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The 68th Biennial Convention of the Unity of the Brethren – Minutes Summary

The 68th Biennial Convention of the Unity of the Brethren was held July 11 and 12, 2019, in Wall, Texas. Attendance was 134 on Thursday and 100 on Friday. The Convention opened with a worship service and the Sacrament of Holy Communion. Convention participants participated in breakout discussions regarding issues facing the Unity.

Missionaries Joel and Teresa Jelski and Robert and Annie Thiessen also shared their work.

The evening concluded with a program by motivational comedian and magician, Billy Riggs. Former and current Hus School members sang "Hoj Verni v Boj", led by Rev. Tommy Tallas and accompanied by Donna Tallas.

Friday was opened with worship and a devotional by the 2019 Hus School class. Participants participated once again in breakout sessions; summaries of the discussions were presented. Several business sessions were conducted to take care of motions and elections.

Motions approved include:

- 1) That the 69th Unity of the Brethren Convention will be held at Camp Allen, or a similar retreat facility,
 - 2) Amend Bylaws Article II.B;
 - 3) Amend Bylaws Article XX.A,
- 4) To pay from Major Gifts (formerly Grants and Bequests) \$8000 toward the salary of the Unity Youth Coordinator.
- 5) Approve current salary with an increase in mileage reimbursement to meet the IRS employee rate,
 - 6) To amend Bylaws Article VI.B.2,
- 7) Development of a committee to look at cost-effective means to operate *The Brethren Journal*.
- 8) To approve an annual salary of \$9600 for the Executive Assistant AND to reimburse Executive Assistant mileage at the IRS employee rate, and
- 9) That Brethren Fund annual assessment be increased from \$35 to

\$40 per member, and that the funds be dispersed as follows: Administrative Revenue: from 9% to 10%, Brethren Journal Revenue: from 17% to 10%, Contingency Fund Revenue: from 30% to 18%, Educational Ministries: from 13% to 35%, Executive Assistant: from 10% to 9%, Hus School Revenue: from 21% to 18%.

David Miller was elected Chair of the Foreign Missions Board.

Kent Laza (BCS) was elected Chair of the Hus Board of Trustees.

Brethren Journal Business Manager is Ben Polasek and Editor is Cathleen Schlechte.

Ministerial Credentialing Committee elections included Rev. Tim Chaplin, Rev. Whitney Amos, and Rev. Dr. Jerry Terrill.

Missionaries Phil and Eunice Raiford also shared about their work in Oaxaca, Mexico.

The motion was presented to the main body of the convention, and after amendment we approved for the Synodical Committee to establish a sub-committee to address the concerns related to the publishing costs of The Brethren Journal.





Say: God was working on your specialness even before you were born. Let's try to figure out which one of God's special creations ate my cookie. Try to match someone's fingerprints with the ones on the plate. Kids will discover that the fingerprints are yours.

Say: How did you figure out that the prints belonged to me? How are my fingerprints different from yours? I'm glad God made our fingerprints so different and special!

MIRROR IMAGES

Materials: Bible, mirror, photo of each child

Experiment:

Do: Form small groups. Give each group a mirror, and have kids take turns looking at Bible text reflected in the mirror.

Say: What do you see? Mirrors produce a reflection that appear backwards because light waves reflect straight off the surface. A face in the mirror is different; it doesn't look backward in a mirror because it's symmetrical, which means that when the image is divided, both halves look the same. Take turns looking into the mirror. What unique facial qualities do you see in the mirror?

Do: Demonstrate how to hold the edge of the mirror perpendicular to the photo. Half of the face should reflect into the mirror, making the photo and reflection look like a whole face. Allow time for each child to test the mirror concept.

Ask: How was your symmetrical reflection similar/different to your photo? Did this experiment reflect an image that you would easily recognize, or does the image look like a stranger to you?

Discuss:

Read 2 Corinthians 3:18. Say: This Scripture says that we're to reflect the Lord's glory. Your life is a reflection of a life that's been changed by God; your actions can reveal what God is like. Look at your reflection in the mirror. Does your image reflect a person who's been changed by God? What can you do to reflect what God is like every day?



KNITTED TOGETHER

Materials:

Dark colored plate (glass), half-eaten cookie, talcum powder, small paintbrush, 3x5 cards, baby wipes, stamp pad

Preparation:

Place a half-eaten cookie on the plate. Then make very clear fingerprints on the top of the plate. Make sure no one else touches the plate.

Experiment:

Say: Can you help me figure out who ate my cookie? What's something that each person has and no two are alike?

Do: Remove the cookie and sprinkle the plate with powder. Use the paintbrush to lightly spread the powder across the plate.

Say: What did the powder show? We all have oil on our fingers and leave a little of it on everything we touch. Here, the oil left behind fingerprints! Each of us has a different fingerprint. It is one of the things that make you special. Let's look at your fingerprints!

Say: You each have a 3x5 card. Press one finger into the stamp pad, then onto the card. Label your print with which finger and which hand. Continue the process until you have done all ten fingers! When you are done, wipe off your hands with a baby wipe.

