It is upon us to seek this revival of the Holy Spirit within ourselves, and then it will trickle down and outward like a ripple effect to transform the entire world so that it may be "on earth as it is in Heaven." In the time of the prophet Isaiah – the most-quoted prophet by Jesus Christ –

the Jewish people were in desperate need of revival, just as our world is today. Back then, Jesus had not come yet but God the Father had revealed Himself to them in countless ways for hundreds of years: In a burning bush, by parting the Red Sea, through many prophets...

Read this vision – given by God to the prophet Isaiah – aloud, and ask the Holy Spirit for the phrase that God intends for you to meditate upon and allow the Holy Spirit to transform you once again or even for the first time into a disciple of Jesus who loves the Lord your God with all of your soul, with all of your heart, with all of your strength, and with all of your mind.

The whole head is sick, and the whole heart faint. 6 From the sole of the foot even to the head, there is no soundness in it, but bruises and sores and bleeding wounds; they have not been drained, or bound up, or softened with oil. 7 Your country lies desolate, your cities are burned with fire; in vour very presence aliens devour your land; it is desolate, as overthrown by foreigners. 8 And daughter Zion is left like a booth in a vinevard, like a shelter in a cucumber field, like a besieged city. (Isaiah 1:1-8, NRSV)




Kayla worked at the Golden Chick restaurant in Taylor for a time. Many

evenings I would stop there for a sandwich after returning from a difficult day in Austin. There I would see Kayla working the drive-thru window. Every time she saw me, her face lit up. She would smile and lyrically exclaim, "Hi, Mr. Pokorny!" and the cares of my day would instantly vanish. I am certain many other people shared similar experiences.

It appears that it falls to the rest of us to keep both Kayla and Denise's memory alive.

The second young person was an intern we employed over the summer. His name was William Zachary Elders. Originally from Portland, Oregon, Zach grew up in Mineral Wells, Texas. He was a Petroleum Engineering senior at Texas A&M University. Although I bleed burnt orange, I found Zach to be a very pleasant and unassuming young man.

I recall helping Zach out a time or two when he was assigned tasks by our engineering staff. I realized that he was with us to gain work experience to go along with his education. It seemed only fair that I share with

him my almost three decades of experience.

When the time came for Zach to leave us, he made it a point to thank me for my assistance. I told him that it was my pleasure as I remembered what it felt like when I was new to the job. I wished him well and told him I had every confidence that his future would be a bright one.

A month later, we received word that Zach was killed in a multivehicle accident near campus.

Shortly afterward, my friend Mark Olsen shared with me a *Silver Taps* article about Zach that referred to him as a dedicated Aggie and passionate learner. From that article I discovered several things about Zach that I never knew about.

First was his struggle with dyslexia. As a freshman, Zach struggled with his grades in several engineering courses. Zach's mother was quoted: "He lived the 'Aggies never quit' mantra. He wanted to be there. He did not give up. He wanted to be an engineer, so he went to every A-Plus Tutoring offered for every class, no matter the time of night." He also wanted to join the Aggie Council of Engineers but was not initially accepted. The following year, Zach attended every function, setting up, tearing down, and doing everything possible to show them he had what it took. On his next application, Zach was accepted hands down.

At the beginning of the semester, Zach and his roommate became accountability partners. Zach's mother stated they were working to become better people and help those around them make better choices. They were striving to make the transition from college students "to productive, loving and faithful adults."

Upon reflection, I could see that both Kayla and Zach had that in common. Both had learned to bring to surface the best in themselves and bring about the best in others through their faith.

It seems a shame that this vast amount of potential will go unrealized in this world. It does not matter what church we call home, or what team we root for on Saturday. It falls to us to carry on what they had begun.



National Night Out is an annual community-building campaign that promotes police-community partnerships and neighborhood camaraderie to make our neighborhoods safer, more caring places to live. National Night Out enhances the relationship between neighbors and law enforcement while bringing back a true sense of community. Furthermore, it provides a great opportunity to bring police and neighbors together under positive circumstances.

Millions of neighbors take part in National Night Out across thousands of communities from all fifty states, U.S. territories, and military bases worldwide on the first Tuesday in August (Texas and select areas celebrate on the first Tuesday in October). Neighborhoods host block parties, festivals, parades, cookouts, and various other community events with safety demonstrations, seminars, youth events, visits from emergency personnel, exhibits and much, much more.

On Tuesday, October 1st, neighborhoods throughout the San Angelo area were invited to join forces with thousands of communities across the nation for the "36th Annual National Night Out" crime and drug prevention event. National Night Out, which is sponsored by the National Association of Town Watch (NATW) and co-sponsored locally by the San Angelo Police Department, will involve over 16,500 communities from all 50 states, U.S. Territories, Canadian cities, and military bases around the world. 
The event, which is usually attended by between 300 and 600 people each year, has the atmosphere of a large community party with friends and neighbors being able to visit and eat a hamburger or a hot dog meal. The event is organized each year by the San Angelo Police Department in conjunction with the Tom Green County Sheriff's Department. The main local sponsors for the yearly event are Ener-Tel Security Services, HEB, Market Street Supermarket, Pepsi

Cola Bottling Company, and DeCoty Coffee Company.

