FROM THE PRESIDENT ... Dr. Larry Koslovsky

Time is an interesting concept. For a six-year-old, just waiting for a birthday, Christmas, or summer vacation is forever. For someone in their seventies, Christmas seems like it was just a couple of weeks ago.

There is something I would like to call Unity time. (in contrast to Brethren time, translated we wait until everybody gets to worship, meeting, or activity to start). It is the time segment, from July to July, two years apart. We gather for convention, make decisions, and go into the Fall of convention year to have a referendum by congregations to ratify or reject the decisions made. New officers of the Executive Committee are installed and learn about and exercise their positions. There are four meetings of congregational representatives at the Synodical Committee level that seek to carry out the decisions of the convention and plan for the next convention in that two-year time period.

We met last summer. This summer we are off, and our next convention convenes in July 2019 at Wall Brethren Church, our most distant congregation to the west. Basically, we are about a year away.

The demands of being a corporate entity are increasing and becoming more complicated. Your leadership at the local level may be experiencing the same thing. Banking, compliance with insurance, issues of security, building codes, the carrying of firearms, payroll taxes, and reporting all require time, attention, paperwork, and often proof or validation through minutes and signatures of those carrying out duties along with personal identification. All this takes time, energy and attention to detail.

There are no paid positions among those who hold Executive Committee positions. We have added a very capable individual, Liz Ripple, Administrative Assistant to the President, and basically to all Executive Committee and standing committees, who serves the denomination well. For the most part, what is accomplished is accomplished through dedicated volunteers on time outside their employment.

In addition to convention decisions and adjustments to by-laws, we have had hurricane Harvey, the fire at Cade Lake, renovations at the camp, and challenges with the Ministers' Retirement Program. All to say, *Unity* time is very short between conventions and the focus is on taking care of what is pressing at the moment.

So, when do we dream and vision as a denomination? When do we pray, seeking new avenues of service and ministry as a denomination from Christ the Head of the Church? How do we move beyond housekeeping (the things we are required of us to do to maintain our status as a church) to the mission and ministry of Christ?

Questions to ponder... with a response that needs to come from all us.

Cade Lake

Cade Lake Community Chapel, which burned on December 1, 2017, has been determined to be a total loss by the insurance company. The Unity has received payment for the loss, and a recent loan for the roof has been repaid to the Unity, which purchased the building as well as holds the insurance. The next step is the demolition of the remaining structure. Bids are being taken now. Work continues on getting a clear title to the property.

Ministers' Retirement

Over the years, the Unity has added several pastors to its ranks – some full time and some bivocational, without increased funding for the overall program to compensate pastors in an equitable way. The resolution to this challenge is in the making and hopefully will be resolved in the next few weeks as the Ministers Benefits Committee develops a plan that recognizes the faithful service of pastors and financial feasibility and viability of the overall program.

Hus Encampment

Progress is being made on the first stage of the renovation of the Main

Building. The anticipated completion of the kitchen renovation is mid-April, and at this time is on target. The septic system is being addressed, as well. Other renovations will hopefully begin after this summer's camps. Your prayers and donations are greatly appreciated.

Catechism


Ministers Code of Ethic

Spring Synodical Meeting Report

The 2018 Spring Synodical Meeting was held Saturday, March 3, at the Caldwell Brethren Church. The meeting began with a devotional by Rev. Dr. Larry Koslovsky on John 15:5, concluding with the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

The new Catechism was approved and is available online. A Code of Ethics for Pastors was also approved.

An update on the Hurricane Harvey Relief efforts was provided by Aaron Van Der Linden. The Port Arthur church is 90% complete and there is still work to be done for the parishioners. Donations have totaled over \$60,000. Esmy Racha, Secretary of the Good Shepherd Church, thanked the Unity for their support and prayers.

Kent Laza, Chair of the Hus Encampment Board of Trustees, provided an update on the renovations. Currently, the main building is being remodeled. Work on the sewer system will begin in March. Fundraising is underway, with current donations at \$462,000. Updates on programming and policies were shared. A motion was passed to approve Amy Snelgrove as the Programming Manager. A motion was also passed to allow the Board to operate outside of the By-Laws as they develop new operating procedures.

Rev. Dr. Larry Koslovsky updated the group on the Retirement Program. There are many issues to be addressed by the Benefits Committee: Rev. Dr. Larry Koslovsky, Liz Ripple (Treasurer), Rev. Jimmy Hejl (Chair), Rev. Mike Groseclose (Secretary).

It was approved to donate \$5000 to the Moravian Church for a John Hus Documentary.

Rev. Mark Sebek provided an update on the Foreign Missions Budget.

The Home Missions update included changes in the organizational structure at Cade Lake. Additional information was provided on the demolition from the fire, next steps, and the status of the land ownership.

Rev. Nello Strickland's retirement was acknowledged.

