What if you believed with every breath you take that God truly can do anything?

"Walking by faith and not by sight" is the sort of faith that focuses on "God can" rather than on "God might." 17 When Jesus arrived, He found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days. 18 Now Bethany was near Jerusalem, some two miles away, 19 and many of the Jews had come to Martha and Mary to console them about their brother. 20 When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went and met him, while Mary staved at home. 21 Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died. 22 But even now I know that God will give vou whatever vou ask of him." 23 Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise again." 24 Martha said to him, "I know that he will rise again in the resurrection on the last day." 25 Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me, even though they die, will live, 26 and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. St. Paul's Cathedral in London was founded in the year 604 AD. The present cathedral dating from the 17th century was part of a major rebuilding program that followed the Great Fire of London in 1666 that destroyed the former structure. With its height of 365 feet, it once dominated the London skyline as the tallest building in the city from 1710 into the 1960s. Such heights were deemed necessary to symbolize both church authority and majesty.

By 1960, the city of London's communications needs had grown exponentially with long-distance telephone calls, television programs, and computer data. The conventional means of accomplishing this was to lay underground cables, but to lay enough cable in the heart of London to accommodate such needs would be both costly and difficult.

At the time, the Post Office had a monopoly over Britain's telecommunications and began looking for alternatives. Microwave radio channels offered a solution, but they relied on fixed lines of sight between transmitters and receivers. London lies in a hollow, so a tower would have to be constructed to overcome this natural barrier. It would also have to be taller than any of the city's buildings at the time. Unlike other tall structures which are meant to sway in the wind, this tower would have to be rigid in its construction to guarantee uninterrupted communications.

Designed by the Ministry of Public Building and Works, principal contractors Peter Lind & Co., began construction in June 1961. The base of the GPO Tower rested on a concrete raft sunk 24 feet below ground. 13,000 tons of concrete and steel cabling made up the central shaft of cantilevered floors. Some 25,000 miles of cabling permeated the tower which connected a variety of electronics that could handle 100,000 telephone calls and 40 television stations simultaneously. Also included were elevators lifting passengers at a rate of 1,000 feet per minute to any of three public viewing galleries and their observation platforms. Above these galleries was a restaurant that reAssociation of Bioanalysts and a member of the International Society for Clinical Laboratory Technology. Prime Minister Harold Wilson, accompanied by Postmaster General Tony Benn, officially opened the tower on October 8, 1965. Rising to its completed height of 620 feet (including its 40-foot mast), the tower was the tallest man-made structure in the city, over 250 feet taller than the renowned St. Paul's Cathedral. Dominating the London skyline, pilots flying into the city utilized it as an instantly recognizable landmark. Officially opened to the public on May 19, 1966. It quickly became a popular tourist attraction, drawing an average 4,500 visitors per day peaking on holidays. Officials quickly discovered they could recoup some of the costs by charging admission. A Tower Shop quickly followed, selling a variety of tower souvenirs.

The 1960s saw enthusiasm for science and technology rise unlike ever before and the General Post Office Tower symbolized this for Londoners. Prime Minister Wilson once spoke about 'the Britain that is going to be forged in the white heat of this revolution' and the need 'to think and speak in the language of our scientific age'. Although man had not yet set foot upon the moon, Russian cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin had already become the first man to venture into space in 1961. In addition, the first two Telstar communications satellites had launched in 1962 and 1963. The Space Age had arrived.

Change, however, is inevitable. On October 31, 1971, a bomb exploded inside the tower which caused extensive damage but caused no injuries.

The restaurant closed in 1980 and public access to the tower was halted in 1981. GPO telecommunications were split off and the structure was rechristened the British Telecom Tower. As a result of corporate rebranding, it then became known as the BT Tower.

In 2008, former Postmaster General Benn and a small camera crew were allowed access to the tower and its restaurant, which still rotates. They were also permitted access to its roof, which still offers a great view of London. While taking in the rooftop view Benn offered the following: "You see the whole city and all the various monuments. There's St. Paul's Cathedral where they worship God, and next to it is the Bank of England where they worship money. And of course, all buildings symbolize for people what it is they really worship, and I suppose today society worships communication – television, radio, mobile phones, Internet. It is communication that symbolizes this period of civilization, combined with the money men."

Raiford Family Update

Greetings everyone this holiest of weeks. The Lord Has Risen!

This week of all weeks we celebrate the life of Jesus Christ. The true Son of God who walked among us on this earth. I have been reflecting on that statement specifically over the past few days (and years) and I can't get out of my head that old phrase WWJD. For those of you not familiar, that is an acronym for What Would Jesus Do? I grew up in the 90's, and that was very popular in Christian circles and had a profound impact on my young Christian walk. For me it was so practical, so engaging, and so thought provoking it showed me my first glimpse into discipleship. Some of you who read this may remember thinking it was so corny and a bit corporate at the time. So did I, but the words always come back to me.

