Justice for All

A story my mother often shared with me was a memory from her childhood. One day, her family made a trip from the farm into town for necessities. Once there, my grandmother began chatting with a group of ladies. Mom was quite young and still clung to my grandmother's skirt for security. As the ladies spoke, one of them picked up on Grandma's accent. Curious, the lady asked, "What are v'all?"

"We're Czech," my grandmother innocently replied.

One of the other ladies erupted, "Y'all aren't Czechs! Y'all are Moravians, and don't you forget it!"

This took place in the 1920s and had a lasting impact on Mom. Her account taught me a valuable lesson at a young age. Prejudice is often born out of the need for one individual or group to feel superior to another, yet this feeling of superiority is an illusion.

Philippians 2:3-4 (NET) – Instead of being motivated by selfish ambition or vanity, each of you should, in humility, be moved to treat one another as more important than yourself. Each of you should be concerned not only about your own interests, but about the interests of others, as well.

By my own childhood in the 1960s, the situation had not significantly improved. If anything, it had degraded. I cannot begin to count the number of racial slurs uttered by adults in their daily conversations. Fortunately, God watched over me at this impressionable age and allowed me to see just how foolish this behavior was.

I started school not long after the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which integrated public schools. As children, we easily made friends without taking skin color into consideration. I still heard the racial slurs and thought (mistakenly) how we would leave all this behind us when we grew up.

By my high school years, cases of racism still cropped up. I recalled two students getting expelled for using racial slurs. In hindsight, I realized they were just the ones that happened to get caught.

Like many, I was appalled by the senseless death of George Floyd while

being taken into custody by Minneapolis police in May 2020. Video of the tragedy captured on a cell phone was quickly picked up by news networks and broadcast via television and the Internet. Protests were quickly organized around the nation. Although many desired to protest this injustice peacefully, many protests quickly escalated into destruction of property and clashes with police. This added fuel to an already volatile mixture. As if without thought, the mantra "De-fund the Police" was quickly taken up. In some areas it was just as quickly replaced by "Disband the Police". Civic leaders around the nation began adopting similar mindsets as well. In fact, over \$11 million formerly allocated to the police was cut in the proposed City of Austin budget. Although this proposed cut was massive, outspoken critics cried out that it was insufficient.

Good police officers now undeservedly find themselves in a virtual no-win situation. They are under intensified scrutiny and many are choosing early retirement. In one large city, fires continued to be set by rioters and police vehicles were vandalized. In another, clashes with police continued and officers were injured in the line of duty. In addition to the demonstrations, the number of

violent crimes requiring police response is on the rise in many metropolitan areas. In one weekend, 59 people were shot in Chicago. On one Sunday in New York City there were 15 separate shooting incidents. Two teenagers were among the eight killed in that spree. That same city recorded 745 shootings through July 26, 2020.

Let's be honest. What happened to George Floyd should never have happened. Every profession has bad elements and those individuals must be held accountable for their actions or their inaction. Video evidence brought Floyd's injustice to light, but this is but one of countless injustices that have occurred over many years. Injustices of which we know little or nothing.

I have heard it said that it is hoped that God will use the COVID-19 pandemic to reboot the church. Perhaps He will use the church to both seek and promote justice for all once again.

But if not the church, who? And if not now, when?

Acts 10:34-35 (NET) – Then Peter started speaking: "I now truly understand that God does not show favoritism in dealing with people, but in every nation the person who fears him and does what is right is welcomed before him.

Redeemed

On this my 67th birthday, I've posted my favorite hymn as sung by the David Crowder Band. I was adopted and have lived with the name of Zabcik, which is of Czech origin; however, I'm actually 67% Scot/Irish/ Welsh according to a DNA test. The tune that the Crowder Band uses really struck a chord with me.

After all these years, just a few short weeks ago I decided to finally try and determine why I have lived a life of fear and of anxiety attacks. I had become so sick and tired of my struggles. I am receiving professional assistance in unlocking, or perhaps better said, in understanding a nightmare that occurred over and over and over again as a child. I remember being sexually abused once when I was about twelve years old on the kitchen floor of the home that I grew up in. And now I am learning that our minds can protect us from bad memories by repressing those memories. My nightmares were actually recurring times of sexual abuse.

Growing up, I always believed that I was extremely shy, especially around

girls. My shyness was almost crippling in its intensity. I now have only recently discovered that I was actually ashamed of who I was. The Holy Spirit brought the word shame and then ashamed to me so powerfully on Wednesday, May 13th. Growing up in the 50s and 60s as an adopted child was not easy, at least not for me. I so often heard the comment, especially at family reunions, which were big in those days, as follows: I would be walking by a group of ladies and would hear one of them say, "There's that Zabcik boy. He's not really theirs, you know." So, then I began to wonder. whose I was?

Early in my life, I battled an addiction to alcohol. In my adult years, I battled an addiction to the nicotine in tobacco by using smokeless tobacco. Those addictions were most difficult to overcome; however, if you have never battled the guilt associated with shame, I personally cannot describe it to you adequately with just mere words. The shame of being adopted compounded by the shame of sexual abuse.

DO: RAOK (Random Acts of Kindness) Cards Materials: Index Cards, Stickers, Markers


Option 1: Create RAOK cards before class and pass out to students.

June 27, 2020

Raiford Family Update

Hello everyone,

First, I hope that you are all safe and healthy. We are doing well and have been in the village since March. It has certainly been an uncertain time in the world, and here in Mexico we have felt the effects of the corona virus. Thankfully, we have not seen any cases here in our village, but the town has been on edge for these past few months. We have basically been in quarantine here in the village, but is not so bad, we at least have the ability to go out and enjoy nature and we have plenty of food. In the beginning of the pandemic Eunice and I were very concerned about an outbreak in our village and ordered lots of medicine preparing for the worst. God has been good and spared us so

far, but we are ready if the time comes to act.

