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

Gordon Adolph Hejl

February 21, 1918 -October 24, 2016

Reverend Gordon Adolph Hejl, 98, went to be with his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, on October 24, 2016, at home.

Gordon was born on February 21, 1918, near Taylor, Texas, to Adolph Hejl and Milady Jansa Hejl. He graduated from Taylor High School in 1936. He attended Hus School, Class of 1937. Gordon served in the Air Force 1940-1945. He graduated from Moravian College in 1950 and Moravian Theological Seminary in 1952.

Gordon was ordained as a Unity of the Brethren minister on June 17, 1952, at the Wall Brethren Church. During his ministry he was pastor of the following congregations: Wall, Granger, Rosenberg, Alief, Robstown, Placedo, El Campo, Blessing, West, Dallas, Nelsonville, Industry, Fayetteville, and Wesley.

Missions were his lifelong passion, with many trips to Alaska, Nicaragua, Honduras, St. John, and Labrador. He served for 22

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years as Chair of the Unity of the Brethren's Mission Board.

Gordon loved the Lord, traveling, new adventures, meeting new people, trying new foods, exploring new venues, seeing the good in people. He devoted his life to living by the motto of the Unity of the Brethren: In Essentials Unity; In Non-Essentials Liberty; In All Things Love.

Preceding Gordon in death were his parents, wife Lillian, brother Raymond Hejl, and sister Gladys Labaj.

Gordon is survived by daughters, Martha Stockton and husband Ron, Ruthie Collins and husband Gary; granddaughters, Susan Stockton and husband Billy, Lauren Wilson and husband Spencer, Marissa McGowen and husband Robby; 3 great-grandchildren; many nieces, nephews, and other family members and friends.

He Wrote What He Knew

One piece of sound advice often given to writers is "write what you know." One writer by the name of Earl Hamner, Jr., did just that.

Hamner was born in 1923 in an area known as "The Ragged Mountains." His childhood home in the foothills of Virginia's Blue Ridge mountains was a mere 25 miles from Jefferson's Monticello. His father's family settled in the region in the 1700's. His mother's family arrived a short time later.

Hamner grew up during the Great Depression as the oldest of eight children. Even as a child he knew that he wanted to be a writer. Hamner admitted that this aspiration likely mystified his father, as there was very little to read in the Hamner household. Looking back on his childhood, Hamner said his father did not initially support this desire, but he did nothing to discourage it.

Hamner began keeping a journal as soon as he learned to read and write. He shared two early entries from it in an interview. The first was – "Grandma and Grandpa came by after church today. They are not speaking because he is mad at her." The second was – "Our old pig had eight babies last night. She has eaten four of them." Hamner then quipped that his skill as a writer had nowhere to go but up.

Throughout his career as a writer, Hamner never lost touch with his Virginia roots and values. The stories and scripts he wrote had endearing and folkish qualities to them. They also possessed a remarkable moral depth.

Life in the Depression era was difficult. Hamner's father worked as a machinist, but with a large family to raise, his salary did not go very far. His father often dreamed of one day building a large home in the Blue Ridge Mountains for his wife and children. That never happened, but his father's desire was the inspiration for Hamner's novel *Spencer's Mountain*, which eventually became a movie starring Henry Fonda and Maureen O'Hara.

One day, the mill that employed his father shut down. Hamner's father found work at the DuPont Company

in Waynesboro in 1933. The factory was located far away on the other side of the Shenandoah Valley. This meant that his father could only be home on weekends. When weekends came, he would first ride the bus to Chancellorsville. There he would get on another bus that would take him to Hickory Creek. From there he would walk the remaining six miles to the family home.


On Christmas Eve 1933 a snowstorm blew in and Hamner's father did not arrive home as expected. Being the oldest, Hamner's mother sent him out to look for his father. Hamner did not find his father in a literal sense, but he had numerous adventures during that search. Hamner later defined the search as "the maturation of the young man looking for his father's image." The young Hamner returned home without having found his father. The family was deeply concerned, but there was nothing more to be done that night.

At some point during the night, the family was awakened by a loud rattle on the roof. The frightened children leaped out of their beds and ran downstairs. Hamner's mother calmed the children and opened the door to investigate. In walked the previously missing Mr. Hamner with an armload of packages. Shock was replaced by relief, which was in turn replaced by curiosity. Everyone wanted to know what was in the packages.

At that point Hamner's father spun a tale about "some old fool in a red suit" messing about on the roof. The elder Hamner said he threw a rock at the man and saw him fall. There was no sign of the intruder aside from the packages he obviously dropped to make good his escape.

The packages, of course, contained Christmas presents for the family. Hamner recalled with fondness the azalea his father purchased for his mother as well as the writing tablets for the aspiring family writer. Hamner stated that he may not have found his father in a literal sense that night, but he did find him figuratively. He added, "With a father like that, how could you fail to carry on in an image of such a man."

