

# New Tabor Church Celebrates 125th Anniversary with Homecoming Event



Members of New Tabor Brethren Church held their 125th Anniversary and Homecoming celebration on Sunday, October 14, at the church.

The day began with a service at 10 a.m. led by Rev. David Johnson. The service featured special music, songs sung in Czech, the sacrament of Holy Communion and much more.

A barbecue meal was served at noon along with Czech pastries for dessert. Czech music played during lunch and a bucket raffle of unique items was offered, including a pew from the church that was auctioned off. One highlight was the special display of photos of the church and its members past and present.

The history of the New Tabor Brethren Church had its beginning in 1870, when the Czech settlers began

arriving in this small community located about three miles east of Caldwell. This was the first Czech-Moravian settlement in Burleson County. Some of these settlers came directly from Czechoslovakia and Moravia, while others settled in Wesley (Washington County) first and later came to New Tabor. These people had come to America for the purpose of seeking freedom of worship, so it was only natural that soon after the community was established, they began making plans for conducting worship services in the faith of their forefathers, the Evangelical Czech-Moravian Brethren.

At first, they met only about twice a year for community services in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Josef Macat,



with the men of the community taking turns conducting the services. This continued from 1870-1877, the year which Rev. L. J. Chlumsky, who at that time was serving the church in Wesley, was called to conduct the services. He accepted and fulfilled the call until 1881.

By the year 1881, a public-school building had been built, and the worship services were held there. From 1881-1893, Rev. Henry Juren of Fayette County served as pastor for the community services. Rev. L. L. Chlumsky and Rev. Henry Juren each came to serve only two or three times a year, and laymen served between these visits. Services continued to be held in the public-school building until 1893.

In the year 1893, the church congregation was officially organized under the guidance of Rev. Adolph Chlumsky and became known as the Evangelical Brethren Church. It was the first of the Brethren congregations organized in this community and the ninth of its kind in the State of Texas. Twelve elders were elected to conduct the affairs of the new church. These were Joe F. Nedbalek, Josef Macat, Frank Stefka, Josef

Stalmach, Tomas Kubin, Josef Skrivanek, Jan Machan, Vinc Balcar Jr., P.J. Skrabanek, Jan Skrabanek, Frank Haisler and Frank Marek. By this time the congregation was composed of some 40 families.

Inadequate space in the school building forced the congregation to plan for a building of its own. The members decided to conduct a building fund campaign, with three members contacting the regular members for donations while others spread out in the surrounding communities asking for help. Most of the settlers were in adverse circumstances financially, but they made contributions of labor and cotton as well as cash, each according to his ability.

A total of \$2,000 was collected in cash, and the family of Frank Skrivanek, Sr., donated a plot of ground. Members began hauling lumber in wagons from Brenham free of charge, each trip taking from three to four days. Joe Havel. Sr., was the general contractor, and other members worked as a building crew without charge. The completed building was built at a total cost of \$2,850.

This first church building was formally dedicated to the Lord on Octo-

ber 15, 1893, with Rev. Adolph Chlumsky and the Rev. Henry Juren participating in the dedicatory service. The large number of people who attended assembled first in the schoolhouse, and then went by procession to the new building, where the church key was presented to the pastor by Emilie Pollock (Mrs. John St. Wrba). One feature of the dedication service was the presentation of special songs by a choir that had traveled from the Wesley church.

In that same year, 27 young people were received into the church membership by the rite of confirmation. A free-will offering taken was used to buy an organ at a cost of \$71.60. Albina Skrivanek (Mrs. John Dusek) became the first organist and choir director, a service rendered until 1897. With the congregation now fully organized, and ministers more readily available, worship services were being conducted on a monthly basis.

In 1897, Rev. Adolph Chlumsky discontinued serving the church, so Rev. Anton Motycka of Nelsonville was called. He accepted and served until 1899. Between 1899 and 1905, Rev. B. O. Kubricht, Rev. A. V. Koukol, Rev. Adolph Chlumsky, and Rev. Henry

Juren were called to serve on a temporary basis, but in 1905 Rev. Anton Motycka again became pastor and continued to serve until his death in the fall of 1935.

At this point a new era was begun in the life of the church, when Rev. F. J. Kostohryz was called. He was baptized and confirmed in the New Tabor church and had taught Sunday school and was active among the young people. He was the first young man from New Tabor to enter the ministry. and was now being called back to be pastor of his home congregation. He began serving in 1936 and served as the Czech pastor until his death in August 1971. During this period, Mrs. Kostohryz was organist for all his services and assisted in training all the confirmation classes.