Over the last year the world had to endure incredible hardship and loss. Eunice and I have been serving our village during quarantine and using the time to really dive into peoples' lives. With everything shut down for months, we just had our friends in the village to comfort and serve and, as always, be comforted and served.

Eunice and I have always focused on the "doing" part of our ministry, trying to imitate Christ in all of our

actions. When resources were limited this past year and communication to the outside world was almost nonexistent, we truly found who we are as missionaries. We are the workers. Jesus did heal people and he did perform miracles for strangers, but Hhe also worked alongside his closest friends teaching, encouraging, preparing, and giving purpose to those lost in the world. I have not performed a miracle for a stranger, but I can work. Our work over the last year has been giving purpose to our many friends who have lost their way financially (setting up small businesses). Purpose to those who have lost relationships by giving pride back to their life through love of life. During this time in the pandemic our more animistic friends felt the true fear of not being in control like they normally do, but now saw the entire world fall into hopelessness and despair that they are all too familiar with.

So many of you may be thinking, what does that actually look like? I will show you:

We started three small businesses for three young ladies named Clio, Paty, and Nayeli. They each learned to bake various items and sell them throughout the village.

We mentored another young girl, Soreli, with her new business for months until it became the number one place to hang out in all Juquila.

We gave purpose back to our friend Eric, who has struggled since the death of his wife two years ago. He now has a steady job and a solid relationship with a woman who cares for him and his family.

We have mentored marriages for our friends Nacho and Godoberto.

Eunice has shown the village patience and calm while wild rumors about the virus scared everyone. As the respected doctor, she helped maintain order during the most strenuous times during the pandemic.

We started an exercise program for those worried about their future and their health.

We even began to sell food ourselves once a week to show others how to operate a business and to be able to empathize with the difficulties.

Jesus spent a lot of time with his disciples. Much of those conversa-

tions we don't know what was said, but we can see the results. They were brave men and women with purpose, love for others, and a work ethic that glorified God and impressed man. Jesus prepared His disciples for this world and the next. A complete discipleship. There are many times where Eunice and I did not know what to say, but how to work.

Finally, I leave you with the final story of a guy named Nahum. He is now my dear friend, and we are working a ranch together as I mentor him on organization and basic business skills and he teaches me to mend fence and be a real man, haha. He came to me a few months ago and told me he wanted a mentor. That is quite unusual to be so direct in indigenous culture. He wanted someone to teach him about honesty, true friendship, motivation, and ultimately about God. He has been an amazing gift from God as we both sharpen each other with wisdom.

Thank you for all your prayers, and we have been praying for you as well.

We are saved by the Grace of God and His Blood shed for us this day covers all our sin.



GAME: Noah Says



Use the following questions to discuss the story.

- Who was following God? (Noah.)
- What did God tell Noah to build? (An Ark.)
- What is an Ark? (A boat.)
- Why did God tell Noah to build the Ark? (God was going to cause a flood of water to cover the earth.)
- Did Noah do what God asked? (Yes.)
- Why do you think it is important to obey God? (Allow for discussion.)

GAME: Balloon Animal Round Up

- Split the children into 2 teams; Each child gets a balloon this is their animal.
- Have the teams line up at one end; the finish line is the ark.
- Give the first person in each team a stick.
- When you say, "Go", the first child in each line must put their balloon on the ground, hit their balloon with the stick and get it to the ark. They hand off the stick to the next player.
- The winning team gets all of the animals onto the ark.

A Mexican Maundy Thursday

Dear friends,

We are at the end of a three-day conference for church leaders here in the high mountains of Oaxaca. This is the first get together in more than a year for some of them. Over 150 have

gathered. Most are from indigenous villages around here, but about a quarter come from further away.

And all the missionaries with Sin Fronteras were able to come. So tomorrow we're having reunion activities all day with them. We, too, haven't been together in quite a while.

So many participants are talking about how good it is to gather again. The content, brought from the USA, is probably far less impacting than the fellowship we are enjoying.

The session right now is about empowering local leadership. Alejandro (the director of SF) started by remembering when he got here 25 years ago how few churches had their own pastors. Today that situation has significantly improved, yet this remains one of the more debilitating issues facing the small groups of believers in far too many places.

One of the reasons we have appreciated working alongside SF is how much they all, from Alejandro to their newest missionary, Salma, work hard at helping their humble co-laborers really experience empowerment.

To finish this event, in two hours we will celebrate Maundy Thursday





by taking the Lord's Supper. Most of them have no idea that this (or Good Friday) is normally celebrated by most evangelical churches in the West.

