Cade Lake

Cade Lake is still in recovery mode. Progress is being made at a pace that allows for thoughtful planning and good decision making. In cooperation with the Home Mission Board, current staff, and the Chapel community in dialogue with Lamar Urbanovsky, building plans are currently being developed.

Cade Lake is currently meeting at Caldwell Middle School. Sunday School begins at 11 a.m., lunch is at 12 p.m., and the worship is at 1p.m.

Second Phase of Main Building Renovation

The plans are complete for the second part of the renovation of the Main Building that has served the camp and denomination for 60 years. What is needed are funds to complete this project in time for next summer's camps.

The first phase of the renovation required extensive attention to water, septic, electrical, and power backup systems adding to the initial costs of the first phase of the project. With these systems now upgraded and updated, the first phase and second phase of the Main Building along

with all subsequent stages of future development and construction can be handled by the upgrades.

The second phase of the Main Building includes additional air conditioning, restrooms, repositioning of entrances, and attention to the interior that comes with remodeling. Anticipated cost is \$350,000.

Missions

Home Missions exceeded its 2017 budget of \$58,000 with donations of \$64,319.39. Foreign Missions received \$70,546.21 toward its 2017 budget of \$73,000. Add to this, donations made to Harvey Relief and Cade Lake in response to the fire along with donations to the first phase of the renovations/building program at the camp. WOW! What this adds up to is not only a good sum of money to do ministry, but also tremendous generosity. Thanks so much!

While most of us probably take this simple path for granted, it, and the entire Hus Camp, are truly tools that God has used to touch my life and the

lives of many others. In fact, if we were able to calculate the total impact that this facility, its programming, volunteers, and students/campers have had on the world around us, we would be amazed at what the Lord has done through this place and those who have passed through it.

Recently, the Unity endorsed a major capital building campaign at the Hus Camp. Youth Director Jennifer Chervenka (254) 983-1002 Cemetery Sharon Marek (254) 869-2845 got him a recording of the New Testament in his Mixtec dialect. He's already in Romans.

Then came all our summer travel, and the whole time we were praying for Zotico and Maria. We knew that Jehovah's Witnesses were studying with them and inviting them to their gathering, too. We had no idea what it would look like when we got back, because we had only met a few times to pray and listen to the Mixtec Bible.

But things have gone quick since we've returned. They had been waiting for us. Zotico told us that he is "all in" with God, so we prayed with him about his assurance of belonging to Christ (Maria is still wanting to hear some more about Jesus before she takes this step). They went to church with us and promptly signed themselves up for the Tuesday night prayer meeting. It's heartening to watch someone moving faster toward God than you expected. We feel like we're running to catch up (like Philip and the Eunuch) so we can open doors for them to move closer to Jesus. The pastor of the church is very supportive. He's organizing a special Sunday School class to teach Bible stories orally (there are others in this Zapotec

town that can't read). We have a trip coming up, and as soon as we return we'll be baptizing Zotico. In the interim, he wants to share more with his family (his three married children live with him).

Yesterday after we taught him and Maria to tell the Creation story (they had no idea that it's Jesus who crushes the head of the serpent), he told us he had something to tell us. He said he couldn't keep walking into this commitment without telling us his past. He told us after his father had died. his mother had remarried a man in another town. Then this man was murdered. The step-brothers blamed Zotico's mother. They abducted and killed her, her daughter, and a grandbaby. When Zotico's brother came to find out what had happened, they shot him, too. Then the killers came after Zotico. He defended himself, killed one of the attackers, and went to jail for 12 years. "I've paid my debt to society," he said, "but will God forgive me? Can I still belong to Jesus with this past?"

I said, "Jesus forgave His own killers when He was hanging on a cross. He sure can forgive you." We

August 2018 Missionaries in Mexico

Dear friends,

Sometimes when you talk to people about Jesus they kind of cringe, and it's an uphill climb because they've been turned off by any number of things about Christianity, or else they just don't think that God is much use to them right now. You have to respect that. But sometimes God has already been working in someone's heart long before you came along, and when you broach the Jesus topic, they are all over it. They were just waiting for someone to say something, and you did.

This is what has been happening with our neighbor, Zotico. He and his wife Maria are Mixtecs from the coast, near where we used to live, and we can kind of understand each other's dialect. We say *tani kun*, and they say *nakum chun*. Their Spanish is

excellent, so language isn't a barrier. They sell tacos from a little stand across the street. Robert sometimes gets breakfast there and found out they were Mixtecs, and that is how we started being friends. Last Easter I sat down to eat some tacos at their stand, and I asked them what they were doing for Easter. They said "nothing." I pulled out a syringe stuffed with red and yellow tissue paper. I handed this to Zotico and said that I loved Easter because it reminds me of how Jesus put His resurrection blood into me, a bit like when you get an injection. I said that Jesus' blood cures me of sin and death because He puts His God/human blood in me and in all those who belong to Him. He makes us a new race. Zotico had just been diagnosed with diabetes and was instantly interested in God's power over sin, disease, and death. But it wasn't just about getting a quick cure. He was interested in God. He can't read (never went to school but worked all through childhood), so we



Superhero Freeze Tag

None of us have been to Heaven like John. Some of us may have been to places like California or even Hawaii for a trip. Some of us may have cool computers or cell phones that not everyone else has. We've all been granted certain privileges in life that we should be thankful for.

