What do you need to hear today? What will refresh your mind? What will cause you to soar as if on an eagle's wings?

What will heal your heart?

What if someone told you that the single most important thing for you to keep before your eyes is a person?

Not your spouse. Not your beautiful child or niece or other loved ones.

What if, in 2018, your focus was to keep your eyes fixed, on Jesus Christ? Rhythmically fixed like your lungs,

breathing in, and exhaling out? Night and day.

In sickness and in health. While in crisis or while at peace.

Fix your eyes and your heart on God the Son, on Jesus Christ.

God is always ready to speak to you to help you.

God is always ready to refresh your thoughts, like rebooting a system.

God is always ready to empower you to achieve your heart's desires as vou are connected with Him.

God is always ready to heal your heart in a manner that transcends your linear thinking and your most complex imaginings.

Fix your eyes and your heart on God the Son, on Jesus Christ.

Listen to what God spoke to those who early on in the existence of humanity realized that they needed His friendship, His wisdom, His salvation. The Book of Deuteronomy, chapter 11, verse 18, from the Holy Bible reads:

After 400 years of silence, God spoke again in the New Testament, and came to us in the flesh, Jesus Christ. The Corinthian Church, cosmopolitan and thriving. yet in desperate need of hearing God's counsel, receives word from the Apostle Paul. The Letter of 2 Corinthians, chapter 4, verse 18, reads:

Some Drops Sparkle - by Jim Pokorny

As a rule, I am not a fan of Hollywood musicals. One of the two exceptions I have made is the movie *Camelot*. which Warner Bros-Seven Arts released in 1967. I really must turn the clock back a few years (before I was born, really) to 1960, when Camelot opened on Broadway. Based upon the book The Once and Future King by T. H. White, the stage production of Camelot was a product of the team of Lerner and Loewe. Loewe wrote the music for the production and Lerner wrote the lyrics. The story revolves around the legendary King Arthur of England, Queen Guenevere, and Sir Lancelot, Arthur's friend and knight of the Round Table.

The Broadway cast featured some heavy hitters, including Richard Burton as Arthur, Julie Andrews as Guenevere, and Robert Goulet as Lancelot. After a somewhat shaky start, *Camelot* ran for 873 performances on Broadway alone. In December 1960, an original cast album was released as an LP that remained a top seller in America for 60 weeks.

The album was released just one month after the election of President John F. Kennedy. Kennedy, a class-

mate of Lerner's at Harvard, frequently listened to the album before retiring for the night. His favorite lines were from the closing number Arthur sings to a boy whom he hopes will pass the story on to future generations...

"Don't let it be forgot
That once there was a spot,
For one brief, shining moment
That was known as Camelot."

This began the association between the Kennedy presidency with *Camelot*. According to one writer, this "epitomized everything that was glamorous and popular about the new administration's 'brief, shining moment'."

For President Kennedy, the moment was indeed brief. Kennedy was assassinated in November 1963. This tragedy shocked and saddened the entire nation. In fact, Kennedy's televised funeral procession is one of my earliest childhood memories. I was far too young to understand what it was all about, but I do remember Mom crying as she watched the procession on television. In December 1963, *LIFE* magazine published an article entitled *For President Kennedy: An Epilogue* by T. H. White. In the article Jacqueline

The connection between the Kennedy's and *Camelot* was forever cemented. In fact, the John F. Kennedy Library and Museum has a collection of papers classified as the "Camelot Documents."

By the mid 1960's, Jack Warner was the remaining brother of the original Warner Bros. founded in the 1920's. Jack was also the last of the Hollywood movie moguls. After selling a large block of stock to Seven Arts, Jack realized his days as a movie mogul were winding down. Jack wanted to go out a winner. and based on the studio's previous success with the musical *My Fair Lady*, Jack decided a movie production of *Camelot* would allow him to do just that.

Jack Warner decided he would produce the movie himself. He secured Alan Lerner to write the screenplay and hired Joshua Logan to direct it. Logan decided to cast the movie with up and coming talent rather than established box office veterans. He cast Richard Harris in the lead role as Arthur, Vanessa Redgrave as Guenevere. and Franco Nero as Lancelot.

The movie was to be Jack Warner's final epic, but Logan quickly found himself both behind schedule and over budget. As the weeks went by these problems only worsened. Warner was under almost constant pressure from Seven Arts about continuing cost overruns. With two weeks of filming still scheduled, Warner contacted Logan and firmly insisted that filming was to wrap up that day. Despite Logan's protests, the new deadline remained fixed. Logan met with the cast and crew and filming

went on until 4 a.m. Logan was then forced to cobble together some parts of the movie from the footage available.