The food for the event is obtained each year through donations from local businesses. The food is then prepared by the men's group of the Wall Brethren Church and desserts are provided by the members of the church. Throughout the evening, door prizes that have been donated by area businesses are given away to those in attendance.

Visiting the Raifords

Dear friends,

We are back from a week in Mixe land. I was helping our teammates Phil and Eunice jump into the *Growing Participator Approach* to learn Mixe. Robert was fixing a door in Eunice's medical clinic and a fence that the neighbor's dump truck knocked over.

The feel of Juquila de los Mixes was different from the Mixtec towns I know. People spoke louder and more freely. There were more two-story concrete buildings (though few of them are painted). Painted on the high school's roof was the phrase, "Never conquered" (meaning that the Spanish conquistadors never subdued this



people. The Mixes are less aware of other ways the conquistadors' culture now dominates: Many Mixe children speak only Spanish). And the language sounds nothing like Mixtec. Mixtec is nasal and the words are short. Mixe words are longer and tend to end in bunches of hard consonants (tsk or pch or kpt etc).

I thought that after learning two Mixtec variants, I'd get Mixe right

away. Hah! Not so. I experienced what Greg Thompson calls "the wall of noise." Although I did fine for the first few sessions, eventually all the words ran together so that I couldn't distinguish them. I got to experience what happens when you try to do language learning with no review (I wanted P&E to take all the time with the ANKI review program on the computer.) After the first few sessions, I took a back seat as a facilitator, and I let them prepare and run the sessions.

They have the perfect language companion, Lola. Humble: Willing to enter in the games we had prepared. Fun: Had us running upstairs to learn "up" and "down". Quick to catch on: When they didn't point to the right object at her command, she waited a bit and then came back to it for review. Her willingness to share her language and the Raiford's commitment to enter in "growing participation" in her culture paid off during this first kickoff week. They now recognize over 200 Mixe words (I'm at a few dozen) and are set to continue on their own. Lola now speaks to Phil and Eunice's kids in Mixe. The week was a huge success and an answer to prayer.

Now I am prepping to take this "mobile language learning workshop" on the road to each of the Sin Fronteras teams. That means four areas and five languages plus more Mixtee variants. Prayer:

• That our mobile language learning workshops will give a good boost to all our missionary colleagues in their local areas.

• That we will grow in our participation in the cultures *and* languages of the minority peoples we serve and that this incarnational work will bear much fruit.

• That we will have safety and stamina for the amount of travel that the mobile workshops require.

• That the church planting mentoring that we do will bear fruit.

Dissolving Candy Cane Experiment

Materials: Small candy canes, water, cups, stopwatch, kitchen scale

HOW TO:

Fill your cups with the same amount of different liquids or different temperature water. Make sure to label what you have in each cup. Add one candy cane or peppermint to each cup. Make sure you add the same type of candy cane to each cup. Set the timer to record how long each peppermint or candy cane takes to dissolve.

Bending Candy Canes

Materials: Candy canes, aluminum foil, cookie sheet, tongs

HOW TO:

Preheat your oven to 350 degrees and line a cookie sheet with aluminum foil. Unwrap the candy canes. Have children try to bend one... even just in half to make a hill shape. Place 1-2 unwrapped candy canes on a cookie sheet. After the first batch, try building "forms" for the candy to melt around and predict how the candy will behave as it melts. Put the candy canes in the oven. Check them after 2-1/2 to 3 minutes. Pull the candy canes out of the oven. Let them cool for about a minute. Take it off the aluminum foil and set it on a paper plate. Once it is cool enough for your children to touch, let them try to bend it again. If the candy cools too much, it will be very difficult to separate from the aluminum foil and will crack again when they try to bend it.

Candy Cane Ornaments

Materials: Borax, Water, Mason jars, Pan, Spoon, Measuring Cup and Tablespoon, Pipe Cleaners {Red, White}, Ribbon

HOW TO:

To fill 3 small mason jars, use 6 cups of water and 18 tablespoons of borax. This fills three small mason jars perfectly. Cut pipe cleaners in half and make small candy canes! Twist white and red pipe cleaners together to make candy canes. You will use the popsicle sticks to hang the pipe cleaner candy canes from. You don't want the candy cane to touch the sides or bottom. It will stick and grow crystals!

THE SCIENCE:

The borax has been suspended throughout the solution and remains that way while the liquid is hot. A hot liquid will hold more borax than a cold liquid! As the solution cools, the particles settle out of the saturated mixture and the settling particles from the crystals that you see. The impurities remain behind in the water and cubelike crystals will form if the process of cooling is slow enough. Using a plastic cup versus the glass jar caused a difference in the formation of the crystals. As a result, the glass jar crystals are more heavy-duty, larger, and cube-shaped. While the plastic cup crystals are smaller and more irregularly shaped. Much more fragile, too. The plastic cup cooled off more quickly and they contained more impurities than those in the glass jar.