If this sounds familiar, there is good reason for it. This was the basis for Hamner's novel *The Homecoming*. Sales of the novel were modest, but Malcolm Stewart, a friend and agent, sent it to a new company called Lorimar

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Productions. Lorimar in turn submitted it to CBS, who turned it into the two-hour made-for-television movie that has become an integral part of our traditional holiday viewing.

This special broke ground for the landmark television series The Waltons. Hamner was the producer and creator of The Waltons, and considered the series one of his brightest moments. It was a memory made even more special as Hamner credited the audience for saving the show. The program's initial ratings were quite low and CBS seriously considered cancelling the series. The Waltons struck a chord with its core audience. These dedicated viewers told their friends and those friends in turn told others. In time, the ratings improved, and today the program is considered a television classic.

One of the hallmarks of The Waltons came at the end of every episode when the various members of the Walton family would say good night to each other. Just prior to that, a very distinctive voice usually provided some narration recalling bygone days on Walton's mountain. That voice belonged to none other than Earl Hamner, Jr.

Hamner was often asked if he was John Boy Walton. Hamner always responded that he believed there was a little bit of John Boy in every writer.

The Waltons may have been Hamner's crowning achievement, but it is by no means his only contribution to radio and television.

Hamner's first venture into radio was for a program called Doctor Chris*tian* which invited listeners to submit scripts. Hamner submitted a script while attending college in 1946. The writers of the scripts selected were invited to the studio to be interviewed by the host of the program. Among those invited was another young college student by the name of Rod Serling. This was their first encounter. The pair lost touch with each other.

Hamner eventually decided to move to Hollywood. Serling's Twilight Zone was already a success when the pair happened to meet again at a party. With no film credits to his name. Hamner was having difficulty breaking into the business. He began wondering if the decision to move to Hollywood had been a terrible mistake.



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Hamner was familiar with *Twilight Zone* and admired it. Hamner admitted that he did not consider himself the proper type of writer for the show. Low on funds and not having any other prospects, he decided to write two stories for *Twilight Zone*. He sent these to Rod Serling. Serling sent him a reply stating that stories were selected by a committee and that he had forwarded the stories to them.

Hamner was convinced that this was Serling's way of politely rejecting his submissions. A few days later a producer contacted Hamner with an offer to buy both stories. Understanding that Hamner had no film credits, he asked Hamner to rewrite them as plays. Hamner insisted that he could write them as proper film scripts, and did so.

My favorite Hamner episode of *Twilight Zone* is entitled *The Hunt*. The story revolves around a simple man named Hyder Simpson who lives in a cabin with his wife and hunting dog. One night the man decides to go racoon hunting with his faithful dog Rip despite his wife's protests. Far from home the dog picks up the scent and the pursuit begins.

The raccoon leads the pair on

quite a chase, which finally ends at a lake. The excited dog falls into the water and does not resurface. Simpson goes in after his dog, and he also does not resurface immediately.

Simpson later finds himself beside the lake with his faithful companion. Without a raccoon to show for their misadventure, Simpson decides it is time for the pair to return home and face the music.

When Simpson and Rip arrive at the cabin the following day, he discovers his wife dressed in black and in tears. In a strange turn, it appears that neither she nor the others who arrived before him are aware of him. Try as he might he remains both unseen and unheard. Eventually, Simpson deduces that the reason for this is that both he and Rip must have drowned in the lake.

At a loss for what to do, Simpson and Rip wander about until they come to a fence. They follow the fence and eventually come upon a gate. A man greets Simpson there and bids him welcome. The two are about to enter when the man at the gate informs Simpson that although he is welcome, his dog is not. Simpson refuses to enter without his dog and chooses to

move on despite the gatekeeper's protests.

Eventually they come to another gate. There they are met by a young man who is, in reality, an angel. The angel tells Simpson that he has been expecting him. Simpson declines, telling him that he will not enter without his dog. Puzzled, the angel then asks Simpson if he had encountered anyone else along the way. Simpson tells him about his encounter at the previous gate.


The angel listens intently. He then informs Simpson that the prior gate leads to Hell whereas this gate leads to Heaven. He assures Simpson that at this gate both he and Rip are welcome. A grateful Simpson then asks why Rip was not allowed into Hell. The angel explains that the dog would have detected the fire and brimstone and warned him about it. The angel adds, "You see Mr. Simpson, a man – he'll walk right into Hell with both eyes open. But even the Devil can't fool a dog!"

Serling's closing narration states, "Travelers to unknown regions would be well-advised to take along the family dog. He could just save you from entering the wrong gate. At least, it happened that way once – in a mountainous area of the Twilight Zone."