Officer reports were provided. A By-Laws Committee was approved. Members are Rev. Jimmy Hejl, Gayle Farrow, Liz Ripple, and Rev. Whitney Amos.

A motion was approved to defer the interest on the roof loan to Good Shepard until December 31, 2018.

A motion was passed to approve the budget revisions of the Home Mission Board.

Why We Should Pray for Jerusalem

Today I want to present a case for praving for a place that is decidedly not often on the American people's radar screen, but is at the center of God's heart. It is a place that shares both time and space with the eternal purposes of God. It is a place we are commanded to pray for: "Pray for the peace of Jerusalem" (Psalm 122:6) not once but constantly and continually: "You who call upon the LORD, give yourselves no rest and give Him no rest till He establishes Jerusalem and makes her the praise of the earth" (Isaiah 62:6-7). America, you are spiritually and literally embedded in God's divine purposes that emanated from the city of JerUSAlem, do you not see us hidden in there?! Let's reveal God's purposes for Jerusalem being our responsibility in our prayer closets.

In the ancient world of the Bible Jerusalem was considered the center of the earth. She is mentioned in the

Bible, 881 times, more than any other place. Today she is a city where east meets west and has been called the "epicenter" of the world by the renowned and contemporary author, Joel Rosenberg. As a world constantly in turmoil, Jerusalem is front and center in God's epic story of love and justice. God's story seems to shout from the Heavenly gates: As Jerusalem goes, so goes the world! God sends this word through the Prophet Zechariah: "I am going to make Jerusalem a cup that sends all the peoples reeling" (Zechariah 12:1). God's measure for "this cup" was given to Abraham, Father of the Jews: "I will bless those who bless vou, and whoever curses you I will curse; and all peoples on earth will be blessed through vou."

Jerusalem is first recognized by Abraham in God's story of Abraham meeting with Melechizedek, king of Salem. Salem means "peace" and was

The people of Jericho watch and laughed from the top of the walls (make army men laugh and *dance around*). This happened every day for a whole week. Joshua leading his people (march Joshua action figure) and the soldiers of Jericho laughing at them as they passed (*make the army men jump around and laugh*). Day after day for six days...until finally, on the last day they blew their trumpets! (*pull out a kazoo*). When the trumpets sounded the people shouted as loud as they could – why don't you do that part? Ready? The people shouted as loud as they could...I said as loud as you could! Good job! And the walls fell down! (knock them down) and God's people knocked over all the people of Jericho! (make your action figure attack all the little green army men). God fought for His people and they listened to God! The End.





the ancient site of Jerusalem (Genesis 14:18-20). King Melechizedek blessed Abraham and Abraham returned the blessing on the king and city of Salem by giving a tenth of all he owned. Jeremiah prophesies a day when the LORD will fully restore Israel and Jerusalem will be called "The Throne of the LORD, and all nations will gather in Jerusalem to honor the name of the LORD" (Jeremiah 3:17). Finally, in the last days Jerusalem will become "the city of the Great King" (Matthew 5:35) and will take her curtain call as "the bride, the wife of the Lamb... the Holy City, Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God... (shining) with the glory of God... (Revelation 21:9-11)."

Abraham Joshua Heschel, a wellknown Jewish theologian, defines Jerusalem as "a witness, an echo of eternity." An echo is produced by a voice resounding off a solid surface – a place. Heschel then brings us into the picture as the people who provide the echoes that witness by reminding us that Jerusalem alone is as nothing. "Jerusalem is not divine; her life depends on our presence. Alone she is desolate and silent, with Israel she is a witness, a proclamation. Alone *she is a widow, with Israel she is a bride.* "Jerusalem needs people, and God is revealing she needs people to pray for her constantly and continually!

Finally, for us who call ourselves Christian, Jerusalem stands both as a witness to the purposes of the Divine, and as an echo of the Bride with whom Messiah Jesus began the birthing process of new sons and daughters for the Kingdom through resurrection. These sons and daughters are the spiritual inheritance guaranteed to the Son in Psalm 2:7-8 "I will proclaim the decree: The LORD said to me, 'You are my son; today I become your father. Ask of me, and I will make the nations your inheritance; the whole wide world will be vour possession." As those who follow the Way of Jesus the Messiah, Jerusalem becomes our place of birthing. On that day of Passover, long ago, as the sword pierced the side of our crucified savior, blood and water gushed forth and joined with the ground of Jerusalem, symbolically producing new birth and new beginnings. It is a reminder of the distant past in The Garden when God reached into man's side and drew forth woman.