The movie premiered with all the pomp and circumstance expected. Although the film grossed \$31 million, it still failed to turn a profit. America in 1967 found itself embroiled in the Vietnam War. Culture clashes within its borders and violence in its streets was becoming a more frequent reality. Americans had relegated the days of optimism, Kennedy. and *Camelot* to the past.

It was about this time that a small boy in Taylor was granted access to his parents' music collection. Already gravitating to fantasy and science fiction, he found among the albums one in a brightly colored sleeve depicting a castle, a king, a queen, and a few knights. He carefully placed the album on the spindle and listened to the powerful voice of Richard Burton sing the title theme of *Camelot* for the first time and was immediately hooked.

I first saw the movie some years later when it appeared on network television. Now as a man, I have read many different accounts of the legendary King Arthur and watched numerous film adaptations of the story. Yet there is something about the musical that I return to time and again. I now listen to the album digitally and pop in the DVD of the movie whenever the mood strikes me.

One of the most striking differences between the movie and the stage production is how the story opens. Lerner chose to open the movie near the conclusion of the Arthurian saga. For the sake of honor, Arthur finds himself preparing to go to war against his friend Lancelot in France.

From out of the darkness and distress Arthur speaks aloud to Merlyn, a magician, mentor, and Arthur's teacher when he was a boy: "Merlyn, why is Jenny in that castle behind walls I cannot enter? How did I blunder into this agonizing absurdity?"

Suddenly he hears the disembodied voice of his ancient mentor telling him to think back; back to where it all began. This causes Arthur to recall the day he first met Guenevere. The movie then flashes back to a much happier time when Arthur was a young and reluctant king who was terrified of meeting his arranged queen. Guenevere is not happy about the arranged marriage, either. When the opportunity arises, she runs away from her escorts and encounters Arthur, whom she does not know. When her escorts find Guenevere with Arthur, they kneel before the king. Despite the awkwardness of this introduction, Guenevere warms to the idea of marriage, and soon the two are wed.

After the wedding, Arthur tells his queen about his plans for the kingdom. Knights from throughout the kingdom will be invited to Camelot to begin a new order of chivalry. One where might no longer means right. The new order means might will be used only for right and justice will be for all. These knights will all sit at the same table with Arthur. Guenevere states that they will argue over who is to sit at the head of the table. Arthur

decides that the table must therefore be round.

The invitation to Camelot spreads throughout the kingdom and beyond. It even reaches across the channel into France, where Lancelot du Lac resides. Lancelot considers himself to be the absolute paragon of virtue and morality. With his page he travels to Camelot to join Arthur. In a rather awkward encounter, a hurried Arthur practically runs Lancelot's horse off the road. Lancelot challenges this unknown upstart to a joust. An intrigued Arthur accepts the challenge, and Lancelot quickly unseats his armored opponent. When Arthur is revealed as the king, a mortified Lancelot begs forgiveness. Arthur laughs the incident off and asks how Lancelot acquired his skills.

Lancelot replies, "My skill comes from training, my king. My strength from purity." Arthur responds with a raised eyebrow.

Arthur introduces Lancelot to Guenevere. Lancelot suggests that the Round Table must have a standard physical and a standard moral. The queen asks whose standard should apply. Lancelot answers, "Certainly

not mine, milady. It would not be fair. I would never ask anyone to live by my standards, milady. To live your life in the tortured quest for perfection in body and spirit, oh, no. I would not ask that of anyone."

Guenevere hatches a plot to bring Lancelot down a peg or two. She convinces the three finest jousters in the kingdom to challenge Lancelot in the next tournament, certain that at least one of them will defeat him. The king protests and asks the queen to have the challenges withdrawn, but she refuses. At the tournament Lancelot defeats his first two challengers before mortally wounding the third. Lancelot kneels and cradles the lifeless form in his arms and prays fervently. To everyone's amazement, the wounded knight revives. This comes with a great price. Guenevere falls deeply in love with Lancelot. Lancelot also falls in love with Guenevere, despite his code of morality.

Arthur suspects the two have fallen in love. He knights Sir Lancelot anyway and admits him to the Round Table. Arthur hopes in vain that circumstances will simply blow over. Alone, he tells himself that Guenevere is the only woman he could ever love.

He then adds that if there is one friend whom he could choose to be his brother, it would be Lancelot. Yet each has betrayed him and caused him tremendous pain. He concludes that for the good of Camelot and its ideals, he will be civilized. He swears before the sword Excalibur that he will be a king and that they will face this challenge together.

Difficulties arise. Although Arthur says nothing, some of the knights begin to accuse Lancelot and Guenevere of treason and infidelity. Lancelot defends the queen's honor and defeats each opponent. With each victory Lancelot hands their fate over to the king, who grants them clemency. As a result, they are banished from Camelot.

