Unity of the Brethren 69th Biennial Convention

The 69th Biennial Convention of the Unity was held on July 9, 2021, at the Hus Encampment, Caldwell, Texas. The Convention theme was "The Heartbeat of Worship and Work." Registration began at 8:00 a.m. The worship service began at 9:00 a.m. The Rev. Dr. Larry Koslovsky, President of the Synodical Committee, greeted the Convention. The opening hymn was "This is the Day." The Gathering Prayer was given by Kayla Marek. Songs of praise were led by Lynette Urbanovsky. The Responsive Reading was led by Angie Hairrell. The Offertory Praver was given by Rev. Whitney Amos. Special music was sung by Lynette - "The Heart of Worship." Rev. Koslovsky gave the message with scripture taken from Romans 12:1-2. Rev. Koslovsky asked us "when does worship start? Worship is the way we live, and we can be living sacrifices for God." Holy Communion was administered to all by Rev. Pastors were asked to join in the library for the selection of the Pastor to the Pastors. Elected was Rev. Whitney Amos and Rev. Charles Amos, who will serve jointly.

Session 2 began at 1:15 p.m. with the Rededication of the Hus Encampment Main Building led by Rev. James D. Hejl who opened with prayer. The Call to Worship was taken from Psalm 24. Song of praise was For the Beauty of the Earth. Comments on behalf of the Hus Encampment Board of Trustees was given by Kent Laza, Board of Trustees Chair. The "Act of Rededication" was inspired by the original Act of Dedication of the Hus School Encampment held on June 30, 1957. Special recognition was given to Joyce Baletka who with her husband, Rev. John Baletka started the Hus Encampment; David Dusek, Designer & Project Manager; Mark Dudley, Owner of Dudley Construction, Gary Zdunkewicz and Mike Donaldson; Robert and Sam Polasek - Polasek's Air Conditioning; and Sebek Painting. A key to the main building was presented to Rev. Larry Koslovsky. Special thanks were given to Kent and Tami Laza for all the work they have done these last few years. Everyone joined in the singing of *Pass It On.* A special Benediction from a Franciscan Blessing was given by Rev. Hejl. All those who had attended Hus School were invited to join in the singing of the full Czech version of "Hoj Verny V boj" accompanied by Elizabeth Rypl.

Approval was given for Synodical Representative changes for Houston – J.T. Verwold to replace Ron Tyson; (Temple) Cross Church on Birdcreek – Jim Hiles to replace Deborah Schiller; West – Roy Janek to replace Shara Davis.

Approval was given to raise the salary of the Youth Coordinator from \$23,000/yr to \$24,500/yr with an expense allowance of \$1800/yr. This is about a 6.5% raise. The last raise was given in 2015. License renewals were granted for David Johnson – 5-year license to New Tabor, and Lisa Johnson – 1-year license to Westheimer. Ben Kruse was approved for a 5-year license to Rosenberg. Bro. Larry explained how important our process is

These bugs were not too common but made enough cameo appearances that I remember fearing that one might land on my face while I was asleep in my beautiful 100% pink bedroom. The truth is that into my adult years, the fear of flying bugs in general has not abated my spirit. Nonetheless, if I do encounter one, I have a few tactics that have proven effective:


Paperplate Recipe Card Holder

Taste and See

Scripture: Proverbs 34:8

OBJECT LESSON


The Bible tells us to taste and see that the Lord is good. Look at this orange. How would you describe how an orange tastes? (if children say sweet, ask if it is sweet like chocolate; if they say juicy, ask if it is like a steak) What is the one way to really know how an orange tastes? (To eat it.) Peel the orange. Give each child a section. Eat the orange. Say, the only way to understand how sweet, juicy, and delicious an orange tastes is to actually taste it. The only way to really know the goodness of God is to experience it. But the Bible is telling us that we shouldn't just stand around and watch others experience how good God is, He wants us to get a "taste" for ourselves. He wants each of us to know how much He loves and cares about us.

Game: White Out

Break children into teams. Have a plate of oreos for each team. In relay fashion, one person from each team runs to the plates, eats the filling out of the oreo, then comes back and tags the next person. First team to "white out" their oreos, wins! Oreos are really good, but God is even tastier!

each lie. If you're not sure where to look in the Bible, search online for Bible verses that connect specifically to counter each lie. Ask a friend for help too, if needed.

5.) Thank God for revealing the lies of the devil to you that have been tripping you up and read out loud each lie with each Bible verse that refutes it. Reading something out loud adds a whole new dimension to the reality of it. We want to internalize this step of faith toward smashing the lies. Engage all of your senses: touch, sight, hearing, smell, and taste. Touch the pages of your Bible or the computer screen with the verses listed. Look at the words of the bible verses. Take a deep breath and remember how the room smells where you are. Take a sip of whatever you might be drinking. Engrave this time in your mind. God is meeting with you; it's something you will want to remember and practice again and again.

