What does it mean to be mature? Emotionally or socially I am certain we can pinpoint a definition for maturity, but what about spiritual maturity? Does it mean that you can quote the books of the Bible forward and backward? Or could it mean that you are so close to Jesus that nothing truly ever bothers you?

Is it possible that spiritual maturity is demonstrated through an equitable mindset that views all religions as viable?

Certainly, if you have come into a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, you understand that Christianity is the one way to eternal rest and to exquisite joy in the here and now. As Christians, we are far from perfect as society might qualify it, but somehow, we are "made perfect" or "made over into Jesus' likeness" with every passing day, as we strive to depend on Him to create the tapestry that is the best, most Christ-like, version of ourselves.

How does Jesus create this tapestry of holiness, of heavenly perfection within us? The answer:

He calls upon us to decide of our own free will to live as He lived. We are meant to learn as Jesus learned while He was on earth.

In the Letter to the Hebrews, in the Holy Bible, we find answers. Let's look at chapter 5, verses 7-10 (NRSV):

In the days of His flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save Him from death, and He was heard because of His reverent submission. Although He was a Son, He learned obedience through what He suffered; and having been made perfect, He became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey Him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

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
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A Whale of a Tale - by Jim Pokorny


Teaching an adult Sunday School class is something I am very passionate about. We place a great deal of emphasis on teaching the young, and rightfully so. Yet, learning is meant to be an experience that continues throughout our lives. That is why I try to challenge the students in my class. Together we have studied classics of Christianity by John Bunyan, C. S. Lewis, and Comenius, to name but a few. As I write these lines, we are wrapping up an in-depth study of church history from the vantage points of two different authors whose lives are separated by an entire century. I am delighted to say we will soon embark on a study of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's The Cost of Discipleship.

To be honest, I seem naturally drawn to such works. Some time back I understood why. I am drawn to them because they allow me to see the truth, but from a different perspective. When that occurs something changes. It is not the truth that changes, for if it did it would cease being the truth. The change takes place within me, and such changes are always for the better.

I know that my students trust me, and I take that trust very seriously. Their comments to me validate that trust and affirm that these different perspectives impact their lives, as well. In fact, one of my students often states how glad she is that I find these books. My response is to give credit where it is due. It is God who makes certain that these works find me.

This is true even of books and other media that occupy my personal time, as well. Even works of fiction have lessons to teach if you look deeply enough.

One such work found me again Labor Day weekend. While doing my shopping, I came across a DVD of the 1998 Hallmark Channel miniseries *Moby Dick* starring Patrick Stewart as Captain Ahab and featuring Gregory Peck as Father Mapple. I remembered this miniseries from its original airing almost two decades ago. I purchased a copy and planned to watch it again in the future.

Whether we are talking about the book or its numerous film adaptations, my fondness for the story continues to this day. Despite any rumors you might hear, the fact that the Starbucks coffee chain named itself after one of the main characters is purely coincidental.

Although I live alone, I must state for the record that I do not make a practice of talking to myself. I found myself really wanting to watch the first installment that evening. That small inner voice tried its best to warn me, "If you start watching it now, you will just end up watching the whole thing before going back to work! Then you will find Melville's book and you will start reading it again!"

That small inner voice also has the most annoying habit of being correct. Ignoring its warning I watched the first installment. Immediately afterward I went to my primary bookshelf, found Melville's book (second shelf, third from left) pulled it and set it on the coffee table for future reading. By the end of the Labor Day holiday I watched the miniseries in its entirety and began reading *Moby Dick* again with pen and paper at the ready to note the many lessons in faith it offers.

I believe that it is a common dream among those who write to imagine that they will one day write the great American novel. To anyone still clinging to that dream, I would suggest they set a different goal. In my opinion Melville already accomplished that in 1851 with *Moby Dick* and it is very unlikely that any other author's attempt could surpass it.

I am a bit concerned that Melville's classic will fall out of favor because it utilizes the practice of whaling as a backdrop. Historically speaking, whaling in America was a reality, and the gears of the Industrial Revolution would have ground to a halt without whale oil, which was used as both a

lubricant and a fuel. That said, faith does play a major role in the novel. There are simply too many instances for me to share in one article alone. Some, like Father Mapple's marvelous sermon on the book of Jonah, will likely be the subject of future endeavors.

For the time being I opted to focus on one aspect of the novel that had the greatest impact on me during this particular reading – the friendship between a Christian named Ishmael and a savage named Queequeg.

