to shut off the side of the house so that Bella (our Shih-Tzu) didn't "mess up" his plants. After a while, he decided that Bella didn't really care about trampling his garden as she had other interests, like the dogs in the other yard. So, he left the little gate open. And, a day or so later when he went to check his garden, there were two rabbits in there. I think that they knew that he needed to prune some of the plants! Bella was with him that fateful day. And, I wish you could have heard the "hollering" going on out there, not to mention the barking. Bella was delighted! She finally had her rabbit cornered. I wish you could have been there to run 'em out! Talk about excitement! I don't think that I had that much fun and excitement when the kids were growing up.

And so, my thoughts reflect back to Jesus using the analogy of God



being the Master Gardener of our lives in John 15:1-8, where Jesus says:

1. "I am the true vine, and My Father is the gardener.

2. "He cuts off every branch in Me that bears no fruit, while every branch that does bear fruit He prunes so that it will be even more fruitful.

3. "You are already clean because of the word I have spoken to you.

4. "Remain in Me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in Me.

5. "I am the vine, you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from Me you can do nothing.

6. "If you do not remain in Me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and withers; such branches are picked up, thrown into the fire and burned.

7. "If you remain in Me and My words remain in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you.

8. "This is to My Father's glory, that you bear much fruit, showing yourselves to be My disciples."

Like Ben with his garden, we, too, need to be careful not to leave our gates open to worldly things lest we become barren. Grape vines need a lot of pruning and, as one gardener once said, you need to cut off the "suckers" that are using up nourishment. In our lives "suckers" can be those things that take time away from God: internet browsing, watching TV, and the list goes on. Take a look at your life. Are you producing fruit? Do you need to prune the "suckers"?

Think about it and read the above scripture slowly, reflectively, and carefully. Are you leaving your gate open? Are the rabbits of the world sneaking in to destroy you? Today is the day to change your world.

Always remember that no matter what comes, God loves you because you are you!
