Fall Synodical Committee Meeting Minutes

The Fall Synodical Committee Meeting was held Saturday, October 22, 2016, at the Hus Encampment, with 52 in attendance. The meeting was called to order by President Kent Laza and opened with prayer. Secretary and Financial Secretary Reports were approved. The Treasurer reported a balance of \$233,695.68.

Chairmen of the Hus Encampment Board of Trustees, Mark Olsen, provided an update on the work of the Planning and Building Committee. It was approved to move forward with the upgrades to the septic system.

The Administrative Position for the Unity will now be advertised. There is also a need for a Kitchen Manager for the Hus Encampment next summer.

Roger Runnels of Cy-Fair reported that the Cy-Fair Community Church has decided to disband. Kent Laza will be meeting with the congregation to discuss the next steps.

There was a discussion of the problems and opportunities before the Unity of the Brethren. Various ideas were shared. President Kent Laza asked each representative to talk to their congregation about these issues. Discussion will continue at the Spring Synodical Committee Meeting.

Ben Kruse was licensed for the Rosenberg Community Church and Tim Chaplin was licensed for the Temple Brethren Church.

Rev. Tommy Tallas provided a report on the Minister's Benefits Committee Meeting. He brought forth two motions, both approved, clarifying the definition of a part-time pastor (necessary for the IRS).

Ryan Volkman presented on potential new mission work in the Czech Republic.

Jennifer Chervenka provided a report on the youth program.





BRETHREN JOURNAL December 2016/3 Updates were provided on each of the Unity-supported missionaries. A budget of \$73,000 was approved for the Foreign Missions Budget for 2017.

Home Missions provided a report. A loan of \$10,000 (0% interest with no established repayment schedule) was approved to Cade Lake Missions to repair the roof. If churches want to contribute to paying off this loan, they need to specify that in the donation. A budget of \$48,000 was approved for 2017.

There was discussion regarding a request from a Moravian Church in Sarasota, Florida. No decision was made.

The 2017 Convention will be held July 6-8, 2017 at the Temple Brethren Church. President Kent Laza reminded churches about the election of local delegates. He urged churches to send young adults/youth as delegates or visitors.

Pastor Tim Chaplin closed the meeting with prayer.



In the *Book of Jeremiah*, in the *Holy Bible*, we witness a battle between the prophet Jeremiah and the prophet Hananiah in chapter 28. In Old Testament times, prophets had to be 100% truthful or they would fall dead right where they stood. Prophets were God's representatives who spoke His words to the world at a time when Jesus had not yet come to the earth visibly to live, suffer, die and

rise, and then give us the gift of the Holy Spirit. Today, we have the Holy Spirit – God living within us – if we have embraced Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord of our lives. Our battle is to sit and wait on the voice of the Holy Spirit and move according to the Spirit's direction – never our own, because we are not divine, but human, and in need of God's love, omniscience, omnipotence, and omnipresence.

The prophet Hananiah said that the people of God would be freed from the yoke or oppression of the Babylonian empire; at that time it was a lie and Hananiah fell dead instantly.

The prophet Jeremiah was always in a spirit of sitting with God, listening and waiting on God's voice. Jeremiah speaks in the *Book of Jeremiah*, chapter 28, verse 15 (NASB):

"Then Jeremiah the prophet said to Hananiah the prophet, 'Listen now, Hananiah, the Lord has not sent you, and you have made this people trust in a lie."

Who's There

Over the years, I have shared both my fondness for fantasy and science fiction and the lessons I have learned from them. BBC's *Doctor Who* premiered on British televisions 53 years ago and it is still in production. I consider it one of my personal favorites. I not only enjoy the stories; I also find the history of the program quite fascinating.

I first encountered the program when I was quite young and the local PBS channel televised it in black and white. Today, *Doctor Who* is an international phenomenon. This is quite remarkable considering the number of obstacles it overcame in the beginning.

In the early 1960's, television pioneer Sydney Newman was promoted to Head of Drama by the BBC. Newman was an idea man. In 1963, the BBC was losing a good share of its Saturday night viewing audience between a sports program called *Grandstand* and a popular music program called *Juke Box Jury*. Newman decided that a science fiction program could successfully bridge the gap and help the BBC retain its audience share.

Newman was a fan of science fiction. In his words, "Up to the age of 40, I don't think there was a science-fiction book I hadn't read. I love them because they're a marvelous way – and a safe way, I might add – of saying nasty things about our own society."

Newman thought this new program's target audience should be children. It should involve time travel and thus allow children to learn about historical figures such as Alexander the Great and Marco Polo.