- 1. Choose one student to be "It".
- 2. If a student sees "It" coming towards them, he can say the name of a superhero to be safe. Then, sit down and can be safe for ten seconds; after ten seconds they must stand back up!
- 3. If "It" thinks a student has been sitting for longer than ten seconds or did not originally call out the name of a superhero, then he or she can say "1, 2, 3, you are no longer free!" and is now able to tag the sitting student.
- 4. The game is over after all players have been tagged out.

Superman came from Krypton. He could lift a planet and carry it through space. Hawkwoman and Hawkman are crime-solving superheroes from the planet Thane-gar, who were beamed to earth to solve crimes. Kilowog is a green lantern BolovaxVik. He mentored most of the green lantern superheroes. What is extra special about all these superheroes? They are from other planets, other worlds. Heaven is another world. Do we know what heaven is like?

There are three superheroes who have been to heaven. They are Enoch, Elijah, and John. The difference between these men is that John was allowed to come back and tell us what happened. That is the Book of Revelation in our Bible! John was Jesus' favorite disciple. He also wrote the Gospel of John and First, Second and Third John. He was transformed to go into heaven.

Martin Luther - The Saxon Hus

Recently, a friend asked me about what theologians have said about Jan Hus. I instantly recalled an event known historically as the Leipzig Debate, which I shared with him. It took place at the beginning of July in the year 1519. This event was so significant that the Rev. Dr. Craig D. Atwood included it in two of his books. The first was *The Theology of the Czech Brethren from Hus to Comenius*. The second was *Always Reforming: A History of Christianity Since 1300*.

A century had passed since Jan Hus was burned at the stake in 1415; his voice forever silenced by the Council of Constance. Almost two years had elapsed since Luther's Ninety-Five Theses had been nailed to the church door in Wittenberg on October 31, 1517. The church of the 16th Century was still in need of reforms. Now, Martin Luther challenged the authority of the pope and church councils alike. Like Hus before him, the sale of Indulgences also bothered Luther. He specifically addressed these in four of the Ninety-Five Theses.

- 21. Thus those indulgence preachers are in error who say that a man is absolved from every penalty and saved by papal indulgences.
- 22. As a matter of fact, the pope remits to souls in purgatory no penalty, which, according to cannon law, they should have paid for in their life.
- 23. If remission of all penalties whatsoever could be granted to anyone at all, certainly it would be granted only to the most perfect, that is, to very few.
- 24. For this reason most people are necessarily deceived by that indiscriminate and high-sounding promise of release from penalty.

The abuse of Indulgences had a significant economic impact over the years. Almost 150,000 ducati per year went into the building of St. Peter's basilica in Rome. The annual expenses of Pope Leo X topped 600,000 ducati. Meanwhile, the income of the average middle class worker in Germany was roughly 200 ducati per year.

Luther successfully defended his Ninety-Five Theses earlier in April

1518 before a committee of Augustinian monks of his monastic order. Although there was some disagreement by the older and more conservative monks, the Ninety-Five Theses were published and spread throughout Europe. At this, Pope Leo X summoned Luther to Rome to recant his teachings and ask forgiveness. If not, Luther would likely face excommunication as did Hus a century before. Many attempts made by government and church officials to reason with Luther failed.

Luther greatly desired to debate Indulgences with John Eck, a theologian at the University of Leipzig. In July 1519, Luther got his wish. Eck proved to be a formidable opponent. At one point Eck accused Luther of being a Hussite as he rejected the authority of the pope to grant Indulgences. Luther suddenly found himself cornered. Should he deny the statement, he could be easily perceived as significantly undermining his own position. Should he agree, he could then easily be labeled a heretic by Eck.

With church and secular powers looking on, Luther asked for a recess to prepare a response. The recess granted, he went to the university library and read the official chronicle of the Council of Constance.

When Luther returned to the debate, Eck must have felt like he had his opponent right where he wanted him. Luther surprised everyone, including Eck, by stating that Hus was right. Before the shock had time to wear off, he added that it was the Council that erred. Luther was then referred to as the Saxon Hus by supporters and detractors alike.

Things accelerated quickly. Luther's writings sold all over Germany. In June 1520, Pope Leo X issued a papal bull condemning Luther on 42 counts of heresy. He gave Luther 60 days to recant or face excommunication. Luther responded by publicly burning both the bull and a copy of the canon law to demonstrate that it was the church that needed reformation.

On January 3, 1521, the pope formally excommunicated Martin Luther.


In April 1521, Luther appeared before the Imperial Diet in the town of Worms. A papal representative asked Luther if he repudiated his books and his errors. Luther said he could not unless convinced "by Scripture and plain reason." This is strikingly like what Jan Hus said to the Council of Constance. When asked to recant, Hus challenged his accusers to show him in Scripture where he was in error. No attempt to do so was made.