Ask: What do you notice about your fingerprints? Do they look like anyone else's? What's the same? What's different?

Explain:

The science of identifying fingerprints is called dactylography. People who investigate crimes use fingerprints to help capture criminals because no two prints are alike. One of the ways your fingers got those little prints on them is from moving around in your mother's womb. That's where God formed you, and you grew there until it was time for you to be born. All of your movements in the womb made those little swirls on your fingers. Read Psalm 139:13.

Heads Up!

Who doesn't like it when a friend or other loved one gives you a "heads up!"? A "heads up!" could be to warn you of a conflict coming your way or perhaps of an opportunity for you to seize. Virtually every time, a "heads up!" is welcome and sought after. God gives us a "heads up!" as we remain in touch with Him. The challenge with receiving a "heads up!" in a timely manner is that you have to be in tune with your surroundings.

Mostly, we just need to be in tune with God's voice – singing through life with His joy, His truth as our way of life, and His love as our impetus for our every action. The question now comes to bear: How close are you to God? Have you cultivated a spirituality that enables you to maintain maximum closeness to Jesus Christ?

Take a moment to read Psalm 3 below. Note the Hebrew word, "selah," appears three times. "Selah" is generally accepted to mean to pause and reflect over what has just been said. As you read Psalm 3, pause whenever the word "selah" appears and re-read what came before it. "Selah" is almost functioning as a "heads up!" to what God is speaking to you. Ask God to "lift up your head" as stated in verse three, and to speak to you. He will.

Glimmers Within the Darkness - by Jim Pokorny

I consider myself a student of history. Many chapters of history are dark and some of them do make people feel uncomfortable. Among these is

the Holocaust.

Recently, someone posted something on social media about the Holocaust. In practically no time, the site's organizers removed the post citing "discomfort" as the reason for its removal. Frankly, I was astonished. In my opinion, the Holocaust is something that should make everyone feel uncomfortable. We must never forget the Nazi regime's attempt to commit systematic genocide of Jews along with others like Slavs, political dissenters and prisoners of war.

Genesis 12:3 (KJV) - And I will bless them that bless thee, and curse him that curseth thee: and in thee shall all families of the earth be blessed.

When it came into power, the Nazi regime proudly proclaimed its Third Reich would last for a thousand years. It never came close. In fact, the dumpster of history is full of rulers and regimes that failed to remember

this promise God made to Abraham.

Yet even within the darkest chapters of history are glimmers of light, instances of humanity and flickers of hope. One example was Corrie ten Boom and her family. Despite great personal risk, they lived out their Christian faith by turning their home into a hiding place, typically sheltering 5 or 6 people at a time from the Nazis. It is believed that the ten Boom family and their friends saved the lives of 800 Jews and other refugees. Corrie recalled her father Casper stating, "I would consider it an honor to give my life for God's Chosen People." He died 10 days after being arrested for his efforts.

The ten Boom family was by no means the only family willing to jeopardize personal safety during this period of history. Sadly, we will never know the names of all those who lived out their Christian faith as an oppressive darkness swept over a continent.

I was reminded of a book I read decades ago by Victor E. Frankl entitled *Man's Search for Meaning*. Frankl was an Austrian born psychologist



who survived the Holocaust. The fact that Frankl survived is amazing as he spent time in Theresienstadt, Auschwitz, Kaufering, and Türkheim.

What I recall most about Frankl's book, aside from his views on psychology, were his memories about his days in these camps and the treatment he and others received.

Frankl stated that both human kindness as well as inhuman cruelty could be found in all groups. He recalled a guard who beat prisoners at every opportunity. He went on to state that "the camp commander, to my knowledge, never once lifted his hand against any of us." In a footnote which speaks volumes, he recalled the actions of several Jewish prisoners on behalf of this commander as their liberation by American troops drew near.

Frankl told of three young Hungarian Jews who hid this commander in the Bavarian woods. American forces were very eager to capture this commander. These young men told their liberators they would reveal his location only under one condition: The American commander first had to promise that no harm would befall the

camp commander. Eventually, the American commander agreed to this demand and the camp commander's location was revealed. Not only was he unharmed, he was, in a sense, allowed to resume command of the camp. This man then supervised the collection of clothing from neighboring Bavarian villages and the distribution to those interred. Despite the cruelty inflicted by guards, these prisoners were still able to recognize his kindness and repay it.

Yes, there are chapters in history that are dark. They may even make us feel uncomfortable. Perhaps uncomfortable enough so that we refuse to allow them to ever happen again.

I think Rod Serling put it best in his closing narration to the 1961 Twilight Zone episode Death's Head Revisited: "All the Dachaus must remain standing. The Dachaus, the Belsens, the Buckenwalds, the Auschwitzes all of them. They must remain standing because they are a monument to a moment in time when some men decided to turn the Earth into a graveyard. Into it they shoveled all of their reason, their logic, their knowledge, but worst of all, their conscience. And the moment we forget this, the moment we cease to be haunted by its remembrance, then we become the gravediggers. Something to dwell on and to remember, not only in The Twilight Zone, but wherever men walk God's Earth."