Of course, time travel would require both a time machine and someone to pilot it. Newman thought the time machine itself should be able to blend in with the local surroundings. The name he invented for this time machine was TARDIS which was an acronym for "Time and Relative Dimensions in Space". To blend in, the TARDIS would utilize something called a chameleon circuit. As the first story was to take place in 1963 London, the time machine would be disguised as a Police Public Call Box. The chameleon circuit would then experience a malfunction and the TARDIS would forever retain this iconic shell no matter where it travelled. He thought the program's central character should be an older man in a position of authority such as a doctor.

Newman contacted Verity Lambert and pitched the idea to her. Lambert hesitated. She was growing tired of being an assistant and was seriously considering leaving television altogether. Newman then informed her that he wanted her to produce the program. Lambert accepted and became the first female producer at the BBC. Newman then imposed one iron rule for Lambert. The program must never have ray guns or B.E.M.'s (Newman's term for bug-eyed monsters).

Waris Hussein, a young director from India, was brought on board to direct the program. To say that he was unhappy with the initial script ideas is an understatement. To make matters worse, the BBC in the early 1960's was a culture dominated by older men. Neither Lambert nor Hussein felt they were getting much in the way of either cooperation or respect from their peers. As time went by Lambert and Hussein leaned on each other for moral support. The pair quickly became excellent friends.

The next task was to find someone to play The Doctor (a mysterious man who has a title but no name – hence the title *Doctor Who*). Several candidates were considered. In the end, an

actor by the name of William Hartnell was selected. Hartnell was typically cast to play tough guys in British movies and television. He had become quite adept at playing both gangsters and army sergeants. Not exactly the type of personality one would associate with a children's program.

The remaining cast members were selected, but more problems loomed on the horizon. Filming of *Doctor Who* was relegated to BBC's Lime Grove Studios, which was known for being both notoriously small and hot. The excessive heat frequently set off the sprinkler system, which both destroyed sets and damaged sensitive electronic equipment.

The first episode entitled An Unearthly Child was filmed. This episode was intended to introduce the viewing audience to the Doctor and his granddaughter Susan, who were living in exile on Earth. Two of Susan's teachers, Barbara and Ian, were also introduced to the viewing audience. This pair became unwilling passengers of the Doctor once they stumbled onto his secret.

When Newman saw the final edit, he was not at all pleased. He instructed Lambert and Hussein to film it again

and threatened to fire the pair if this second cut was not to his liking.

This time Lambert and Hussein managed to film an episode that was more to Newman's liking. Their troubles, however, were far from over. The writers had not yet completed the script for the second episode about Marco Polo. The only scripts that were available for filming were those for a three-part episode involving cave men and the generation of fire. Newman was not at all happy, but with production already behind schedule there was no alternative but to film the cave man episodes.

Problems continued to plague Doctor Who. Even history seemed to conspire against it. The series premiere was slated for the evening of November 23, 1963. This, unfortunately, coincided with the assassination of President John Kennedy. Many British viewers opted to watch news coverage of that event instead.

In the days that followed, BBC executives got hold of a script being written by Terry Nations entitled The Daleks. This episode was to introduce viewers to the Daleks, a mutant race inspired by the Nazi regime. In the story line, a race known as the Kalleds had been involved in a 1,000-

vear-old nuclear war with another race known as the Thals. An evil Kalled scientist named Davros genetically modified the mutant Kalled race and integrated select survivors into personal tank-like robotic structures. As part of the modification process, Davros removed every emotion from his new Dalek race except for one - absolute hatred for anything that is not Dalek.

The irate executives contacted Newman and instructed him to cancel the program. Newman summoned Lambert to his office and delivered the news. Lambert protested and Newman reminded her of his edict concerning bug-eyed monsters.

Lambert insisted that the story was worthwhile and added that Doctor Who was "something really special". She pleaded her case convincingly, and Newman stated he would allow the program to continue for a bit longer. Lambert also insisted that the first episode be aired again because of the Kennedy assassination. Lambert's persistence paid off, and eventually Newman even agreed to this.

Special effects were limited by 1960's technology. The program's low

budget led to additional design restrictions when it came to creating the tank-like Daleks. The resulting Daleks have often been likened to pepper shakers. They were equipped with a single eye stalk protruding from their rotating heads. In place of arms, the Daleks were equipped with a gun and a device for manipulating objects. Initially only three Daleks were created. Already over budget, kitchen whisks and toilet plungers were utilized for the guns and manipulators.

When *The Daleks* premiered, its audience share was enormous. The monsters that had children hiding behind the sofa cushions were a hit. Newman later admitted to Lambert that he had been completely wrong about the Daleks. He also congratulated himself for hiring the best people.

