Eyes

Matthew 6:22 "The eye is the lamp of the body. If your eyes are healthy, your whole body will be full of light."

In Matthew 6:22 Jesus is describing our eyes as a lamp that lights up our entire body. Our eyes become the receptor to help us see and make sense of the (our) world. They provide an entrance to our hearts and minds, our eyes become the doorway. the key to our souls. Our eyes allow us to perceive the difference between light and darkness, between godliness and ungodliness. Our eyes provide illumination to experience compassion. The German theologian Hellmut Thielicke, imprisoned by the Nazis, (1908-1986) said that all compassion begins in the eyes. They communicate something of who we are and what we are thinking and feeling. Our eyes illuminate our surroundings and give off light, the light of happiness and the light of our sorrow, sadness, compassion.

Matthew 6:34... and he had compassion on them...

Luke 7:13: When the Lord saw her,

He had compassion on her and said to her, "Do not weep."

In Matthew 9:36 Jesus had compassion on the crowds: "But when He saw the multitudes, He was moved with compassion for them, because they were weary and scattered, like sheep having no shepherd."

The sightless blind were freed from their prison of blindness, their eyes were opened in Matthew 20:34: "So Jesus had compassion and touched their eyes. And immediately their eyes received sight, and they followed Him."

Charles Haddon Spurgeon (1834-1892) known as the "Prince of Preachers", described Samuel Rutherford's letters to be the "nearest thing to inspiration which can be found in all the writings of mere men."

Samuel Rutherford (1600-1661) is best known for his "Letters" written from prison in Edinburg, Scotland. He was imprisoned for becoming a Presbyterian minister. This made him guilty of heresy and treason. Writing to his

parishioners, he said, 'I see grace groweth best in winter."

In this COVID-19 era, we are reminded that the history of Christianity is the story of grace that grows best in winter.

One example of "grace growing in winter" is taken from the writings of Charles Dickens. In his book "A Tale of Two Cities" we read the story of Sydney Carton, who changed clothes with Evremonde in the prison, said just before his head was chopped off in the guillotine: "It is a far, far better thing that I do, than I have ever done; it's a far, far better rest that I go to, than I have ever known."

Dickens' story reminds us of Alban, a Roman-Briton Christian who was caught up in one of Dioceltian's murderous rampages against the Christians around the year 209. Alban schemed to change clothes with a priest marked for death, so the priest could continue spreading the name of Jesus through the countryside and escape Dioceltian's soldiers. St. Bede. in his "Ecclesiastial History", records that King Offa built St. Albans Cathedral in Bath, England, in his memory, 693 A.D.

The apostle Paul reminds us of the great power of God: "I can do all things through Christ which strengthens me" (Philippians 4:13).

During the pandemic we must not let this power leave us. D. H. Lawrence put it this way in 1924, "The adventure has gone out of the Christian venture." So during this "venture," is why our eyes are so very important. The Lutheran pastor Marty Martin recently wrote:

"...given all the social restrictions... even with masks on, we still get to see each other's eyes. And those eyes send out valuable cues about life everything from corner wrinkles indicating a smile to tears of sadness to expressions of true compassion."

There are 478 passages in the Bible that speak of the importance of eyes.

Psalm 119:18 informs us: ... Open my eyes that I may see...

In closing, this pandemic is an "adventure" that none of us would have chosen. Remember to open your eyes so that you may prayerfully and mindfully see God's beauty around you; the voice of a western meadowlark, a new flower, a rose bud opening, a beautiful sunrise or sunset, a stranger's smile in their eyes behind their mask.

Heroes Honored

Ecclesiastes 3:8 (NET) – A time to love, and a time to hate; a time for war, and a time for peace.

On July 30, 2020, Mom's late brother Willie Mikeska and his fellow shipmates of the *USS Indianapolis*, living and dead, were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal. A special ceremony was held on the 75th anniversary of the ship's sinking. House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and other dignitaries presented the Congressional Gold Medal, its highest honor, to the eight surviving crewmembers. Although only one was physically able to attend in person, all eight received a replica of the medal.

The Congressional Gold Medal has a long and illustrious history. The first was awarded by the Continental Congress in 1776 to General George Washington for his "wise and spirited conduct" in bringing about the British evacuation of Boston. The Continental Congress awarded seven such medals in its history, the last in 1787 to John Paul Jones for "valor and brilliant services" in capturing the *Serapis*.