As stated before, life during the Depression was difficult. Hamner's father had several hunting dogs that were well trained and well treated. Often Hamner's father would wake up before the rest of the family had their breakfast to hunt enough quail to feed his large family.

On one of these hunting expeditions Hamner's father accidentally shot one of his dogs. The wounded dog ran away. Hamner's father searched throughout the night for his dog. The body was found the next day. Hamner recalled his father grieving for the dog as if it were a person. This memory from Hamner's childhood was the inspiration for *The Hunt*.

One day, the producer of *Twilight Zone* contacted Hamner desperately looking for a script which he needed in three day's time. He was hoping that Hamner might have a completed work lying around. Hamner said he did not have one, but offered to write one. The producer thought this would be impossible, but Hamner insisted that he could do it.



Drawing on his Blue Ridge Mountain roots, Hamner wrote the first act that day and completed the script the next. This story is also set in the hills and revolves around a jealous young woman who makes a deal with a witch so that she can steal a young man from the woman to whom he is engaged. The deal struck, the young man falls hopelessly in love with her and breaks off the engagement with his fiancé.

The deal, however, comes at a terrible price. Every night the man's new love turns into a great cat that stalks the area until sunrise. The woman realizes that she is losing more and more of her humanity with each transformation. She deduces that eventually she will become a witch herself.

In the end, the young man marries his first love and the jealous young woman reappears in various forms until she is killed. Hamner named this episode *Jess-Belle* after the jealous young woman. The name, of course, is a play on the name Jezebel we are familiar with from scripture.

Interestingly, Hamner's script called for the great cat to be a tiger. When filming of the episode began the animal trainer was unable to get the tiger to cooperate. It so happened the trainer also had a leopard, which was substituted. This unexpected change added an exotic touch to an already great story. Of additional interest is the fact that *Jess-Belle* is the only episode of *Twilight Zone* in which Rod Serling did not supply a closing narration.


Hamner wrote eight episodes of *Twilight Zone* all together, including the final episode entitled *The Bewitchin' Pool.*

As stated before, writers are advised to "write what they know" and Hamner did just that. Even while living in Hollywood and writing for a science fiction program, Hamner always remained true to his roots. Hamner successfully wove his own background, experiences, and values into the fabric of his creations.

Just how far is it from the *Twilight Zone* to Walton's Mountain? I could not possibly measure the distance in miles. I do, however, know for a fact that the journey can be made in a lifetime... one very special lifetime.

Earl Hamner, Jr., died March 24, 2016, at the age of 92.

- 3. There's an even deeper hunger we all have. It's a hunger for meaning, for purpose, for something to make us feel loved. God placed an empty place in all of our hearts, and Jesus is the only one that can fill that hole.
- 4. In today's scripture, Jesus tells a woman something very similar to what I've just told you about Snickers.
- 5. Read or tell the story of the Woman at the Well John 4:4-26. The woman at the well was thirsty. Yes, she needed water to drink, to wash, and to cook, but she longed for something more. Jesus knows her life's story, and He knows how empty she feels. Her many husbands have made her an outcast which is why she comes to fetch water when no one else is around. Jesus tells her she needs living water. The living water Jesus is referring to is Himself. Jesus is the Son of God, who became man so that He could restore us to a relationship with God Jesus made this possible by dying on the cross to pay the price for our sins. When we place our trust in Jesus, He forgives our sins and gives the living water that truly satisfy.
- 6. The Snickers commercials remind us that there's a hunger that goes deeper than the growl in our stomachs. We hunger for love, for friendship, for success. We hunger for something to give meaning to our lives. A candy bar can make you feel better for a bit. Science has even shown that chocolate has a positive effect on our minds. But chocolate can't heal a broken heart. Nothing on this Earth can. People still try to satisfy their hungers with the things of this world. They think money, fame, power, and things will make them happy. These things can give us a temporary boost, just like a candy bar, but they never last. The sugar crash always comes, and we feel worse than we ever did. God knows we need Him. That's why He put that hunger inside us. He wants us to feel hungry, and He wants us to fill that hunger with Jesus. Jesus loved us so much, he died for us. The Holy Spirit becomes an unending fountain of living water, filling us over and over. Snickers can satisfy hunger for a bit. Many things in this world can make us smile, but only Jesus can satisfy our greatest need.


Object Lesson

- 2. Snickers is a great treat when you're hungry. It is packed with peanuts, caramel, and nougat wrapped in chocolate. But a Snickers bar can only do so much. Snickers has very little nutritional value, and too many Snickers will make you overweight and unhealthy. In short, too many Snickers can make you even more tired and grumpy than if you never had one in the first place! The same can be said for any food. Rev. Heckman Thankful After Challenging Year

Overcomes health problems, still serving





The year 2016 was supposed to be a time to celebrate some milestones for Rev. Jim Heckman. He was turning 70 years old. He would celebrate 20 years in the ministry and 5 years as pastor of Cade Lake Community Chapel and as president of In God's Hands Ministry in Cade Lake, which have been a huge difference-maker in that community. But last summer, everything unraveled.