Just when it seemed *Doctor Who* was finally catching a break, events still seemed determined to conspire against it. First, director Waris Hussein left the program to pursue other interests. Next, lead actor William Hartnell was diagnosed with arteriosclerosis and was having difficulty both memorizing his lines and delivering them. Producer Verity Lambert's success resulted in her leaving the program as well. Even the Doctor's granddaugh-

ter and her teachers were eventually written out of the program. New and younger companions for the Doctor were written in. New script writers were brought in, further complicating matters for Hartnell.

Despite the obstacles, Doctor Who was still extremely popular. It now faced its biggest challenge since BBC executives first tried to cancel it. By 1966. Hartnell's health began to decline at a staggering rate. Although he was only in his late fifties, outwardly he appeared much older. His arteriosclerosis worsened. His inability to memorize lines was now quite problematic. He began taking out his frustrations on both cast and crew. His outbursts became both more frequent and more caustic. It finally looked like the end of the line for Doctor Who.

Sydney Newman was still Head of Drama and he was still an idea man. If *Doctor Who* was to continue it would have to do so without William Hartnell. But how can you possibly replace a program's central character with a new actor? Newman's science fiction genius rose to the occasion.

By now the story line had established the Doctor as being from an alien race having two hearts. The

Newman's idea was a brilliant one. Time Lords, he devised, have developed a manner of cheating death. Just before dying, a Time Lord can "regenerate" every cell in his body and walk away a completely new individual.

So, on October 29, 1966, William Hartnell's Doctor regenerated and Patrick Troughton's second Doctor took his place behind the controls of the TARDIS.

To date 12 actors have played the Doctor. A few Whovians (a term coined to describe fans of *Doctor Who*) allow that Sir John Hurt's single episode portrayal of the War Doctor brings the total to 13.

Most Whovians have a favorite Doctor. Personally I liked them all, but I am particularly fond of the two most recent Doctors portrayed by Matt Smith and Peter Capaldi.

Matt Smith, the youngest actor to play the Doctor, was only 27 years old when he made his debut on January 1, 2010. Smith had a boyish charm which he extended to his Doctor and the writers gave him some great scripts to work with.

In one of his Christmas episodes, Smith's Doctor encounters a wealthy and powerful man named Kazran Sardick. Sardick has in his possession the frozen body of a young woman named Abigail which he is holding as collateral. Years have gone by and Abigail's family still owes on the debt. They have but one wish. They plead to have Abigail unfrozen just long enough to share one final Christmas with them. Sardick refuses and orders the family to leave. The Doctor stumbles upon the scene and asks who the frozen young lady is. Sardick flatly replies that she is no one important.

In perhaps my favorite line from the entire series the Doctor replies, "Nobody important? Blimey, that's amazing. You know, in 900 years of time and space I've never met anybody who wasn't important before."

Of all the regenerations, I believe that of Smith's Doctor was the most poignant.

Moments before his regeneration he states, "It all just disappears, doesn't it? Everything you are, gone in moment. Like breath on a mirror. Any moment now, he's a coming."

The Doctor's current companion Clara does not understand regeneration. "Who is coming?" she asks.

Smith replies that the Doctor is coming. Still not understanding, she reminds him that he is the Doctor.

Smith replies, "Yep. And I always will be. But times change, and so must I... We all change when you think about it. We're all different all through our lives. And that's okay, that's good. You've got to keep moving. As long as you remember all the people that you used to be. I will not forget one line of this, not one day. I swear. I will always remember when the Doctor was me."

Today's Doctor is portrayed by Peter Capaldi, who was 55 when he stepped into the Doctor's shoes. Unlike Smith's Doctor, Capaldi's Doctor is much darker and far more serious.

In the opening moments of his second episode, Capaldi's Doctor asks Clara, "Tell me. Am I a good man?" After considerable thought Clara replies that she simply does not know.

At the end of that episode Clara returns to that initial conversation. She suddenly stops and states, "I don't know... You asked me if you were a good man and the answer is, I

In 2016 producer Steven Moffat announced that he was turning the reins of *Doctor Who* over to Chris Chibnal who has written several episodes of *Doctor Who*.

Moffat once said, "It's hard to talk about the importance of an imaginary hero. But heroes ARE important: Heroes tell us something about ourselves. History tells us who we used to be, documentaries tell us who we are now; but heroes tell us who we WANT to be. And a lot of our heroes depress me.

But when they made this particular hero, they didn't give him a gun – they gave him a screwdriver to fix things. They didn't give him a tank or a warship or an x-wing fighter – they gave him a box from which you can call for help. And they didn't give him a superpower or pointy ears or a heatray – they gave him an extra HEART. They gave him two hearts! And that's an extraordinary thing.

There will never come a time when we don't need a hero like The Doctor."

James 3:13-16 can also be reviewed to give a Biblical perspective.