Other recipients of this honor from World War II include General Douglas MacArthur, Winston Churchill, the "Doolittle Tokyo Raiders", the Tuskegee Airmen, and the Navajo Code Talkers to name but a few. Other recipients include such notables as Rosa Parks, John Wayne, and Bob Hope.

The bill for this medal was introduced to the US Senate by Senator Joe Donnelly on November 8, 2017, which passed by unanimous consent. On December 12, 2018, the bill moved on to the US House of Representatives where it passed without objection. It then went to President Donald Trump, who signed it into law on December 20, 2018. This piece of legislation is now Public Law 115-338 and specifies several truths.

The USS Indianapolis received 10 battle stars between 1942 and 1945 having participated in major battles from the Aleutian Islands to Okinawa.

The ship carried 1,195 personnel when it set sail for the island of Tinian on July 16, 1945, to deliver components of the atomic bomb "Little

Boy". The ship set a speed record and successfully delivered its cargo on July 26, 1945. It then set sail for Guam, having received orders to join a task force in Leyte Gulf in the Philippines. For the entire trip, the ship traveled without escort.

On July 30, 1945, minutes after midnight, the ship was struck by 2 torpedoes fired by a Japanese submarine. The explosions severed the bow, sinking the *USS Indianapolis* in only 12 minutes. Of 1,195 personnel, about 900 made it into the water. With few life rafts deployed, most men were stranded in the water with only a kapok life jacket.

On the morning of August 2, 1945, four days after the sinking, Lieutenant Wilbur Gwinn was piloting a PV-1 Ventura bomber and accidentally spotted men in the water. Gwinn alerted a PBY aircraft, commanded by Lieutenant Adrian Marks. Marks made a dangerous open-sea landing and begin rescuing men before any ships arrived. The USS Cecil J. Dovle was the first to arrive and took considerable risk in using a searchlight as a beacon, giving hope to survivors in the water and encouraging them to make it through one more long night. The rescue continued well into August 3. Those who participated in the rescue conducted a thorough search, saved lives, and undertook the difficult tasks of identifying remains and providing burials at sea for the fallen.

Only 316 men survived their ordeal contending with severe burns, exposure to the elements, extreme dehydration, and shark attacks.

In its service during World War II, the heavy cruiser frequently served as flagship for the Fifth Fleet headed by Admiral Raymond Spruance. It survived a bomb released during a kamikaze attack which badly damaged the ship and killed nine crewmembers. It successfully completed its top-secret mission that was critical to ending the war. The sacrifice, perseverance, and bravery of the crew of the *USS Indianapolis* should never be forgotten.

US Navy Secretary Kenneth Braithwaite told the survivors, "Bravo Zulu (well done) shipmates."

The medal, struck in gold by the US Mint, depicts the USS Indianapolis with her 10 battle stars along with the inscriptions "USS INDIANAPOLIS CA-35" and her dates of service "1932-1945". The reverse depicts a group of survivors clinging to a raft having spotted either a plane or the spotlight from the USS Cecil J. Doyle along with the inscriptions "1195 SAILED", "316 SURVIVED" and "ACT OF CONGRESS 2018".

The medal is on permanent display at the Indiana War Memorial Museum in Indianapolis.

Even Jesus knew suffering.

Jesus knew what it meant to cry.

Our Holy Christ knew what it felt like to be abandoned by loved ones.

The Lord Jesus understood the pain of isolation.

The Prince of Peace knew physical anguish.

Nonetheless, Jesus Christ stood His ground, the Holy Path set before Him by His Heavenly Father, without wavering, without sinning in His heart or in His mind.

He carried on His Father's mission and He passed the torch of that mission on to all of us who have come and are still coming to saving faith in Him, our Holy Christ.

We are all acquainted with suffering in its many forms, and yet we are called the "priesthood of believers," "oaks of righteousness for the display of His splendor... to rebuild... the ruins."

How are you suffering at this very moment?

What is causing your bones to quiver and your heart to pound?

The Lord Jesus Christ is speaking to you now.

Just pause.

Listen.

"One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God." (Jesus, in Matthew 4:4, NRSV)

"Do not put the Lord your God to the test." (Jesus, in Matthew 4:7)

Questioning God the Father's character was never in the equation for Jesus. He knew that praying to the Heavenly Father through the pain would fill one with complete joy – that is, confident faith in God the Father's sovereignty. Jesus explained:

So you have pain now; but I will see you again, and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you. On that day you will ask nothing of me. Very truly, I tell you, if you ask anything of the Father in my name, he will give it to you. Until now you have not asked for anything in my name. Ask and you will receive, so that your joy may be complete. (John 16:22-24)