Returning to the Mount

Like others, I hold history and heritage in high regard. That is why I was delighted when Brother Jimmy Hejl incorporated the Ancient Unity's emphasis on right action as opposed to right belief in a recent Sunday message. He also reminded us that their social ethics was based on the Sermon on the Mount.

Craig D. Atwood in The Theology of the Czech Brethren from Hus to Comenius (2009) put it this way: "The Brethren placed greater emphasis on orthopraxy (right action) than on orthodoxy (right belief). Christianity was not a theoretical science for the Brethren; it was the art of following Christ in the real world. This means that social ethics (based on the Sermon on the Mount) was a part of Brethren theology in a more intense way than it was for other Protestants. The Brethren disagreed with Luther over the importance of the Epistle of James for Christian teaching. They based their theology and praxis on the Epistle of James, which asserts that without works, faith is dead. The Unity's moral teaching may be understood as an interesting blend of Anabaptist

and Reformed ethics, but its doctrine predated both of those Christian traditions and was Christocentric in its development of ethics. The Brethren called themselves Brethren of the Law of Christ, and they maintained this identity despite the criticism of Protestants and Catholics alike."


John Hus viewed the true church as the body of those elected by God (rather than by human choice) and the Brethren held to that view. They also believed that people are saved by faith which is completed in love. For the Brethren, love was not a temporary emotion. It was tangible action in the world. In short, it is a rejection of the worldly and an adherence to the law of Christ. It was an adherence to the Sermon on the Mount. The Golden Rule reminds us to love our neighbor, whereas the Sermon on the Mount reminds us to love our enemies. Peter Chelèický, a forerunner of the Brethren, taught that such divine love is what separates Christians from the worldly.

In 1500 Matthew, the first bishop of the Unity, died. With him died the first generation that personally knew

its founder, Gregory the Patriarch. Leadership passed to Luke of Prague. Although university educated, Luke rejected the comfortable life offered by the Utraquist Church. Despite opinions to the contrary, Luke did not abandon the Unity's social ethics when he engaged them with the larger world. He did not reject Chelèický's insistence that the Sermon on the Mount was intended for every Christian. Rather, he placed them in a broader biblical context. This granted them more flexibility in the swearing of oaths and the defense of others from violence. "The ideal that the Brethren held up for the community was still characterized by the rejection of worldly values of domination, control, violence, power, and invulnerability. The blessings associated with salvation and the gifts of the sanctifying Spirit remained those of the beatitudes: poverty of spirit, gentleness, mourning, hungering for righteousness, mercy, purity of heart, peacefulness, and redemptive

suffering."

our sin. This was not so with the Ancient Unity who looked upon the Sermon on the Mount for what it is: commands from Jesus Christ on how He wants us to live.

Perhaps this is one reason why I also gravitate to the writings and sermons of Dietrich Bonhoeffer. Bonhoeffer made his position clear in the Exposition of Matthew 5. In it, he demonstrated that being a Christian meant following Jesus and doing what He commands. That means removing all self-invented piety. Only then can the words of Jesus be understood for what they really are: commands from the Son of God. Following those commands results in a community of the church. Bonhoeffer concluded his exposition this way: "Here at the end of the Beatitudes the question arises as to where in this world such a faith community actually finds a place."

Today's world needs to reexamine the Sermon on the Mount and see the words for what they truly are – words to live by. We have an advantage. We can call upon our history and heritage. Those who preceded us based their social ethics upon them and we would do well to follow their example.

What I expected to be a short prayer, turned into 1 hour of ministry time with so much deep healing and restoration for many teens. This was exactly our prayer before the camp – we knew that a year and a half of physical isolation would have a toll emotionally and spiritually. It was amazing to watch God bring healing into those places.

At the end of the camp we found out that, even after all our efforts, one of the teens who attended had been carrying COVID. We found out Thursday evening, after everyone was on their way home or already home. To this point we have had 62 people confirmed sick (out of 110 participants + leaders), me included. This meant I must be in isolation until August 9th, therefore having to delay my trip to the U.S. Thankfully after a few miserable days over the weekend, I now feel better (except for the loss of taste and smell.)

Please pray for all the leaders and teens who are sick right now; 3/4 of the camp participants are in mandatory quarantine. This is not how we hoped to end, but what the enemy wished for evil, the Lord can use for good.

In the years since I became the lead pastor, I personally have witnessed some miracles, major changes in behaviors, and definite spiritual growth. On October 13, 2019, we dedicated the new building, baptized 3 members, celebrated with many Unity leaders, and enjoyed a delicious meal together.

