Diversity is Rooted in Faith

The older I get, the less I understand corporate America.

For instance, the president of our local office recently received a PowerPoint presentation to share with the office that included several embedded videos. He asked me to sit with him through his initial viewing to ensure there would be no technical problems during the actual presentation to the staff.

This presentation was about the importance of diversity in the work-place. One video segment offered that clients and potential clients want to see themselves reflected on the other side of the table. Ours is by no means the only corporation to jump on the diversity bandwagon. Many are using social media and websites to proclaim that their business is blazing a trail in promoting diversity.

We encountered no technical issues in this initial viewing. Before summoning the entire staff into the room, my president turned to me and asked in a humorous way, "What's going to happen to old men like us?"

Matching his humor, I replied, "Well, speaking as a Moravian-American..."

I said at the outset that I understand corporate America less. I say that because promoting one's faith in the workplace is still frowned upon. Yet it is that same faith that has reminded me of the importance of diversity all along. Its roots extend back into the Old Testament.

Malachi 2:10 (NET) – Do we not all have one father? Did not one God create us? Why do we betray one another, thus making light of the covenant of our ancestors?

It continues into the words of the New Testament and can be found in the letters written by Paul.

Colossians 3:11 (NET) – Here there is neither Greek nor Jew, circumcised or uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, slave or free, but Christ is all and in all.

Romans 12:4-8 (NET) – For just as in one body we have many members, and not all the members serve the same function, so we who are many

are one body in Christ, and individually we are members who belong to one another. And we have different gifts according to the grace given to us. If the gift is prophecy, that individual must use it in proportion to his faith. If it is service, he must serve; if it is teaching, he must teach; if it is exhortation, he must exhort; if it is contributing, he must do so with sincerity; if it is leadership, he must do so with diligence; if it is showing mercy, he must do so with cheerfulness.

Even the Book of Revelation speaks to this. Revelation 7:9-10 (NET) -After these things I looked, and here was an enormous crowd that no one could count, made up of persons from every nation, tribe, people, and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb dressed in long white robes, and with palm branches in their hands. They were shouting out in a loud voice, "Salvation belongs to our God, who is seated on the throne, and to the Lamb!"

Then, there were the words and actions of Jesus. Words as found in the Great Commission.

Mark 16:15 (NET) - He said to them, "Go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

Luke 14:11-14 (NET) – *For every*one who exalts himself will be humbled, but the one who humbles himself will be exalted." He said also to the man who had invited him. "When you host a dinner or a banquet, don't invite your friends or your brothers or your relatives or rich neighbors so vou can be invited by them in return and get repaid. But when you host an elaborate meal, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. Then you will be blessed, because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

This is the same Jesus who dined with sinners and tax collectors; the same Jesus who healed those that were outcast by society; the same Jesus who told us to love our neighbor.

I could go on, but the point is that it is my Christian faith that made diversity important long before corporate America made it a selling point. It will remain so, long after it has moved on to the next bandwagon or "buzz" word.

It is faith that turns an employee into an asset. Unfortunately, this is a concept that corporate America still finds a bit too radical.

Henry Beseda, Jr. After each name was called, a bell was rung by Barnell Marek (Industry) and a candle was lit by family members and friends. Kayla Marek (Taylor), Lynette Urbanovsky and Joe Coufal, Jr., (Industry) assisted with the lighting of the candles. After the names were called, Phil Stein, A.L. Post 602 member, rendered Taps on his trumpet.

The 40 living veterans that were in

attendance were then recognized, including WWII veterans Laddie Ripple and Otto Kunze. Ripple, age 97, was the oldest veteran in attendance. All veterans recognized received a lapel pin, small memento flag, and handshake from Col. Karr.

The inspiring service closed with the singing of "My Country, Tis of Thee." Musicians were Liz Ripple and Sharon Spiess on the keyboard, and Alicia and Tim Kulhanek, playing sax and trumpet. Afterward everyone enjoyed food and fellowship. It was estimated that there were 150 people that attended this event.



A Day in Rosa's Life

Dear friends,

I was just in Guerrero, making the long, 1000-kilometer (20 hours of driving, over 5 days) swing through the areas we used to live in. I visit friends of all sorts – carpenters, humble believers, pastors (both indigenous and latin), missionaries (that translate, or church plant, sometimes both), and business people. I stay in their homes and eat their food and listen to their stories. We talk about everything, sometimes into the wee hours of the night, even after starting conversations before the breaking of the dawn. They tell me about their children's struggles, their own battles with illness and loss, the vagaries of local and federal politics, and their joys and hopes. We talk about God, His Kingdom, our doubts, the varieties of Religious Experiences (although the title of a famous book by William James, here meant to get at the range of ways we all have to follow God). My role is not to solve anything, nor

provide absolute answers; just listen, commiserate, encourage, sometimes suggest.