The story is told from Ishmael's perspective. He is a former merchant sailor who wants to try his hand at whaling. Having little money when he arrives in New Bedford, he is informed by the local innkeeper that he will have to share both a bedroom and its single bed with a harpooner whom he has never met before. Ishmael does not relish the idea of sharing such accommodations with a complete stranger. He decides to stay awake until he has a chance to at least meet the man. After waiting a considerable amount of time, Ishmael decides to turn in for the night. Initially he has both the room and the bed to himself.

Eventually the harpooner enters the room and goes about his nightly routine completely oblivious to the fact that Ishmael is lying on the bed hidden in the shadows. As the harpooner turns, Ishmael gets his first glimpse of Queequeg's tattooed face. Ishmael initially mistakes these marks for bruises the stranger likely earned in that evening's brawl. As Queequeg prepares for bed Ishmael notices the stranger's chest and arms are also covered with these same "bruises".

He lights it and springs into the bed which he assumes to be empty. Ishmael attempts to speak. The surprised Queequeg brandishes the business end of the tomahawk pipe and grunts, "Who-e debel you? You no speak-e... I kill-e."

Ishmael shouts for the innkeeper and leaps from the bed as he enters the room. The landlord restores order and admonishes the island harpooner, "Queequeg, look here – you sabbee me, I sabbee you – this man sleepe you – you sabbee?"

Queequeg grunts, "Me sabbee plenty." He returns to smoking his pipe. He turns to Ishmael, points to the bed and flatly grunts, "You gettee in."

Ishmael reflects on what has just transpired. He thinks, "What's all this fuss I have been making about... the man's a human being just as I am; he has just as much reason to fear me as I have to be afraid of him. Better sleep with a sober cannibal than a drunken Christian."

The innkeeper departs. Ishmael turns in, and later admits that he never slept better in his life.

This awkward encounter begins what many would consider to be the strangest of friendships – one between a Christian sailor and a pagan harpooner – a friendship that will only grow deeper and stronger as time goes by.


One day after a service is held at the chapel, Ishmael returns to the inn and quietly observes Queequeg picking up a large book from a table. The harpooner lays the book open upon his lap and carefully counts out the first 50 pages. That done, he proceeds to count out the next 50 pages and so on. Ishmael determines that Queequeg can count to no more than 50. In silence he marvels at Queequeg's

Ishmael studies the savage's tattooed face and finds something agreeable in its countenance. Ishmael thinks, "You cannot hide the soul."

After supper, the two friends return to the room they share. Queequeg removes all the money he has in his wallet which amounts to 30 dollars in silver. He methodically divides this into two equal shares and states that half now belongs to Ishmael. Ishmael is about to protest. Queequeg perhaps senses this and deposits the coins into Ishmael's pocket before he can do so.

The bond between Ishmael and Queequeg continues to grow, and the relationship eventually turns into a truly remarkable friendship. Ishmael reminds himself that he is a Christian "born and bred in the bosom of the infallible Presbyterian Church." In considering the vast differences in their backgrounds, a beautiful thought dawns in the mind of Ishmael: "But what is worship? – to do the will of God – that is worship. And what is the will of God? – to do to my fellow man what I would have my fellow man do to me – that is the will of God." Ishmael finds some of Queequeg's peculiarities objectionable at first, but he even learns to put these aside and concludes, "yet see how elastic our stiff prejudices grow when love once comes to bend them."

As the friendship deepens, Ishmael wants to learn more about Queequeg and his island home. He learns that Queequeg is the son of one of the tribal chiefs of Kokovoko, "an island far away to the West and South. It is not down on any map; true places never are." One day a ship from Sag Harbor visited his father's bay. Oueequeg wanted to visit the Christian lands. Risking life and limb, he managed to board the vessel as it sailed away. Once aboard, he simply refused to leave. The ship's captain had no choice but to make Queequeg a part of the crew and vowed to make a whaleman of him.

Queequeg's desire was a noble one. He hoped to learn from Christians and then return to his own people. His desire was to make his people happier than they were. He also wanted to make them better than they were. These desires were crushed when he learned that Christians "could

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be both miserable and wicked; infinitely more so, than all his father's heathens." Queequeg admitted defeat in this endeavor and concluded "it's a wicked world in all meridians; I'll die a pagan."

Ishmael and Queequeg next travel by ship to Nantucket in order to seek employment aboard the same whaling vessel. Along the way a man is thrown overboard by a swinging boom. Oueequeg springs into action. He quickly secures the boom, strips to the waist and dives in to save the man despite the wintry conditions. After swimming for several minutes in the frigid water, Queequeg locates and takes hold of the seemingly lifeless form. The two are picked up by a boat and the young man is revived. Once returned to the ship Ishmael studies his companion, who appears to be thinking: "It's a mutual joint-stock world, in all meridians. We cannibals must help these Christians."