This day of "piercing the side" would produce and call forth the nations from the sacred ground of Jerusalem. No longer would only the Jews carry God's story, but the whole world would now be grafted in through the Jewish Son of God, Jesus, who reminds us in Revelation "...I am the Root and the offspring of David..." (Rev. 22:16). Now, Jerusalem, the city of kings and the Jewish capital of Israel, becomes as our birth mother. Our spiritual umbilical cord has come forth from the Jewish root and Jewish ground and the vine of God's purposes will emerge to encapsulate the world! It is no wonder that God would call us forth to honor Jerusalem with our prayers. "Honor your father and your mother, as the LORD your God commanded you, so that you may live long and that it may go well with you in the land the LORD your God is giving you" (Deuteronomy 5:16). Prayers of honor and praise for our

birthplace and spiritual mother, Jerusalem, bring forth blessings of life and wellness. Next, we continue in our prayers for Jerusalem by focusing on Psalm 122:2-5:



the thrones of the house of David."



All About Easter - by Liz Treybig

Everyone knows that Easter falls on different dates during various years, but do you know how that is determined? Sometimes Easter is early, as in March, and other years late, like this year when it is in the middle of April (April 16). It starts with Lent, which is a 40-day period beginning on Ash Wednesday. Maundy Thursday is the day signified by the Last Supper Jesus shared with His Apostles in the year 33AD. Crucifixion has been determined to be about April 3, 33AD. (This is also the day that an eclipse was taking place.) Easter always is a Sunday. The First Council of Nicaea in 325AD decided that the first Sunday after the full moon of Passover (around same time of the Last Supper) would be Easter. It is the 14th day of the lunar month, since full moon is different days in different time zones. It takes place on the full moon after the Spring Equinox, called the Paschal Moon. In 2018, Easter will be on April 1.

Some churches light candles starting on Easter Eve (midnight) to show that Jesus is the "light of the world". He rose to life on Easter Day (Resurrection) to rid the work of darkness of evil. In Greece fireworks are used to start Easter services. Flowers fill the church to represent new life. Priests wear their brightest/best robes. In Italy, the Pope holds a large mass or communion in St. Peter's Square in Vatican City. Some churches hold sunrise services.

Eggs and chicks are related to Easter because in Pagan times they were signs of fertility and new life. Christians took over the meaning of new life to remember the Resurrection and new life through Jesus from the Pagan custom in later years.

In Russia in the early 20th Century, eggs were made of gold and white emerald. Inside one that Alexander III gave to his wife, there was a golden hen with ruby eggs. Inside the hen there was a tiny golden crown. Faberge made these eggs in following years with different designs, and each had a surprise in it. These eggs are very expensive and kept in royal collections.

Egg rolling races are also held down hills in some places for Easter. Eggs were used by ancient Persians

In Hungary and Romania, wooden eggs are beautifully painted in different patterns which have special names and meanings to tell the Easter story. Egg knocking games are played in Germany, France, Norway, and Syria. It uses hard-boiled eggs and is a kind of game of "conkers". The object is to hit everyone's egg, but keep yours unbroken.

Bonfires are set on hillsides in Europe on Easter Eve also. This is done in places outside Austin also. Germany celebrates the holiday with children off from school for three weeks, and no one works on Good Friday, Easter Saturday, or Easter.

In France, church bells do not ring for three days, and then on Easter there is a major celebration in the country and the bells all ring.

In Hungary, boys sprinkle perfume or cologne on young ladies' heads and ask for a kiss.

In Brazil, they make straw dolls to represent Judas and hang them in the streets and beat them.

In Sweden, children dress up as Easter witches with long skirts, painted

faces, and colorful head scarfs. They go house to house and exchange paintings for goodies. Kind of like our Halloween in the US.

In Indonesia, statues are carried through the streets and men consider it an honor to carry them.

In the Czech Republic, on Easter Monday men spank women with handmade whips made of willow and decorated ribbons. Willow is believed to be the first tree to green in the Spring. The willow is believed to transfer fertility to the lady. It is all done in a playful and good-time-fun way. No harm is done.

In Florence, Italy, decorated wagons are dragged through the streets with white oxen, and when they get to the church and Gloria is sang inside, the Archbishop sends a dove-shaped rocket into the cart and ignites it to make a large firework display for everyone.

In Washington, DC, the annual Easter egg roll (since the early 19th Century) is held on the White House lawn on Easter Monday, with children rolling colored hard-boiled eggs with a large serving spoon down the hill. Native items were used to color

eggs many years ago. Spinach leaves were used to make the color green, beet root was used for red, tea bags for dark brown, onion skins on white eggs makes yellow/gold and on brown eggs it makes rusty red, red cabbage makes light red, purple cabbage on white eggs makes blue and on brown eggs makes green, beets make pink on white eggs and maroon on brown eggs, turmeric makes yellow on white eggs, and red Zinger tea makes lavender.

So, no matter what type of celebration you have for Easter... the celebration of Life Everlasting is the reason to celebrate and to give "thanks" for Jesus's sacrifice. Go and celebrate the Resurrection this Easter! Praise the Lord!