In 1898, the women of the church bought a bell for the church at a cost of \$70.15. It was placed in the belfry and dedicated in October of 1898. By 1899, there were about 150 families of the Evangelical Brethren faith in the community, and the average attendance at worship services was about 250 people. In 1899, the Sunday school was organized with Joseph Siptak, Sr.,

as the first teacher.

In August of 1915, a tornado struck the community and demolished the church building and all its furnishings. Being a complete loss, the members of the congregation immediately set to work clearing the debris and rebuilding.

The second building was dedicated on October 15, 1951. The community was becoming more populated, and church membership was increasing. More space was needed, so in 1921 the congregation decided to add an extension to the building. This enlarged building was used until October of 1953, when it was torn down and rebuilt. The school property adjacent to the church was no longer used, so it was purchased and the material used. This third building, which now included a fellowship room, Sunday school room, and kitchen, was dedicated on May 30, 1954. Many families of the congregation had placed memorials in the new sanctuary in honor or memory of their loved ones. The present church building is still in the same spot where the first church was built in 1893 and the same lumber was used in rebuilding it that was used in the church built in 1915.

In 1915, the Independent Unity of the Brethren Churches was formed in a meeting held in the New Tabor church.

In 1919, during a state convention of all Czech-Moravian Brethren Churches in Texas held in the New Tabor Church, the Evangelical Unity of the Czech-Moravian Brethren Churches was formed, resulting in a combination of churches into a unified denomination.

The congregation donated one acre of land on July 2, 1971, for the establishment of the New Tabor Brethren Cemetery just north of the church building.

The Sunday school had grown to the point that more room was necessary, so an extension was added which included five Sunday school rooms, a recreation room, hall, and a storage room.

Improvements were made to the church facilities such as refurbishing the chancel and the sanctuary, installing central heating and air-conditioning, paneling the fellowship room, carpeting the sanctuary, and paving the parking area.

On October 1, 1993, the church celebrated its centennial anniversary

with morning worship and an afternoon program and social.

In 1994, the church built its own parsonage for the pastor in Copperas Hollow in Caldwell.

In 1998 a new stand-alone family fellowship building was built to better serve the growing congregation for social events.

In 2005, the new church sign marquee was donated in honor of Dennis Marek by his family and by the family of Theodore Dusek and placed in front of the church beside the front roadway.

In 2010, a major remodeling of the old fellowship room and Sunday school classrooms began, and in the process of the work some major structural issues were discovered which resulted in the doubling of the cost of the project. New front entry doors to the church foyer were dedicated in honor of Johnny Stefka by his family. The recreation room was remodeled into a family gathering room for families to be more comfortable at funeral services and used for pre-wedding gathering and smaller meeting events. The project was completed in 2011.

In 2013 the church celebrated its 120th Anniversary with Czech music, lunch, and many other activities. In 2014 a local food ministry was started for the residents at Burleson County Heights Apartments. Each month members of the congregation donate food items to reach out to those in need. The mission is to find a need and meet it, find a hurt and heal it.

## Their Hearts' Desire

Collectively speaking, my Sunday school class is know as "The Encouragers." I have been privileged enough to lead this class for the last few years, and spending time with my students is something I look forward to each week.

We take up a weekly offering which we utilize for things like VBS, church projects, and community outreach programs, to name a few. Along with these, there is an ongoing program we have been a part of since its inception – the purchasing of Bibles for believers around the world in each recipient's language. As I write this, we have purchased 795 Bibles to date, and the program has distributed almost 3.6 million worldwide.

This is an impressive figure, but what makes it even more impressive is that the organizers of this effort felt that if 10,000 Bibles were financed, the program would have been deemed a success. When the program reached the one million mark, a letter was sent to participants in gratitude. Included was a phrase that I will never forget: "But God blew the doors off our feeble faith."

Our Bibles have made their way into 17 countries. Listed in descending order of Bibles purchased are China, India, Vietnam, Colombia, Egypt, Indonesia, Cuba, Nepal, North Korea, Nigeria, Burma, Ethiopia, Hmong, Iran, Mexico, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka. We have learned a great deal about the persecution Christians in these regions face. In many cases, revealing the fact that you are Christian makes

life difficult. In some cases the consequences can prove lethal.

In places such as China and Egypt, Christianity is legal. The Chinese government influences what can be taught and preached from the pulpit. Books of the Bible dealing with prophecy are "discouraged". Those who seek complete truth gather in independent "house churches", which the government has openly declared illegal. When discovered, these house churches are typically demolished. Its leadership is often arrested.