All this is merely the beginning of the story Melville relates concerning

the friendship between Ishmael and Queequeg – the friendship between a Christian and a pagan. Through this relationship Melville holds up a mirror to Christianity and asks it to take a good long look at itself – to examine up close how its actions have the power to repel as well as attract those it is commanded to reach. In doing so, it is possible that it might not really like everything it sees in that reflection.

Still, Melville does not leave us without hope. His implication is that it is still possible for the individual believer to live out his faith, and therein lies hope for us all.

And so, my study of *Moby Dick* continues just as that small inner voice warned me it would. As for additional works finding me, that continues, as well. Just the other day a coworker stopped by my office and said, "I understand you are reading *Moby Dick*. If you like that, then I know another book you might enjoy."

I do believe I heard that small inner voice sigh.


Thankful Pillows


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Honor the LORD with your wealth and the first fruits of all your produce; **PROVERBS 3:9**

Understand the Proverb:

- 1. Ask children to think of their most treasured possession. Suppose you were asked to give that thing away. What would you say?

- 3. Read Proverbs 11:24. This verse is talking about 2 kinds of attitudes about giving. What attitudes do you see? We see someone who gives freely and someone who holds back from giving. Can you think of a word that describes a person who gives freely? (Generous, sharing, unselfish, giving, bighearted, open handed, charitable) What word comes to mind when you think of a person who doesn't give or holds back from giving? (Stingy, not generous, closefisted, greedy, selfish, uncharitable, ungenerous, tight-fisted,)
- 4. We give because God has given everything to us. Genesis 1:1: "In the beginning, created the heavens and earth." The rest of Genesis 1 tells us about all that was created. Who created all things? (God)
- 5. We give because God has given us salvation through the death of His Son Jesus. (Genesis 1:26, 28-29) God created all things. God gave Adam and Eve everything on earth to take care of. He gave Adam and Eve every plant and tree with fruit for food to eat. There were many trees for Adam and Eve to choose from to eat. God told them there was one tree that they could not eat from. The tree of the knowledge of good and evil was the only tree that Adam and

Fall is upon us even here in Mexico. The air is getting cooler, but unfortunately the leaves don't change to those bright orange, vellows, and reds

Eunice and I have been busy running the clinic and helping our friends learn more about God and the life He wants for us all Even as we work deep in Southern Mexico, we still hear things about American politics. And as the election is coming to a close, we are all tired of the political rhetoric and how government can make your life so much better (or how the other side ruins your life).

In all the noise though, there are some things that are true. One of the big talking points is that small businesses are the backbone of our economy and country. Through the years, whether in Nicaragua or Mexico, Eunice and I do believe in creating small businesses for people and that those businesses are important. Many

of the people we work with are young newlyweds who struggle to find their own path in life. We work hard to teach them about economic independence and how that fits into God's plan for our lives. Listening to our friends, living among them and teaching them the principles of a Christian life, allows us take their economic struggles and turn them into a life lesson where God becomes the focus as provider and and source of inspiration and creativity.

Here in Juquila, after years of talking and working odd jobs, Tadeo came to me with a new job opportunity. He had thought hard about how to provide for his new family and even began to dream about it. He told me about restoring old machetes and fixing the handles. He had already collected ten machetes that had been thrown away as useless. He knew that this could be a job he could do at home and it is something that is not provided in the village. It may seem simple, but Tadeo has already begun to see new possibilities in his life. where he is able to be creative and



So next time you hear about the importance of small businesses, smile to yourself, knowing that God's hidden truth is right there, coming out of the mouths of people who do not even know what they are saying. That truth is being taught to people around the globe, and that truth will be revealed to all who seek Him.

Industry Brethren Church Columbarium



The Industry Brethren Church has a columbarium at its site since October 20, 2013, when it was dedicated. A columbarium is a place for holding urns of deceased's cremated remains. The Latin term "Columba" means "dove" and originally referred to compartmentalized housing for doves and pigeons called dovecote. A white dove was released when the columbarium was dedicated at Industry. These structures can be in the ground as a garden feature, within the walls or structures of a church, or free standing as this one is at Industry Brethren Church. It is directly across from the main church cemetery near the church building beneath a round decorative glass

window of Jesus.

The construction of columbaria within churches is particularly found in the Czechoslovak Hussite Church. One example of this is the Church of St. Nicolas in Old Town Square in Prague, Czechoslovak.

The columbarium was donated in honor/memory of Travis Kasmiersky. There are 12 compartments with 2 niches per compartment. This means that two persons may be placed per compartment. We believe that this may be the only columbarium in the Unity at a church site. The front panels can be engraved with photos, dates, scriptures, etc.