Our group dreamed of a playground for our children. So, we hosted a bake sale outside of Walmart in Caldwell. We raised enough to purchase a used wooden playscape, that members picked up from College Station, then set it up at the Chapel and brought in the necessary material to make falls safe. At the time, we had about 2-4 children attending. The playground is being enjoyed by a growing number of children.

In February 2020, the church sponsored 5 people (3 men and 2 women) to go on the Walk to Emmaus, which is an adult Christian leadership conference. They testified that the experience has changed them, renewed and refreshed their faith. One man, George McKay, came back glowing and he told me that he always thought that he knew God and was close to him. But, through the Holy Spirit this experience worked a mighty work in George, and he came home a new man, saying that he had never known God like this. At the time of this writing, we plan to sponsor 1-2 men, and 2-3 women in October. George told us during a Sunday worship service that



our Katzir summer youth camp. The camp was a huge success. Thanks to a great team of leaders, we hosted 85 teens from all over the land.

The theme and name of the camp was "connected". It was all about dealing with the difficulty of being disconnected and isolated for a year and a half, overly connected to the wrong things, but above all, learning to connect with God in a deep and meaningful way in our lives. Interestingly, we also found ourselves doing the camp in a beautiful location in the desert, where biblically speaking, was THE place to disconnect, connect with God, and be transformed.

One of my highlights was the last evening on Wednesday. We had incredible breakthrough and a real outpouring of the spirit that evening. After the teaching, I felt led by the spirit to ask who in the room feels lonely or isolated. Slowly, many kids, boys and girls, raised their hands. Then, we had them stand in the middle of a circle and have everyone else shower them with prayer and love.

Good Time to Leave

Dear faithful supporters,

One of the last difficulties a missionary faces is how to leave well. There are many reasons why a missionary leaves; the best being that the work is done. And the best time is when love and respect abound on all sides. We are at that place now, to begin to end.

Thirty years ago, while we were still preparing to leave Ontario for southern Mexico, we wrote out a plan for our ministry. There were several major aspects, or phases, that we trusted God to see us through.

First was, of course, to engage with an unreached people group and learn their language and culture. We worked at that from 92 to 96.

Second was to share the Good News in appropriate language and forms and help new churches develop. That was most of our efforts till '04.

The final phase that we envisioned was to help Mexican Latin churches

ADERHOLD FUNERAL HOME, INC. "Thoughtful Service – A Payne Family Tradition" West, Texas 254/826-5321 raise up their own cross-cultural missions. Even while in the second phase we began working towards this last part. Some of you will remember that we partnered with Acapulco churches from '99 to '04 in market-city migrant outreach (in Ometepec). Once we moved to Oaxaca City this last part of our ministry became our primary focus, while maintaining some involvement in the previous two parts.

Over these last 15 years we've had the privilege of working together with many different groups. YWAM, Moravians & Unity of the Brethren, Nazarenes, Baptists, and others. Along the way we've learned a lot, about both direct ministry and how to help others get involved. Sometimes this second part is harder than just doing the work yourself. Perhaps the hardest part is helping groups change course, because that always means changing ideas and patterns. Everyone finds that hard to do.

Which is why working with Sin Fronteras has been such a blessing. In case you missed who they are, this is a group of Mexican missionaries from all over the country, but mostly the mid-to-north part. Their sole focus is church planting among unreached indigenous of Mexico.

Unity Archivist Clint Machann c-machann@tamu.edu 979-696-1360 or 979-845-4898 Alejandro and Sayra, the main leaders, started ministry here 25 years ago. Their dedication and charisma slowly brought more and more workers to these vast fields, and with the eight that were added this spring, there are over 30 members. About a third are indigenous themselves, an added plus.

At the beginning, over 10 years ago, our friendship developed slowly. As we proved we weren't interested in taking over, Alejandro brought us in more and more. He already had much of the same missiology but realized that they were weak at filtering out their own cultural patterns of church. He welcomed our input in walking with them, refining their practice and ideas along the way. We concentrated our efforts in the areas of language learning, missiology and field practice, and bivocational development.

And now they are at the place where we can help them better from a distance. We want them to develop their own outworking of the ideas and "best practices" that we've been able to share with them. They're more than capable.

So, we are starting the process of leaving Mexico. We will be here till July, be gone till next spring, and then spend a final three months, helping one more time with their training school, packing up, and saying goodbye. Not a final goodbye since we intend to visit once or twice a year for the foreseeable future.