In Egypt, the situation is better, but not much. Although Christianity is legal, Christians find themselves deemed second class citizens. This makes it extremely difficult for them to find employment or get married.

On the other end of this spectrum are countries that are openly hostile toward Christians.

Take India, for example. It currently has the largest Hindu population in the world. Throughout much of its history, India has had a strong Muslim presence, as well. Assuming trends continue, it could eventually have the largest Muslim population as well. Despite Hinduism's vast presence and Islam's growing influence, one thing is becoming quite clear. There is a growing curiosity about Jesus. That said, there is clear opposition both to the gospel and those who share it. The government is openly asking foreign Christians to leave the country to bolster its Hindu nationalism. Hindu radicals have turned to beating Christians, burning Bibles,
















# State BYF 2017-2018 Wrap Up

Our theme for 2017-2018 was Covered by God's Grace. The Fall Retreat was September 16-17, 2017, and the Winter Retreat was January 6-7, 2018. Who doesn't love to come and hang out at the camp and grow closer to God with good friends, good food, and good fellowship? The youth have focused on faults, flaws, and failures and the sufficiency of God's grace to cover them all.

In the fall, we admitted that we tend to criticize and judge others more than seek to recognize the sin in our own lives. With studies from Matthew, James, and 3 John, we determined that we are all God's children, and he loves us equally. Our words and actions towards others can build or tear down God's kingdom.

In January we dug into the book of Romans to look at ourselves and our own struggle with sin. Paul talks about the struggle between our sinful nature and the Holy Spirit that dwells inside of us. He reminds us that Christ died to set us free and that God has a greater glory awaiting us in heaven.

God's grace is great enough to cover all our faults, flaws, and failures. His love is never-ending and never-failing, and nothing can separate us from it.

The convention began at 8:30 a.m. During the business meeting, the constitution was amended, and the leadership team for 2018-2019 was elected. His death was torture and gruesome, yet it brought us victory over sin and death. We celebrated with Holy Communion. The tournament followed. and killing pastors, knowing that regional authorities will likely look the other way.

In North Korea, being a Christian has fatal consequences. I recall watching a video taken on a cell phone that was somehow smuggled out of the country. The government learned of a man who was evangelizing in his village. Early one morning, the military entered this village in strength. The entire village was forced to witness this man's execution by firing squad. The deed done, an officer stood up in his vehicle and warned all the villagers through a megaphone: "This is what happens to fools! Do not be a fool!" North Koreans who manage to get Bibles go to tremendous efforts to memorize it. To have one found in their possession guarantees an automatic death sentence.

One of the most moving stories I encountered came out of Iran. A young

man and his friends were given free reign by local religious leaders to enforce their interpretation of Islam. He admitted this "honor" quickly deteriorated into just an excuse to throw their weight around. Having heard that someone had converted to Christianity, the young man confronted him alone. The accused denied nothing. In fact, he used this as an opportunity to share Christ with the young man. His faith and bravery eventually swayed the young man, who turned his life over to Christ, as well. He is now among the persecuted. Several unsuccessful attempts on his life have been made.

These are but a few of the stories we as a class have shared. With each monthly purchase, we pray for the safety of the recipients and for their courage to share what we sometimes take for granted.

## The Cornerstone

What or who is the cornerstone of your life? The centerpiece? The "backbone"?

Is it work? Is it your family? Could it be yourself?

A cornerstone in architectural terms is critical to a building. It is a stone forming a part of a corner or angle in a wall. Until the development of modern construction, a building could not stand without the cornerstone. It was a real support.

In the Gospel of Mark, in the Holy Bible, we witness the reality that this world belongs to God.

As we strive to build lives for ourselves, are we forgetting that the mission is to build lives that hold Jesus Christ as the Centerpiece, the Cornerstone, the One without whom we cannot stand?

Listen in on Mark, chapter 12, verses 1-12, from the Holy Bible (NRSV):

Then Jesus began to speak to them in parables.