Questions for discussion

Which child in the story would you like to play with? Which child in the story would you like to be like? Have you ever seen any of these kinds of kids at the park? Would you want to be a part of a family that is full of envy and selfish ambition or full of peace and consideration for others?

Caring for others


Have your children make something for someone else. Pray about the project together: "God, is there someone who needs to be encouraged by a gift or a visit from us?" Maybe it will be creating a card for a relative, baking cookies for the homeless, making a care package for someone in need, or spending time with a widow who struggles with loneliness.

Generosity Party Time

Practice being generous with each other. For instance, have an ice cream sundae night. Each family member makes a sundae for someone else in the family. Put out ice cream and a variety of toppings, and allow your children to be generous in making sundaes for other family members. You can also do this with "monster cookies," which are oatmeal cookies filled with numerous additions like nuts, chocolate chips, sprinkles, etc. Family members can make monster cookies for designated family members, decorating each other's cookies generously.


A generous person will prosper; whoever refreshes others will be refreshed. Proverbs 11:25

Understand the Proverb:

- 1. Read Deuteronomy 24:19-22 (or tell the story in your own words).
- 2. Ask:
 - a. What were the Israelites commanded to do when harvesting sheaves, grain, olives, and grapes?
 - b. Who would benefit from the harvesting not being as thorough as it could have been?
 - c. Why were they commanded to be considerate of those less fortunate?
 - d. Who are the poor in our community?
 - e. How can we be intentionally considerate of these people?
- 3. God commanded the Israelites to be generous with others because when they were slaves in Egypt, they were at the mercy of the Egyptians. God wants us to be merciful to those less fortunate than we are. "He says blessed are the merciful for they will be shown mercy" (Matthew 5:7). We can intentionally be considerate of those less fortunate by giving generously to those who are poor.
- 4. Reinforce the lesson with the following story:

A day at the park

One family had children named Me First, Gimme the Biggest, and That's My Toy. The second family had kids named Go Ahead, You Have It, and It's Your Turn. At the park, Me First shoved to the front of the line all the time. At snack time, Gimme the Biggest took the largest chunk of puffed wheat square, leaving almost none for the other kids. That's My Toy wouldn't share any of his sand toys with the others. These kids went home early from the park because their mother was tired of intervening in the trouble they caused and stopping their fights. When they left, everyone at the park felt like cheering (although they didn't because they knew this would be rude). The kids in the other family had a wonderful time at the park. Go Ahead let others go in front of her at the slide. You Have It passed around his snack of oatmeal cookies to the other kids in the park. It's Your Turn delighted the other children by sharing his new sand rocket. When they were going to leave, the other children at the park begged them to stay as they had made everyone else's afternoon at the park so enjoyable.





Home Mission Board Report

At the October 2016 Synodical meeting, the Home Mission Board submitted a budget for 2017. The budget was lowered \$19,000 from the 2016 budget, making the total Home Mission budget \$48,000 for 2017 as follows:

Cade Lake Community Chapel: \$28,000 (including salary. for Rev Jim Heckman)

Cade Lade Operating Expenses: \$14,000 (including insurance)

Major Maintenance: \$2,000

In God's Hands: \$4,000

Given that the Cade Lake Community Chapel was in need of a new roof, the Synodical Committee agreed to a loan of \$10,000 at a rate of 0% and no established repayment schedule for carpentry work and the new roof. The roof was completed on November 1, 2016, at a cost of \$7,700. The loan will be repaid by the membership of the Community Chapel by raffles, bake sale, garage sales, etc. Donations to help with the loan will be welcomed. Please note on your check "For Cade Lake Roof".

Rev. Kay Polasek is working with Rev. Heckman at the Community Chapel by preaching, starting a Bible Study on Wednesday night, and prayer meeting on Sunday mornings. Attendance has been between 30 and 40 each Sunday.

Yesterday the Lord told me I was doing everything I could do and the rest was up to Him. Today I cried and cried out to Him. I want my symptoms to go away more and more. I cried and cried, just like the lady Jesus talked about who cried out to the guy that was already in bed. We can ask and ask and ask and ask. I personally think Jesus likes all the attention. He is not annoyed or mad with us. He loves us, remember.

So, this afternoon my friend texted me a verse and it said this:

The LORD will fight for you; you need only to be still.

"Then the LORD said to Moses, "Why are you crying out to me? Tell the Israelites to move on. Raise your staff and stretch out your



hand over the sea to divide the water so that the Israelites can go through the sea on dry ground."

Isn't God so good. He just answered me.

Please keep praying, and come tomorrow night for prayer, 7 p.m., 2015 W. Academy St. Aren't you hungry for Him?

Michael can be stressed as he is taking care of all of us. Lord help Michael.
