

In my young adult years I used to spend a couple of weeks each summer in the Northeast Georgia Mountains visiting my mother and father in their simple mountain home. It was a holy place, a holy mountain, you might say. Mom and I fixed our gaze upon Mountains Chimney and Tray at every sunrise and sunset, sitting on the porch in a pair of Amish rocking chairs, with Bibles, journals, highlighters, and pens in hand. At sunrise, in particular, we would take long deep breaths, inviting the Holy Spirit to bless us each with the mind of Jesus and the heart of Jesus. We prayed. I sipped butterscotch toffeeflavored coffee. Mom sipped herbal tea. We would take even longer and deeper breaths as we read our Bibles silently – and at times to one another - feeling the Lord God answering our prayer – to bless us each with the mind of Jesus and with the heart of Jesus. Some days Mom – always leading by example – would pray on her knees on a gardening knee pad leaning against the porch railing that overlooked the mountains that the

Lord had created. In our hearts, however, we knew that where we sat and knelt was the greater of the mountains. That beautiful wood porch with hummingbird feeders and sparse rustic décor, was our "holy mountain." This was where the Holy Spirit renewed us with the resurrection power of Jesus Christ to face life's trials with increasing Christlikeness. This porch was where God performed significant healing of each of our hearts, our minds, and our entire physical bodies. This porch was the "holy mountain" where a mother and daughter shared loving glances, hugs, and tears of joy and release.

What place has God given you that serves as a "holy mountain"?

I've always had a "holy mountain" spot in my home, in the early mornings, at my desk or dining table, with soothing music to uplift my soul towards my Savior and His Holy Word in my hands and my laptop as my journal. These days, since my momma is now face-to-face with her Lord Jesus, my "holy mountain" has ex-

panded geographically. The Lord Almighty draws me into His Holy Mountain wherever I am — whether in a crowded airport, before dawn in my kitchen, sitting on my patio feeling the rustling of the wind. The King of Life graciously meets me and establishes His Holy Mountain where I receive His healing, His wisdom, His love, His joy, His peace, and so much more. He dries up my tears. He glances at me and speaks words of love to me, as my Heavenly Father.

Have you stopped to wait for God to set up His Holy Mountain for you, wherever you may be?

The Holy Mountain of the Lord God is a place that transcends time and space for us in the here and now as His people. It is a holy place where we meet with our Lord. We also look at the Holy Mountain as that future time when Christ returns to rule the earth - when Christ Himself will literally be the Light of the world. In the time of the prophet Isaiah, the Holy Mountain is the expected future return of the Messiah, of Christ. In the latter portions of the prophet Isaiah's Book in the Holy Bible he is writing to encourage God's people who are living in a post-exilic time, after Babylonian captivity around 515 B.C. A major challenge for the Israelites – as for us today – was to refrain from idolatry. They had lived in nations that worshiped other gods during periods of exile, and now they were seeking to stay true to their faith after so much suffering, now finally seemingly free. The Lord God was calling them – as He does us – to worship Him with all of their hearts, all of their minds, and all of their souls.

The Lord God's promise of help and healing on the Holy Mountain, the Holy Bible, the Book of Isaiah, chapter 57, verses 13-19:

When you cry out, let your collection of idols deliver you!

The wind will carry them off, a breath will take them away.

But whoever takes refuge in Me shall possess the land

and inherit My holy mountain. It shall be said,

"Build up, build up, prepare the way,

remove every obstruction from my people's way."

who inhabits eternity, whose name is Holy:

Always Reforming

I always feel blessed when experiences in life come full circle. I recently read *Always Reforming: A History of Christianity Since 1300* (Mercer University Press, 2001). Its author, the Rev. Dr. Craig D. Atwood, was one of two keynote speakers at the symposium entitled *Jan Hus After 600 Years: History and Heritage* that took place on Saturday, November 14, 2015, at Blinn College in Brenham, Texas.

The other keynote speaker was Dr. Thomas Fudge, who is considered an authority on Jan Hus. During his Question-and-Answer session, Dr. Fudge was asked the question: What might Hus have to say to us today? According to Dr. Fudge, Hus would be surprised by the number of denominations today that each claim to follow Christ. During his presentation, Dr. Fudge presented a slide entitled "One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic Church...?" with a diagram depicting some 60 unique denominations to illustrate the point. As part of my research, I consulted Handbook of Denominations in the United States (Abingdon, 1994). It identified more than 200 different denominations within the United States.

In Always Reforming, Atwood attempts to shed some light down the long corridor of church history to give the reader insight into the origins of the various denominations. During the Protestant Reformation, a Latin phrase emerged: "Ecclesia semper reformanda" which translates "The Church is always reforming". Atwood incorporated this concept into the title of his book. Always Reforming is a chronological history told in 5 parts. Atwood begins with the Renaissance era and Reform (1300-1500) leading into the Protestant Reformation. He then delves into the "Religion of the Heart in an Age of Reason" before concluding with the 19th and 20th centuries.

The dictionary defines reform as making changes in an institution seeking to improve it. We may perhaps believe that this definition applies to Christianity as well, but we must first ask ourselves this question: How could we, as mere human beings, hope to improve upon a faith in the

person and teachings of Jesus Christ? The answer, of course, is that we could not, and history bears that out. Taking a long and honest look at Christianity through the centuries, Atwood reminds the reader that it has been subject to both change and division. Granted, some reforms were attempts to correct errors and abuses within the institutional church to better realign it with its original purpose. Other reforms, however, were contentious and led to persecution, warfare, bloodshed, and grief.