Jim experienced a multitude of unexpected health problems before slowly fighting his way back in time to celebrate another Thanksgiving. Now at a crossroads of his life and career, Heckman has time to reflect on the trials of 2016 and what the future holds. And he is thankful to still be here.

Heckman underwent a successful surgery to remove a brain tumor on June 8. But just prior to that, on May 31, he became dehydrated and passed out and was taken to CHI St. Joseph Regional Health Center in Bryan for treatment. After that, it was a series of setbacks. First there was a toe amputation, later an infection that got into

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his blood stream. Later there was a kidney failure that led to dialysis and heart failure. It was all a bit much for a man who had enjoyed generally good health for 70 years.

"I turned 70, and all of this happened. It was almost like, well let's just get all of this out of the way," Heckman said with a smile.

It looked like it might be a tough decade ahead. But you wouldn't think it from talking to Jim. Through it all, there was no sense of panic.

"I felt a sense of peace. God was on my side, and we were doing His will," Heckman said. Heckman, a long-time Brethren church pastor, started his Caldwell area ministry at Caldwell Brethren Church, initially established the Angel Food Pantry there, and then launched a new church, supported by the Unity of the Brethren, at Cade Lake.

The people of Cade Lake long ago tugged at Jim and his wife Diane's heart strings.

As one of the county's low-income areas, some residents there have staggering needs. But the Heckmans looked closer and found something deeper. There were hard-working, proud people there who took care of themselves and cared deeply about their neighbors. Many bore their struggles without complaints.

Diane, while working at Caldwell Intermediate School, was touched by the children and shared her stories with Jim. Eventually, a series of events led to the creation of In God's Hands Ministry, and Jim knew none of them were purely coincidental.

Jim knew he could buy the land on Lakeview Drive for the food pantry by merely paying \$800 in back taxes, but he didn't immediately have the money. The deadline to pay was March 15, and on March 1 he received an unexpected check from the Pension Board Guarantee Corp., for \$850. The pension was from his prior service with Braniff Airlines.

"So I gave \$800 to Curtis (Curtis Doss, the Burleson County tax collector) and took the other \$50 and took Diane to dinner," he re-calls with a laugh.

Later, the Unity of the Brethren was able to secure a building for the church for \$10,000, and they were able to lease four lots affordably from a landowner now living in Florida, he recalled.

"It all happened fairly close together," he said. With the urging of his wife and Melinda Palicka, a Cade Lake resident, Jim knew that the church was the right move for the community.

Jim and Diane had always been drawn to that type of mission work, helping start a similar church in Biloxi, Mississippi.

Over the last five years, Jim has seen lives change in Cade Lake and a renewed sense of hope there. Hope looms large in the Heckmans' lives.

One of his most vivid memories is during the September 11 crisis when some New Yorkers carried signs saying their loved ones had no hope. "I would venture to say that not many of them were devout Christians," Heckman said. "Because you always have hope to know where your loved ones are."

Jim also believes that the church can reach out in other ways. The youth after-school tutoring program was a success, and the annual Thanksgiving dinner at the church is a blessing to many. Jim gives Palicka much of the credit for creating the Thanksgiving tradition – and for their Make Christmas Happen drive, which has cheered many of the community's children.

So, he feels he has much to be grateful for this year – thanks to an abundant legacy and the hard work of a lot of faithful church members, and he will never forget the multitude of prayers and support he got through the long summer hospitalizations.

"I am thankful that everything was caught so early, and I am thankful for St. Joseph and the VA and staff that took such good care of me," he said. "And there was my wonderful wife, who spent all summer at the hospital. There were very few nights she left me alone."

Fortunately, he also got support from his many friends in the ministry.

Heckman originally planned to remain in the ministry until he was 75, but the health issues are forcing him to reconsider.

"It has been an eventful year, and one way or another it will be a pivotal year," he said. "I will either retire or continue."

Either way, he will always be remembered for starting a church in Cade Lake.

And next Thanksgiving he will still be at peace – and thankful.

We hope your Thanksgiving was great.

On Wednesday we started to move house, and Caroline's head started to have pressure build up. So much so that she threw up lots and felt awful all night.

By midday Tuesday we went to the emergency room. We spent one night. They gave me meds for pain, swelling in the brain, and nausea. We came home on Friday and spent our first night in our new home last night.

They did do a MRI and found that my spots had grown a bit. The largest one was 1.3 ml and is now 1.8. Boo.

So, needless to say I'm a little down. I guess we all just look around with our physical eyes and if things are going great we are happy, and if they are not we are depressed, angry, or complain.