Rosa, wife of Lamberto, from Ometepec, friends from when we used to live there almost 20 years ago, tells me this story:

She is waiting for the local tiny buses, in the center of town, to take her to her outlying neighborhood. The bus is late, nothing unusual. She watches an indigenous woman with a small child in her arms, clearly agitated. The child has vomited and is now limp, unresponsive. The woman comes from up in the mountains,

obviously so because of her dress and that she can't speak much Spanish, only using the disparaged indigenous language, Mixtec. Rosa happens to know a little of it, since this is her husband's heart language. The woman is trying her best to ask for help at the counter of the pharmacy on the other side of the street from Rosa, but the owner is shooing her away. This lady is the sister of a previous state governor, wealthy, and doesn't want to be bothered by this dirty Indian from the hills. She commands the clerk to drive the woman out of the store, not making even the barest attempt to show sympathy, if not for the mother, then at least for the sick child.

Rosa crosses over to help, but even her attempts, in Spanish, go unheeded. The owner is now hardened to any appeal. So, Rosa flags down a taxi, much more expensive than the local buses, but available. She bundles the mother and child in, and together they make their way across town to the hospital. Rosa charges in with the pair, straight to the reception desk, and gets through the red tape sufficiently enough that a doctor comes out and examines the child. Rosa doesn't really know what was eventually diagnosed, except something like dehydration from parasites, but anyway, the child is interned overnight. The mother holds vigil beside the bed, on the floor. Rosa returns the next day to see how things are going, and helps them check out, since the child has recuperated enough to leave. Rosa does all the paperwork for the lady, since of course, she also doesn't read. Rosa explains to the lady what medicines

she will need, but realizes that this, too, will be a big challenge, so they march over to the pharmacy and Rosa gets the required medicines. She pays for those, as well as for the small fee that the hospital charged. After she is sure that the woman understands which medicines and when (Rosa has drawn some little pictures and figures on the hospital papers that indicate the right doses and times), she gives her enough money to take a taxi back to the truck that will take them to the mountain village.

I hear this story, with Rosa sitting on the rough stairs to the roof, over breakfast in the concrete breezeway, surrounded by heaps of corn and old brooms and plastic Coke bottles making for a real Still Life. She also tells me about the two villages where she is visiting, infrequently but when possible, and the dozens of children and mothers who flock to her to hear the stories of Jesus, and God's goodness.

These are the friends (each with such wonderful stories) that I am privileged to know, to journey with, as we all together work toward God's Kingdom coming to earth as it is in Heaven.

Thank you for your part in all this, and may you be as blessed as we are.

At least for now, He seems to be gently indicating that the DMs continue, not for some human reason (such as a denominational tradition or family legacy), but as His tool to accomplish His purposes and ongoing work, along with the writings of other godly *Brethren Journal* contributors. *Brethren Journal* Editor, Cathleen Schlechte, has suggested that "even with the abundance of

Bible studies available, sometimes less is more... The Morsels are just enough to start the conversation with God, and He takes it from there." Amen. May it be so.

Now I am asking you. Honestly, what purpose does the Daily Morsels serve in your life? Your walk with Christ? Your family? Your church? Your community? What fruit have you seen? How long have you used the Daily Morsels? What are your spiritual goals? In which spiritual discipline do you hope to grow the most this year? What are your demographics (congregation/location, age range)? Would you prefer to use the DMs on paper (current format), on a screen (electronic copy), or both?

Your answers to these questions will help me interpret the Spirit's leading in selecting and submitting future Daily Morsels. Perhaps they will also help with editorial decisions regard-

What Purpose Does the Daily Morsels Serve in Your Life?

New year's blessings, dear Daily Morsels reader!

As another decade begins, here is a bit of DM history, an outline for the year ahead, and a request for your prayerful input and support.

The purpose of the Daily Morsels is to glorify God by edifying His people within the Unity of the Brethren as they daily read, meditate upon, and grow spiritually from His Word, the Bible, one verse at a time, as we draw closer to our Lord Jesus Christ, the living Bread. We ask the Lord to "give us this day our daily bread." Matthew 6:11

While the purpose of the DMs has remained the same, over time its writing process has changed. For decades Brethren writers, including my distant relative Reverend Josef Hegar, grandparents John and Emily Hegar, and mother Dorothy E. (Hegar) Kocian, prayerfully studied Scripture and selected each week's Daily Morsels based primarily upon the coming

Sunday's International Sunday School Lesson (ISSL), so as to prepare readers for in-church Bible study. Over time, however, apparently fewer and fewer Brethren churches used the ISSL. The writers came to select DM verses based on such broader themes as Lent, Thanksgiving, Advent, and the fruit of the Spirit, using such Christian reference tools as hymnbooks and previous Moravian Daily Texts.

The 2020 DM theme is **spiritual disciplines for growth in our life with God**. This first issue (January-February) emphasizes the nature of God, the foundation of our relationship with Him, and the discipline of confession. Future months will include fasting, sacrifice, silence, celebration, prayer, guidance, service, simplicity, study, meditation, and worship, D.v.

As the current primary DM writer (along with my mother), I selected this theme after prayerfully soliciting wise counsel, especially from my husband, Dr. Bruce Gordon, and research-



Read: 1 Samuel 16: 1-13


David's adventure begins with the color purple. It's a strange place to start, because when we first meet David, he's just a boy tending sheep for his father. Shepherds didn't wear the color purple, but kings did, and God had a very big plan in mind for young David.

The people of Israel had asked God for a king, and God had chosen a man who turned out to be a disappointment. Israel was God's country. God sent his prophet Samuel to the house of Jesse to anoint the next king. Jesse and Samuel both assumed this new king would be one of the older sons. 