One of the weird things about many churches in southern Mexico, even though they can trace their roots to North American missionaries, is they think celebrating Easter and Christmas is pagan. Another weakness, also passed on by the missionaries, is the sense that only proper clergy should baptize and serve Communion.

That means that in this group, with over 100 indigenous from over 30 churches, half of them have never felt they could simply obey the words of Jesus when he said on this night "take, eat, drink, do this in remembrance of me."

There are a handful of Mixtecs from Guerrero, representing five churches, where we used to live. I've been trying for years to help them include these sacraments in their ministry, without success. Tonight, they will be part of this ceremony. I'm praying that the practical and empowering example that Alejandro brings will help convince them.

We are blessed to serve alongside the missionaries of SF and the indig-



enous leaders. We continue to learn from them, and to help them keep learning too.

May all the truth of Easter fill your weekend, and beyond.

Yesterday was a really Good Friday together with our Sin Fronteras friends, family, and team (all words used throughout the day to describe ourselves).


As I wrote on Thursday, we haven't been able to get together for over a year – I think that it's been over two that we've all been together like yesterday.




Bible Story Noah's Ark

were added to our group. Richard and Margaret are going to work among tribal people of Nepal; Tito and Abigail are Chinantec indigenous pastors working among new villages of their own group (in the north of Oaxaca state); Lulu took the training course last year and then married Luis, working among the Tepehuan of Durango state; Elien and Paloma (two of the singles), from the Huichol indigenous of Nayarit state, were in the course last year as well, and now are working towards outreach in new areas of their people; and Salma, from the border area with the U.S., is going to accompany Patty, the widow (her husband was killed in January of 2019) to the Mixtec village in Guerrero state that she has been in since 2016.

We started the day at 10 a.m. and went through till 10 last night. Dozens of kids of all ages running around everywhere, with a fish fry for lunch, strong coffee all day, and crumbly concha bread for supper. Table games and deep conversations all evening. Getting to know the nine students just arrived for the next training course (finishes in July, followed by five months of living in a reached indigenous village).

As I also wrote Thursday, we are privileged to live and work with this group. These are some of our closest friends in Mexico, sharing struggles and joys. We are small enough, and informal enough, and share enough, for us to truly use the term family. We work towards a common goal with similar methodology in such a united fashion that we can call ourselves team.

When Paul unpacks the mystery of the Gospel, the reason Jesus came to live among us, was killed and rose again, he boils it down to God doing all this to remove the barriers between people groups. He made a way for our Good Friday, where people from over eight distinct people groups of Mexico, plus the two national cultures represented, could come together the way this Sin Fronteras family is doing. Inherent to our being the way we are, the reason we can do this, is because we are all focused on the Great Commission, on the Genesis 12 idea of "blessing because we've been blessed."

I've attached three photos. One of the eight new members of the family, the others of the whole team (inside



and outside of the base building they were able to finish last year, that I helped design).

May our risen Saviour keep giving us new life.

April 12, 2021

Hello everyone,

I thought that I would report some wonderful yet challenging news. We have steadily had 5-6 kids consistently; on occasion we have had 8. On Palm Sunday we broke that trend and we were blessed with 12 which broke the record. Resurrection Sunday we had 16. ALL of the children live in Cade Lake except 1-2, but when they are visiting at Cade Lake every other week, they come. Some have to visit other parents, but it seems that is not consistent for some.

This past Sunday we had about 6 because 6 of them were at a child's birthday party and it started before noon, but they will be back as they are regulars.

Since we are a two-room church, we had to get creative. So, we made a place at the back of the church with a 6-foot table and a small round table.

I bought 10 black metal folding chairs at \$9.83 each and brought them on Easter Sunday.

On Wednesday nights we divide into two groups, men and women, as what we discuss is sensitive and we have nowhere for the kids to go.

I just want you all to know, God is moving, and we see a new person almost every Sunday. The movement of God is wonderful but with it comes challenges from the devil who seeks to kill and destroy because he is terrified of God's movement.

As you probably know, I faced death at the end of last year, 2020, and I remind you that in 12/19 I fell and severely broke my ankle. It took many months to be able to walk without assistance, and even though I thought that I was not going to be able to go on, God showed up and I am still here because He wasn't finished with me.

Tomorrow I will be having surgery on my ankle to remove the metal from both sides of my ankle. I humbly ask you to pray for the doctor and those attending to me to do their very best, and that the doctor be able to remove ALL metal as he is not certain about how much scar tissue is present which would prevent him from removing it all. I will also ask him/them to pray with me and we will give it to God.

It has been a privilege and an honor to serve God in this way – to be able to witness to people who cared for me in the hospital and outpatient surgeries and ER visits. Praise God from whom all blessings flow!

We have so many stories to tell but I think I should go for now, and please don't forget to financially support your Home mission at New Beginnings.