Down through the centuries, the institutional church has become more divided and the number of denominations has grown; each reform attempting to meet the challenges of its day. Finding itself in a continually changing political and world view order, the church frequently found itself with two options. On one hand, it could adapt itself to the ever-changing landscape in which it found itself. On the other hand, it could simply remain static and become a relic of a bygone age. Even in the modern world of today, we see headlines about churches making sometimes radical changes to accommodate changes in society. It is therefore not surprising that we now have over 200 denominations in the United States and thousands worldwide with more on the way.

But there is reason for hope. In his book Atwood reminds us that every church at one time or another has

"Thoughtful Service – A Payne Family Tradition" West, Texas 254/826-5321 been deemed as heretical by another. The church has faced many severe challenges during the last 7 centuries. But it has not merely survived, it has thrived amidst continuing changes in society and even the violent conflicts of war. It has even survived those who have attempted to manipulate believers to enhance their own power or personal wealth.

Atwood concludes his book with these words: "...there have always been those Christians who have courageously brought a message of hope to a troubled world. At the end of the second millennium, in the midst of continual change and reformation, Christianity continues to produce apostles, prophets, and martyrs ministering to a broken world."

I hope to lead a small group study of *Always Reforming* at some point in the future. Like its author, its purpose will not be to cast blame for mistakes made in the past or elevate one denomination over another. Rather, I intend it to be a study that better answers the question: How did we get to where we are today? History reminds us where we have been. We must then ask ourselves: How do we best proceed from here?

Mary Ann Evans (1819-1880) writing as George Elliot stated: "The important work of moving the world forward does not wait to be done by perfect men." This was certainly true of men such as King David as seen in the parable of the ewe lamb told by Nathan to David in 2 Samuel 12:1-14. We live in an imperfect world, but God used David to serve Him and create a united Israel.

Peter Fisher writes in his book, Finding Eden: Finding Hope in an Imperfect World. "The reality of imperfection is something we all live with: but how do we live with it? In our dreams and fantasies we like to imagine perfect people, places, or communities while in our cynical or despairing moments we see ourselves and our society as hopelessly flawed. The Christian gospel takes a third path: it is about imperfection and glory – it is about how God offers us realistic hope. In Jesus, God responds truthfully and generously to what we and our world are really like, to make of us something glorious."

Hope is one of the necessary in-

gredients in life. The Bible is a book of hope. Our God is the author and creator of hope. In giving us hope, God gives us "the nerve of life" to go on despite the circumstances that we find ourselves in. The light of hope will enable you to find your way. The light of hope will shine on the road you travel. You are never alone; God provides direction and light.

Isaiah 9: 2 informs us: "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned.

Dim January

Dear friends,

Greetings from Winston-Salem, where I am perched above a downtown street of eclectic shops and restaurants, under a foggy sky that obscures the tops of the tallest neighboring buildings. RuthE and Mikael chose here in the heart of the restored center of the city to make their home for now, but Covid is keeping this from being quite what they expected. There is enough movement to be fun, however, surrounded by the sights, sounds and lights.

We crossed into the USA in late December, just in time to celebrate Christmas with both sets of kids up in the mountains of North Carolina (picture attached). After RuthE's 26th birthday (January 2) we headed to Florida to see Anne's parents for a bit (it had been over a year since seeing them). We helped them with some logistical things, organizing some of the parts of life that get harder the older you get. They are in their late

80s, healthy enough, living in a great community of retired missionaries, well looked after by great staff.

Anne passed the milestone of 60 years a week ago. She got to celebrate with Philip and Cailey over a breakfast party, and with RuthE and Mikael for supper (pictures attached). We've been here with them this week, tying up loose ends here. Tomorrow we drive back to Atlanta, return Philip's car, and fly to Oaxaca on Thursday.

The gray, veiling clouds outside our window suit our outlook as we get ready to go. Perhaps more than any time in the last 20 years we are going into the unknown, without a clear view yet of what is waiting. Mexico is suffering even more from the pandemic that the USA, with far fewer resources to confront the difficulties. Our Sin Frontera missionary friends are also caught in this inbetween world, not always able to travel to their adopted villages, skirting outbreaks of the disease. Many towns, including our city of Tlaxiaco, are mostly shut down (we are trusting we can get to our house, though).

We are returning, despite this uncertainty, knowing that God has called us to walk with our Mexican friends as they reach into indigenous areas





MAKE: Shadow Crosses/Shadow Crosses basket

Materials: 2 paper plates, markers/watercolors, black construction paper, glue, staples






- 1. Using watercolors, color one paper plate to look like a sky. Make sure the plate is concave (curving inward).

- 3. Glue the cross outline to the sky paper plate or staple the cross outline paperplate to the sky paper plate. Since one is convex and the other concave, there should be an area in the middle that can serve as a baket.

OBJECT LESSON:

Materials: plate, clear drinking glass, penny, votive candle, and colored water

Directions: Set the plate down. Say: It is hard to understand what happened when Jesus died on the cross. Imagine this is you. (Set the penny on the plate.) Say: No matter how hard we try to be good, all of us have done bad things. That is this sin. (Pour the colored water into the plate.) Say: Sin covers us up. We're drowning in it. There's no way out for us on our own. But God sent his son, Jesus. (Place the lit candle onto the plate. The candle needs to be in the water but not covering the penny.) Say: Jesus came to be a light. He lived a perfect life. And then he died on the cross. (Place the drinking glass over the candle. After a few seconds, the light will go out and then the water will soak up inside the glass.) Say: That amazing act of love takes our sin away. If we accept Jesus and ask for his forgiveness, he will forgive us of our sins. They are gone forever. That's what Easter is all about.

Work is progressing smoothly with only minor construction issues so far. This is going to be a fabulous place once it's finished. Thanks again for your prayers and support.