As his kingdom falls apart, Arthur decides to enact civil law to protect the three. Whenever an accusation is made the matter will be tried before a jury. If no proof can be offered the matter will be dismissed. Arthur knows that the only proof that can be offered would be for an eyewitness to catch the pair alone. Arthur vows to never leave the castle without one or the other to prevent this.

Say: Today we are going to learn about a superhero. Who are some superheroes you know? Our superhero today comes from the Old Testament. He was a shy man who took care of sheep. He also couldn't speak very well. We think he may have stuttered. But God used him in some really SUPER ways!

Tell: You'd have thought Moses was a really hip, rich guy. He was raised by Pharaoh's daughter! But Moses was Hebrew. His parents were slaves. He got his life saved by Pharaoh's daughter after his real mom put in him a basket and sent him down the Nile River. That's because the Pharaoh was ordering that all boy Hebrew babies be killed. 

out the years. The losses also included his father-in-law's study Bibles, which included many notations, Heckman said. But the ministry will go on, Heckman and Polasek say.

Community Chapel is popular in Cade Lake due to its welcoming approach, and it has ministered to many there with major needs.

On Sunday, December 3, a church service was held outside, with attendees using folding chairs. "There were a lot of folks that drove by, waved and honked their horns," Heckman said. "You get a sense of good community support. The town is all supportive."

And other churches and ministers are rooting for Community Chapel and its mission.

Fred Hornaday, pastor of Friendship Baptist Church of Caldwell, said he wishes them well.

"This is a wonderful ministry that is desperately needed," Hornaday said. "Their efforts have fostered a great youth program, and they are ministering to folks that would not normally



have an outlet like Community Chapel at Cade Lake."

The ministry hopes to again have a building, but for now they will likely seek a large tent, similar to the old tent revival style, to conduct weekly services, Heckman said. "The outside services are going to be week-to-week, depending on the weather," Heckman said. "But we are just going forward. We are not going to let this stop us."

Polasek agreed, saying something good can come out of the tragedy – reinforcing the ministry's mission. "This is God's work. He started this work, and He will continue it," Polasek said. "This is a time for us to come together as a county. It is a challenge, but we are not going to stop now, not ever."

gine and two firefighters, Caldwell with an engine, a rescue truck, and six firefighters. Deanville responded with a tanker and four firefighters, Pevehouse said.

Two Cade Lake residents were on the scene as firefighters arrived and had forced open the doors. The building was probably burning for a while before anyone noticed it, Pevehouse said

Pevehouse said firefighters got most of the blaze out within about 45 minutes, but they remained on scene until about 6 p.m. washing it down. Though the exterior was still standing, the interior was seriously damaged, he said. Firefighters went in and out of the building manning Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) gear to avoid smoke inhalation.

Cade Lake residents and church members steadily arrived at the scene, expressing sadness for the loss of a building that gave so many residents hope.

Cade Lake is a mostly lower income community, and the ministry has helped many local residents strug-



gling with many problems. A food pantry, In God's Hands Ministry, is also a mission supported by UOB.

Heckman said many contents inside were lost, either due to heat or smoke damage. That included Heckman's 30- year book collection, a valuable asset to his ministry through-





Cade Lake Chapel Damaged by Fire Leaders say Cade Lake Ministry Will Continue

In a shattering setback for Cade Lake residents, the Cade Lake Community Chapel was seriously damaged by a Friday, December 1, fire that gutted most of the interior.

The chapel, a mission of the Unity of the Brethren denomination at 1005 Elm Drive, has given Cade Lake residents a boost throughout the years, offering weekly church services, a pastor, and a gathering place for the community.

The cause of the fore remains unknown, and the church's insurance carrier and the State Fire Marshal's Office are investigating, said David Pevehouse, fire chief for Cade Lake and Caldwell.

Pevehouse said foul play has not been ruled out.

The fire, noticed by a passerby, was reported at about 3:05 p.m., and

Cade Lake, Caldwell, and Deanville firefighters responded.

Pevehouse, the first firefighter to arrive, said heavy smoke and flames were coming out of the front and back of the building and part of the roof as firefighters arrived. The fire seemed to have originated in the center of the building, although a specific location has not been determined, he said.

Pevehouse and Rev. Jim Heckman, the church's founding pastor and co-pastor, said nothing had been left on in the building. The building included a sanctuary and pastor's office, a children's Sunday School room, a kitchen and fellowship area, said co-pastor Kay Polasek.

The first firefighters, from Cade Lake and Caldwell, arrived in about eight minutes.