The final and hardest part for us about all this is figuring out what to do next. We are right at 60, with no intention of retiring, still wanting to work in God's Kingdom as much as possible. We've become very specialized in a quite small field (with few employment opportunities). There are some possibilities in Ontario where our mission agency has begun outreach among the First Nations people.

We are still, and for the foreseeable future, full-time missionaries with Multiply. We are in dialogue with leaders there to explore how best we fit into several areas of missionary preparation and field training, both in Canada and beyond.

Thank you for your care and support over these many years.

We recognize that there are many ways of understanding what is fulltime missions ministry, and we respect the choices you make about helping us in the future. We have been richly blessed to receive from you, our friends, some for the entire 35 years since I left Ontario in 1988 to go to Honduras (Anne was self-supported till we married). And this was all through your own initiative, as you generously asked how you could help. We also recognize that behind and above the financial help has been many other kinds of support, not least your prayers. Many of you have hosted us in your homes, or lent vehicles, and other gifts. You have been part of making the Matt. 19:29 passage (about leaving houses and families and receiving a hundred times more) so very true for us.

We could never have undergone these many years of both difficulties and joys without you as our partners, and you will share in the blessings and rewards too. You have given us far more than a cup of water, and even that was important to Jesus.

Our ministry is the combination of hard work here on the ground and back home with you, our partners. The Unity has been a cornerstone of this ministry since the beginning. You have shown us hospitality, generosity, and have inspired us to be dedicated to the Word and mission of Jesus Christ. We are sad to miss our first convention in 10 years, but please forgive us, we will be back to see you as soon as we can. I don't know how long I can go without some fresh kolaches and brisket.

I almost forgot a quick update on the kids. Ian will be eight in August and Hannah is four. They love to ride their bikes and go climbing in the mountains. They are full of energy and have been giving us a run for our money with the home-schooling situation. Please pray for Eunice and I. Hopefully they go back in the fall! Ian

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

First, let us greet you in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! We also send you our very warm greetings from Moravia!

It is always a special time when we all are remembering life, teaching, ministry, sacrifice and the legacy of our precious and dear Brother, Master Jan Hus. The same as for many Christians also for us here in Czech Republic, his life, guided by the Holy Spirit to start a new formation or re-formation of the Church is very significant and motivated even today!

The same as in his days, maybe today more and more, we all must stay firm in the Biblical fundamental Truth, in the Words of our Lord Jesus Christ and in the other letters and epistles of the New Testament/Bible.

We are humbly privileged and honored to serve as the Lord's disciples and ministers! You surely know that our country, the Czech Republic, is known as the most atheistic country in the world! We do not know why, if "thanks" to the communism which put this nation into captivity for so many years, or "thanks" to the "materialistic" freedom and liberalism we have right now... Probably all together...

As we mentioned, we are humbly thankful that we can serve people in the Gospel. Our major tasks are the KIDS and their families and the PUB-LIC sharing of the Gospel among young people.

Praise God that right now the situation concerning restrictions is much better and we feel freedom to be with people and not keeping the social distancing strictly. Praise God most of the kids did return to the club, and we are preparing meetings and activities for them outside, mostly in the parks.

We really appreciate that the kids who do attend the club for years already do take some of their friends to the club too, so we do have still new coming kids to minister. Probably each kid is from a dysfunctional family, where parents are divorced, where there is a big problem with alcohol and violence...

In most cases Stania and I are like their "step" parents... They do trust us and many times they share their problems and pain which they have inside. We always pray for them and try to give them the best advice we can.

Very important for their lives is to hear the Word of God. We have regular Bible reading with them, mainly the parables and stories from the Gospels. They love to hear about Lord Jesus and for us it is a great privilege to introduce Lord Jesus to them in the truth, as the Son of God, who loves them and who is always

ready to do His best for them. Each kid knows that He died on the Cross for their sins. What a Grace!

Also very important is that their parents are coming to the park to meet with us, to talk, and so it is great time for fellowship with them. They know that we are Christians, and some are listening carefully when we read from the Bible. We pray the Holy Spirit is touching their hearts by His Truth and Love.

And as you already know, we are also focused on the public Gospel sharing ministry. We do minister in this way in SEVEN cities. One city is Dresden/Germany, where there is a group of Czech Christians, and we minister regularly to them. We call them "our missionaries". They do a mission ministry in their place and that's great! We do plan to go over there and encourage them in July for a short mission trip.

We did extend our ministry to other cities in the Czech country. We minister in Decin, where there is a small church which is doing great street Gospel sharing ministry to the lost people. They are very bold and happy to serve to the people.

All the other cities are here in Moravia region. Next one is Trinec, which is in North, Silesia district. This city is known as the very "religious" city in Czech Republic. So we are always happy to be with the people over there and share with them. There