"A man planted a vineyard, put a fence around it, dug a pit for the wine press, and built a watchtower; then he leased it to tenants and went to another country. 2 When the season came, he sent a slave to the tenants to collect from them his share of the produce of the vineyard. 3 But they seized him, and beat him, and sent him away empty handed. 4 And again he sent another slave to them; this one they beat over the head and insulted. 5 Then he sent another, and that one they killed. And so it was with many others; some they beat, and others they killed. 6 He had still one other, a beloved son. Finally he sent him to them, saying, 'They will respect my son.' 7 But those tenants said to one another, 'This is the heir; come, let us kill him, and the inheritance will be ours.' 8 So they seized him, killed him, and threw him out of the vineyard. 9 What then will the owner of the vinevard do? He will come and destroy the tenants and give the vinevard to others. 10 Have you not read this scripture: 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone; 11 this was





# Our Tie to Israel Is Supernatural

## Greetings from the Foreign Mission Board - by David Miller

Therefore, in the natural (Satan has influence over the natural) or in worldly views, antisemitism has always been around and always will.

From there, let's back up. The media (Hollywood, network TV, you name it) is desensitizing our sensibilities. My kids (now grown up) tell me I read too much into everything, "Can't you just watch this or read that for the entertainment of it?" Sorry, no! I guess it comes from my reading the Bible, where every word is God breathed and has meaning. I'm compelled to pay attention to details, words, sentences, paragraphs, books, trying to grasp what God wants me to see. So, I can't help the way I watch a movie, or a TV show, or even read. (My wife doesn't want to be in the same room with me when I pick up the newspaper.) But I digress!

"We are in the world, not of the world." This notion is consistent with the teaching of the New Testament, even if it isn't a direct quote.

John 15:19: "If you were of the world, the world would love you as its own; but because you are not of the world, but I chose you out of the world, therefore the world hates you."

John 17:14-16 (Jesus praying to the Father on our behalf): "I have given them your word, and the world has hated them because they are not of the world, just as I am not of the world. I do not ask that you take them out of the world, but that you keep them from the evil one. They are not of the world, just as I am not of

the world."

It seems that Jesus understood the tension we would experience as Christians in this hostile ideological world. We could go many ways with this from here, but back to the purpose of this letter.

"Our tie to Israel is supernatural." In other words, it is God ordained. We are all somewhat familiar with the "Abrahamic Covenant."

Gen. 12:3: I will bless those who bless you, and him who dishonors you I will curse, and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."

We don't have any problem with the prophetic promise of the Christ through Israel, we Christians are products of that promise. And I could put together a long list in history of the first part of this promise being played out. So, are we beneficiaries of the first part so long as we bless Israel? Yes, and more, as Christians we are now under the Abrahamic Covenant, we are the hands and feet of Christ in the fulfillment of this covenant. We understand this as the "Great Commission."

But to find the God ordained connection between the West and Israel, we have to go back even farther than the Abrahamic Covenant with His people to the blessing of Noah to his sons. (Of course, you can argue whether God will honor the blessing of the righteous man Noah concerning mankind, but as a general rule we see this also reflected in history.)



After the flood (Gen 9:1: And God blessed Noah and his sons and said to them, 'Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth."") God through Noah and his sons populated the earth. Gen 9:18: The sons of Noah who went forth from the ark were Shem, Ham, and Japheth. (Ham was the father of Canaan.) # From Robert and Anne Thiessen . . .

## November 2018 Missionaries in Mexico

Dear friends,

You've heard us refer to our work alongside the Mexican mission group, *Sin Fronteras*. These 25 (and growing) dedicated people are focused on bringing the Good News of God's love to indigenous villages where there is still very little presence of the hope and freedom that brings.

We started interacting with them about a dozen years ago, with occasional teachings when Robert was on his way to Guerrero every couple of months. The relationship grew when SF invited Anne to teach a week-long course on Cultural Adaptation and Church Planting in 2009, and most years since. Once we got back from the "cancer year", in 2016, we increased our involvement through *Instituto Voces*, a life-long learning platform for missiological reflection.

Every two or three weeks Anne uploads a 5-page essay, an audio recording of it, and they receive it wherever they are and begin to interact with her and the others in the group about the issue. We've also helped SF implement pastoral training, mentoring and discipling among some of the more established churches in the area.

In September, the founder of SF asked Anne for further help. Most of the missionaries are in villages that still speak a mother tongue other than Spanish. There are many difficulties for outsiders as they learn these pre-Columbian indigenous languages. Both members of SF that were responsible for supervising language learning are moving on to new ministries, and Alejandro asked Anne to fill the gap.

Anne had found that the transition away from high-school teaching left her with a frustrating vacuum, and here was a great way for her to serve even more, in a way that maximizes her gifts and experience.

That means that we are moving in

November. SF is headquartered in Tlaxiaco, about three hours west of us. We are in the process of packing up here and finding a suitable place there. Robert is looking for a shop that will facilitate training some of the missionaries in trades. They are all already bi-vocational, and this would augment that. The packing