While the world has been in crisis we have seen God do so many good things here in Juquila. The time in isolation has brought many people to our door looking for guidance and help. We are now working with three new families and our relationship with the others has grown even deeper. As I imagine for you in the US, the people here watching the news began to feel immense stress. Many came to us for a new perspective on life and we would share with them about God's love, and to take advantage of this time with the people you care about. We also organized exercise routines for people who needed to be in better shape to potentially fight the corona virus. As time has passed, the air of uncertainty still lingers as if we are holding our breath that bad things will eventually come here. We have faith in God that He will protect us as we serve our community, and our friends are finding comfort in Him as well.

The verse that continues to come to mind is from Haggai 2:5-9:

"...My Spirit remains in your midst. Fear not. For thus says the Lord of hosts: 'Yet once more, in a little while, I will shake the heavens and the earth and the sea and the dry



land. And I will shake all nations... and I will fill this house with glory... The latter glory of this house shall be greater than the former,' says the Lord of hosts. 'And in this place, I will give peace,' declares the Lord of hosts."

over camp, so I know a lot of youth are really looking forward to being able to be in a youth camp since most have been cancelled.

On a personal note, we wanted to update you on our upcoming move. We found a beautiful house in a city on the Golan Heights, Katzrin, for an amazing price. The other family who is moving (today) to the Golan Heights to work with us will be about 15 minutes away in a different village. We decided we wanted to stay central in the Golan – Katzrin is right in the middle, making it easy to travel to wherever any future ministry center would be. Also, one of our hopes is to buy a house in the next few years, so one of our goals was to rent cheaper and start saving and get rid of our debt. We are praying we can achieve those goals in the next 2 years. We move on July 15th, so in exactly 10 days. Please pray for a smooth transition, especially Boaz, who will be in a new kindergarten and will have to make new friends. Also, Katzrin is about half religious, so pray that we will have grace with locals there and

be able to openly share our faith with those we meet.

We will be establishing new community life with other believing families there, as there are no congregations that we know of in that area. There are 3 other families moving to that area within 20 minutes of us in the next month, which really tells us the Lord is directing young families in that direction for a reason. This is a really important aspect in order to be up there – to not be isolated and to have faith-based community life to strengthen and encourage one an-





other and to minister to the lord together, building an altar of worship and prayer and hosting His presence in an area where there are very few believers at all.

Also, we have an important ministry update! We shared previously that our non-profit was being blocked by the tax authority, so we were limited in our scope of work and we couldn't hire workers. After 2 years of being blocked and not receiving answers, we finally got the breakthrough we were waiting for and got the necessary approvals. This is a huge breakthrough! We will be allowed now to operate freely and move forward. Thank you for praying with us for breakthrough!

Thank you for your prayer and support during this time. We deeply appreciate and love you, and pray the Lord bless you and your families and may His presence and peace surround you during this time.

Big Boats Move Slow

Dear friends,

Our view for the last six days, and for the next eight, is the last lift bridge on the Welland Canal in southern Ontario. We get to watch massive lakers, the cargo ships that transverse the five Great Lakes, move along in either their last or first part of the journey to get past Niagara Falls.

They rise or descend more than 300 feet over 27 miles along this waterway, almost 200 years old now. As they slip past the second-story window here, their incredible size makes it hard to believe they're moving at three miles an hour.

We're in quarantine in an apartment in Port Colborne, a sleepy little city on Lake Erie. Can't leave for anything or have visitors. A couple friends stocked the place for us and have come by a time or two to add the small forgotten things, like coffee filters (paper napkins did fine in the interim). One of them had arranged the place through another mission organization based here.

We're catching up on sleep, reading, and watching TV series. We run up and down the 21 steps 30 or more times, and some other exercises.

We're also talking with our agency (Multiply) about what comes next. Our leaders are trying to figure out what it means to have one in five of the hundred missionaries now "sheltering in place" in North America instead of their adopted countries.

Everyone's lives have been affected deeply by this pandemic, and we know we have privileges and blessings that make this easier for us than many others in the world. Our Sin Fronteras missionary friends have a



very thin safety net, both in terms of their support and health infrastructure. Two of the newest ones weathered COVID-19 and are back on track to being the first SF missionaries to go out of the country, to Nepal (once all this settles down).

Our travel visas running out forced us to leave Mexico, but regardless, we were more and more restricted from movement around Oaxaca and interaction with people. A lot of what we do involves meeting with people in places outside our town, and since the training school finished in early July there was little ministry opportunity immediately in our area.

Who knows when things will get better (everyone's question!)? This is what we are processing with our agency and other leaders, so please pray with us that we will find effective ways to continue in Kingdom work no matter where we are. One significant arena is in training new and existing missionaries. Multiply is developing courses for people in the field, and this time of restrictions may be ideal for continuing education for all of us, both receiving and developing. And we're beginning to draft an outline for a collaborative book that explores missiology in the midst of post-modern ambiguity (how to do missions when there are so many different, and often conflicting, ideas about who God is, who we are, and what He wants us to do).

Those massive ships hardly look like they're moving, until you can give them a land-based reference. Hopefully, the world-scale problems that look insurmountable will begin to resolve themselves as we all humbly work together. And our very small problems will work out, too.

Thank you for your ongoing support throughout this uncertain time. You all make this possible.
